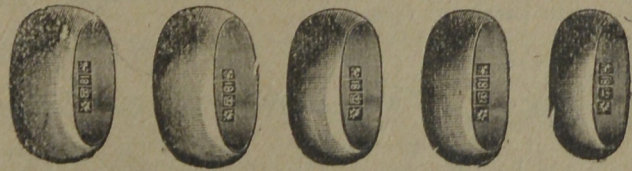

## COMMERCIAL BUSINESS ALL RECORDS BROKEN.

Marconi Says will Soon be Sent Across the  
Ocean by Wireless Telegraphy—Rates  
Will be Comparatively Low.

(Special to Herald.)

SYDNEY, N. S., Sept. 23.—  
Marconi arrived here Saturday  
morning. Before leaving he  
made a statement in which he  
said he would commence send-  
ing commercial messages as  
soon as the Sydney station is  
opened, in about three weeks.

He has now reached a point  
where all obstacles have been  
overcome. Weather conditions  
do not effect the service and  
less masts or poles were struck  
it would also be impervious to  
lightning. The ordinary opera-  
tor can do the commercial wire-  
less work with three months'  
training.

At present he is working with  
the continental Morse alphabet,  
but could use the ordinary  
Morse as well, and send twenty  
words per minute.

Marconi said the first com-  
mercial work would be sending

press dispatches to the big Eng-  
lish papers. Messages sent  
from Sydney will be received at  
Clifden, Ireland, where a new  
station is being put in with a  
fine plant, etc. Poldhu would  
be used as a relief station to  
Clifden.

The station at Cape Cod is  
not yet ready.

At Clifden the British gov-  
ernment will distribute the mes-  
sages. He has chosen no name  
for the messages yet, so they  
will be known as Marconigrams  
for a time.

Marconi's charge for a mes-  
sage will be ten cents a word;  
five cents for press despatches.

Cable companies will reduce  
their figures to the same as  
Marconi's. The inventor also  
says that the little difficulty  
with the Canadian government  
has been settled. The trouble  
was over interpretation of the  
contract.

Attendance at the Exhibition Exceeded 26,-  
000—The Closing on Saturday.

The big exhibition of 1907 was  
brought to a close at ten o'clock on  
Saturday evening, and the city has  
already settled down to normal  
conditions. Although the weather  
prevailed on Saturday the attendance  
was somewhat disappointing, only  
1317 people having passed the turn-  
stiles against 2367 on the closing  
day in 1905. The total attendance at  
the exhibition was 26,428, which  
establishes a new record for this city.  
This is 2052 ahead of the attendance  
at the exhibition in 1905, and beats  
1903 by a little more than 800.

The expenses were greater at this  
year's exhibition than ever before,  
and considering the large amount  
expended in advertising, and the ex-  
cellent character of the exhibits, some  
of the directors looked for an atten-  
dance of at least thirty thousand.  
"We had a much better exhibition  
than ever before," said one of the  
directors to the Herald, "and it  
strikes me as rather strange that  
there should be no material increase  
in the attendance over the show held  
four years ago. I am doubtful if  
there will be any surplus when all  
bills are paid."

### THE CLOSING DAY

Many school children visited the  
grounds on Saturday afternoon and  
were greatly delighted with the ex-  
hibits and special attractions put on  
in the open air. In the evening the  
attendance was rather slim, but  
those who turned out had a splendid  
chance to see the exhibits. The Lon-  
dons and Japanese gave performances  
on the grounds at seven o'clock but  
the leopards did not exhibit in the  
evening. As the special attractions  
were one day late in arriving, the  
sum of \$300 was deducted from the  
amount of their contract by the ex-  
hibition management. The total cost  
of the special attractions was \$1700,  
and the receipts amounted to about  
\$1300.

Flores LeBlanche, the strong wo-  
man, who conducted a show on the  
grounds, struck her tent before dark  
on Saturday evening and announced  
her intention of leaving for St. John  
by the nine o'clock train. Secretary  
Hooper refused to give her permis-  
sion to leave the grounds and she  
became very indignant and threatened  
to make a whole lot of trouble. She  
got the ear of some of the directors  
and made use of some very strong  
arguments which seemed to strike  
them quite forcibly. She declared  
that she was not an exhibitor, but  
had paid for space on the ground for  
the purpose of conducting a private  
show. So long as she had paid over  
her money she thought she had the  
right to leave whenever she felt like  
it. The directors after looking into  
the matter gave the strong woman  
permission to move out. Before leav-  
ing for St. John Miss LeBlanche stat-  
ed that she had arranged to give  
talks in that city on physical cul-  
ture at \$100 per talk.

