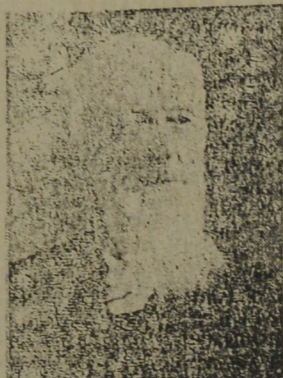


REV DR CHAPMAN

Former Fredericton Pastor Honored at Point DeBute.

(Amherst News.)

The Methodist church at Point de Bute was last night the scene of a very happy event, it being the celebration of the 50th anniversary of the ministry of Rev. Douglas Chapman, D. D. The function was under the auspices of the Methodist churches at Point de Bute and Joliette and large numbers were present from both these sections as well as from Sackville, Amherst and other places.

The pulpit was beautifully decorated with a magnificent display of cut and potted flowers. Rev. J. Strothard, of Moncton, N. B., chairman of the district, ably performed the duties of presiding officer. His words of commendation and congratulation to Rev. Dr. Chapman were much appreciated by all. The secretary of the N. B. & P. E. I. conference was called upon to read the address prepared by the

conference for the occasion in accordance with a vote passed by that body at its last session. The presentation was formerly made by Rev. James Crisp, President of the conference, who spoke most eloquently and fittingly of the long years of labor and success of Dr. Chapman, and the very high position he occupied, not only in the estimation of the denomination represented by him, but by all denominations. He spoke of Dr. Chapman as one whose life had been with out the shadow of suspicion, and one whose work in the Christian ministry had been unusually successful. Dr. Chapman made a feeling reply, thanking his many friends for this, another of the many tokens of continued confidence and esteem. The place, Dr. Chapman said, was a fitting one for such a celebration because it was from the Point de Bute circuit that he had been recommended to the conference over 50 years ago. The Dr. named the many advances that had been made during the last fifty years in science, art, literature but especially in the religious world. He spoke of the many parsonages that it had been his pleasure to preside over, both in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. Among them he had three times served the Point de Bute churches and he counted them as among his most pleasant pastorates.

Other speakers who participated were Dr. Allison, Dr. Borden, Dr. Paisley, Rev. Messrs. Dawson, Hartman, Stebbings and Gaetz. The Pt. de Bute choir rendered appropriate music. Solos were rendered by Mrs. H. Goodwin of Pt. de Bute, Miss Hemmings of Sackville and Mr. J. C. Carter of Amherst. After the exercises the ladies of Pt. de Bute church served refreshments which were much enjoyed.

Holland, gingham or flannel-ette are suitable for making, the latter material being the warmest for cool-weather wearing. For the 1-year size 2 1/2 yards of 36 inch material are needed.

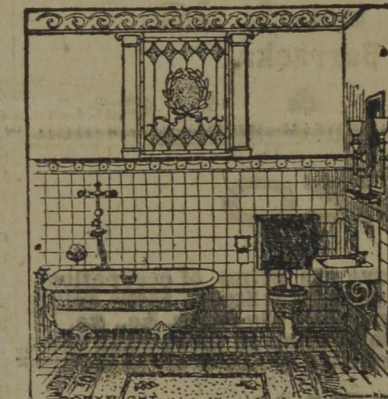

READY TO BACK IT UP

Hon. Dr. Pugsley Reiterates his Charges of Colossal Tory Corruption in the Last Election.

Following his speech at Fairville, in which he made certain charges against the Conservative party, Hon. Dr. Pugsley, at the nomination proceedings in St. John, issued a direct challenge to Mr. R. L. Borden to bring before the courts for final determination such charges of political corruption as have been made. He declared himself personally prepared to prove that the Conservative party, whose purity Mr. Borden is now preaching, has in the past been guilty of general corruption.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. Pugsley repeated his declaration that in 1904 the Conservatives had a corruption fund of half a million. He protested against the campaign of vilification that was being carried on by Mr. Borden and his lieutenants, saying that it was beneath the dignity of the leader of a great party. A violent speech of Mr. Bristol, one of the Toronto members, was particularly mentioned.

UNWORTHY TACTICS.

Continuing Dr. Pugsley said: "Members of the Conservative party and their supporters had made charges of fraud in electoral matters against the government. There, is, I think, too much quibbling about small matters in this regard, and rather neglect of the questions and issues of the day. The tactics of Hon. R. L. Borden are unworthy of a man holding the great position which that gentleman occupies. "Some of Mr. Borden's parliamentary supporters are given to making reckless and unsupported statements Mr. Bristol, M. P., for instance, on a public platform in Ontario, in Mr. Borden's presence, had said that the government had been shown to be wholesale and retail electoral thieves. Is that language which a public man should apply to the government? Will the history of the government or of its members warrant such a reckless and slanderous statement. AN ENORMOUS FUND RAISED.

"Because I condemned Mr. Borden's course in regard to electoral purity and said that he should look to his own party first, and because I said that if the opportunity were given me in the courts I could show that an enormous sum had been raised for election purposes in 1904 by Mr. Borden's friends and supporters and those who enjoyed his confidence and that part of the sum, or \$25,000, was spent in a county of this province, the argument is made that I am dealing in generalities, and should come down to particulars. Was Mr. Bristol dealing in particulars when he made the statement mentioned? I am dealing in particulars to a far greater extent than Mr. Bristol.

OFFERS THE ST. JOHN SUN.

"I will go a step farther, and say that if Mr. Borden wished to pick

out a paper which could be held responsible for these charges he could bring an action against The St. John Sun. I have consulted the editor of that paper, and there would be no plea of privilege entered as a defence to such action. It would be admitted that the statements were libelous if untrue, but the evidence would be forthcoming to prove the truth of the charges before this court. And I have such confidence in the correctness of information that I am prepared to stand behind that paper and protect it against any possible loss in such action. I would not have entered the government if I had not been prepared to hit back to its detractors and give something in greater measure than was given.

FACTS ARE AVAILABLE.

"It has been said the facts in connection with my charges should be made known. With reasonable diligence any Conservative paper could secure and disclose to the public some facts which would make Mr. Borden take a different course, and which would make them conclude that they had better divert their attention to public questions, and that public men had larger duties than dealing with petty subjects. "For my part I will endeavor to be fair to my opponents and discuss public questions upon their merits."