Saturday was a rather poor day  
for the fairs, and the majority of  
them packed up and left before dark.  
One old chap who conducted a ball  
tossing game on the lower side of the  
building, was compelled to remain  
until the close, although he tried to  
get away in time to catch the 6.30  
train for Chatham.

Nearly all of the live stock was re-  
moved from the grounds yesterday,  
and the other exhibits were removed  
this morning. Two special trains  
left here by the I. C. R. for Halifax  
last evening with live stock to be  
shown at the big exhibition in that  
city this week. The large exhibitors  
without exception expressed them-  
selves as being much pleased with  
the treatment received from the ex-  
hibition management, and they will  
undoubtedly patronize the fair to be  
held here in the fall of 1909.

### A LIVELY RUMPUS.

There was quite a lively rumpus  
kicked up on the exhibition grounds  
Saturday night and a duck came  
to a violent death at the hands  
of a cattleman named Kelly in the  
employ of McIntyre Bros. The duck  
was the property of Mr. David Riley  
of St. John, one of the exhibitors,  
and was turned out by him along  
with some other for an airing on  
the grounds. Some boys captured  
the bird and placed it in the tub  
used for watering cattle just to see  
it swim. Kelly came along to water

some cows and noticing the duck re-  
moved it from the tub. When he  
started away with the cattle the  
boys again captured the duck and  
placed it in the tub. In a short  
time Kelly returned to the tub with  
another relay of cattle, and finding  
the duck swimming about he caught  
it up and hurled it to the ground  
with such force that the bird's neck  
was broken. Mr. Riley came along  
about this time and certainly would  
have avenged the death of the duck  
with his fists had not one of the di-  
rectors interfered. It took some  
time to restore peace, however, and  
Kelly was given to understand that  
unless he made good the damage the  
case would be placed in the hands  
of the S. P. C. A. Mr. Archie  
Jewett, who was an eye witness of  
the whole trouble says that it was  
a case of justifiable homicide on  
the part of Kelly, as the duck had  
no business in the water.

### LARGE PRIZE WINNERS.

It is thought that the amount to  
be paid out in prizes this year will  
exceed by at least \$2,000 the total  
paid in premiums at the exhibition  
in 1905. The principal prize win-  
ners are as follows: Walter McMon-  
agle, \$387; W. W. Black, Amherst,  
\$272; Roper Bros., Charlottetown,  
\$280; Logan Bros., Amherst, \$250;  
McIntyre Bros., Sussex, \$221; J.  
Baker & Son, Barronsfield, N. S.,  
\$135; B. E. Goodspeed, P. N. S.,  
\$115; C. A. Archibald, Truro, \$246;  
H. C. Jewett, Fredericton, \$180; F.  
P. Robinson, Nashwaaksis, \$109.

President Campbell, Secretary  
Hooper and the directors all worked  
hard to make the exhibition a suc-  
cess and are deserving of every cred-  
it. Mr. F. P. Robinson, the gen-  
eral vice-president of the society, was  
constantly in attendance, and gave  
his personal attention to all de-  
tails.

Mr. George Y. Dibblee was in  
charge of the Amusement Hall and  
no man worked harder in the inter-  
ests of the exhibition. Mr. Dibblee  
did not have to be told that repre-  
sentatives of the press were entitled  
to certain courtesies. Other officials  
rendered good service and were  
constantly found at their posts were  
Messrs. F. W. Hatheway, C. N.  
Goodspeed, William McKay, A. C. Gil-  
man, M. Tennant, and F. L. Coop-  
er.

Secretary Hooper had the assist-  
ance of a very obliging office staff  
composed of Miss May Dolan, and  
Messrs. G. Bidlake, A. D. Macpher-  
son, and D. S. Hooper.

Treasurer McCready who had the  
important duty of looking after the  
financial end of the show, was ably  
assisted by Mr. C. Fred Chestnut  
and Mr. Ersie Golding.

It seems to be the general opinion  
of the directors that the exhibition  
will come out all right financially.  
The gate receipts totalled about  
\$6,500 and about \$2,500 was collect-  
ed from exhibits and concessions.  
In addition to this there is a govern-  
ment grant of \$4,000 and a city  
grant of \$1,000.

### STEAMSHIP RATE WAR.

MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 23.—  
The Montreal steamship com-  
panies have at last decided to  
enter the big rate war in earn-  
est, and rates have been cut  
in first cabins.

The rates henceforth on the  
Empress boats will be \$55;  
Turbines \$50; Dominion \$45, in  
all cases Canadian port to Liv-  
erpool.

## COLCHESTER TRAGEDY.

HALIFAX, Sept. 23.—Dr. J. L.  
Peppard, of Great Village, Colchester  
County, and Samuel Lindsay, of  
Londonderry Station, died from the  
effects of poisoning Saturday after-  
noon.

The men were at work harvesting  
oats and becoming thirsty, went to  
the house for a drink of buttermilk.

When entering the door the doctor  
said "We'll have something better  
than buttermilk," so they went into  
the doctor's office. On the shelf were  
two bottles, one containing strychnine  
and the other fruit syrup.

When the men had quenched their  
thirst they went back to the field.  
Dr. Peppard was driving the rake

when he reeled and fell from the seat,  
calling to the boy who was working  
with him to get him a drink of  
mustard and warm water. The boy  
ran to the house but in his excite-  
ment forgot the message. Mrs. Pep-  
pard came running to her husband's  
assistance but before she could do  
anything for him he was dead.

In the meantime Samuel Lindsay,  
who was working in another part of  
the field, became sick. He was taken  
to the house, where he lingered until  
about 5 o'clock on Saturday.

(Dr. Peppard was one of the promi-  
nent physicians of Colchester County  
and was a leading worker in the  
Conservative party in that consti-  
tuency.)

### THE STOCK MARKET

MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 23.—  
In a quiet stock market this  
morning Dominion Steel and  
Coal issues were again neglect-  
ed, but on the whole, quota-  
tions were steady.

Steel pld. sold better than at  
the close of last week. The only  
transaction was at 54.

Generally speaking the tone  
of the market was steady. To-  
ledo sold at 20½; Lake of the  
Woods Milling at 73 to 72½;  
Twin City 34; Detroit 64½; Rio  
41½.

### TRANSCONTINENTAL RAILWAY.

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 23.—  
Collingwood Schriber, consult-  
ing chief engineer of the Nation-  
al Transcontinental Railway, says  
that the G. T. P. will be com-  
pleted from Saskatoon to  
Winnipeg and open for traffic  
before the close of the year. Mr.  
Schriber has the assurance of  
the G.T.P. that this will be  
done.

### AT THE BOOMS.

At the Mittenell boom last week  
545 joints of logs were rafted by  
seventy five men in four days. It is  
expected that the season's rafting  
will be finished by the end of the  
present month. The total quantity of  
logs rafted this season will be about  
one hundred and thirty five million  
feet.

### ORIENTAL INVASION.

Over 500 More Chinese Landed at  
Vancouver.

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 23.—  
Comptroller Parmalee, of the  
Department of Trade and Com-  
merce, received a telegram from  
Vancouver, stating that the  
Empress of India brought 500  
Chinese, over one hundred of  
whom paid capitation tax, 100  
being returned to China, and  
the balance are in transit to  
the United States and other  
points.

### SEVERELY WOUNDED.

James Carroll, of the auditor-  
general's office, who came here  
from Inverness County, C. B.,  
two years ago, is lying serious-  
ly ill in St. Luke's hospital  
with a wound in his neck which  
he received in his boarding  
house, 99 Gloucester street.

### SALE OF SHEEP.

A number of pure bred sheep pur-  
chased by Agricultural Society No.  
34 at the recent sale, were sold at  
auction at the exhibition grounds on  
Saturday afternoon. A Leicester ram  
was knocked down to Mr. George  
Colter of Keswick for \$15, and six  
Cotswold yearling ewes were bid in  
by Mr. F. P. Robinson of Nashwaak-  
sis for \$60. Another Cotswold ram  
was sold to Mr. Moses Flemming of  
Scotch Lake for \$12, and Mr. F. W.  
Hatheway of Kingsclear purchased  
one of the same breed for \$20. The  
sheep cost the society \$162 and sold  
for \$167.
