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AYLESWORTH'S GREAT SPEECH

Eloquent Fighting Minister of Justice Trimmed Borden to a Finish.

In A Forceful Address at Windsor, Ontario.

The feature of the joint picnic of the South and North Essex Liberal Associations, held at Barber's Grove, Windsor, Ontario, on Thursday afternoon was the militant speech of Hon. A. B. Aylesworth. The Minister of Justice was merciless in his steady fire of criticism of the methods of political warfare to which Mr. R. L. Borden and his touring supporters have resorted. From first to last Mr. Aylesworth was unservedly frank, and unhesitating in his handling of the Conservative campaign and their tactics. He carried the war into the enemy's lines; he turned all the weapons at his command upon them, and he showed to all who followed him how flimsy were the fortifications behind which the foe sought refuge, and how poor the ammunition the enemy has been using.

Prior to Mr. Aylesworth's speech Mr. John Holden, and Mr. Chas. E. Naylor, presidents respectively of the North and South Essex Liberal Associations, moved and seconded a resolution of confidence in the government, which unanimously carried. In its concluding portions it was as follows:

CONFIDENCE IN NEW MINISTERS.

"During the eleven years in office of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, a number of changes have taken place in the personnel of his Government. The vacancies thus created have been filled by men who will maintain the splendid service and high sense of public duty of their predecessors. The Hon. Mr. Aylesworth—one of the foremost men at the Canadian bar, has at great personal sacrifice accepted Sir Wilfrid's invitation to be Minister of Justice. That he will acceptably discharge the duties of that office his well-established reputation warrants us in believing. In the Hon. Mr. Lemieux Sir Wilfrid has selected a man for Postmaster General who has shown himself a worthy successor of Sir William Mulock, who has left a monumental administration of that depart-

ment. In his direction of the Labor Bureau in connection with the Post Office the Hon. Mr. Lemieux has shown a keen appreciation of the value of that department.

"Sir Wilfrid's two latest colleagues, Messrs. Graham and Pugsley, are not new to public life. Both, we are confident, will justify their choice. Regret has been generally expressed that the Hon. Mr. Graham was so soon removed from the leadership of the Liberals in the legislature, but the Liberal party of Ontario has able men in its ranks, and when the time comes one will be found who will be a worthy successor of the great Liberal leaders of the past." The reference to Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the allusions made to him thereafter by the various speakers were warmly greeted.

HON. MR. AYLESWORTH'S SPEECH.

Hon. Mr. Aylesworth, after a graceful acknowledgment of the greeting accorded him, entered almost at once upon a discussion of the scandal campaign being conducted by the Conservative leaders and press. One material influence in this campaign undoubtedly was that of the seventy Conservative members in the House of Commons, forty-seven were from the Province of Ontario. These men hoped to win the country to their side by just the same campaign of vilification that was waged in the last provincial elections.

A year ago, he proceeded, the Liberals had redeemed North Bruce, and only yesterday Dr. Pugsley had been returned by acclamation in the county and city of St. John, N. B., where at the last elections there had been a Conservative majority of 800. In spite of the plea of their leader made in the city of St. John a month ago, and the slander campaign since, the Conservatives of the riding, knowing that if they opposed Hon. Dr. Pugsley they would have gone down to ignominious defeat, had run away without even nominating a candidate. The consistent policy of de-

traction, abuse, unmerited slander and scandal that had apparently been deliberately adopted by the Conservatives, he went on, was unless all signs failed to be carried on not only throughout the country, but at the next session of Parliament. If that was to be the case the Liberals were ready to meet their antagonists upon that ground, low as it was, and they had nothing to fear as to the result.

Mr. Aylesworth took up one or two of the charges made by the Conservatives, showing on how flimsy a foundation they were based. These charges, he declared, were made simply because the Conservatives knew that the Government administration and legislative record was absolutely impregnable. Then he turned his attention to Mr. Borden. During the last few weeks, if never before, the Opposition leader had lent himself, apparently with a willing heart, to the task of mud throwing and general abuse.

MR. BORDEN'S SHINING MARK.

Speaking at Chatham recently, Mr. Borden had, in the course of references to the result of the general elections as they affected the Province of Nova Scotia, stated in effect that his own, among other constituencies had been debauched, and that Hon. Mr. Fielding knew of these things and participated in them beforehand. "I felt indignation when I read those words," said Mr. Aylesworth. "I know Mr. Fielding, the people of this country know him, and I venture to say that here is not an honest and right-minded man who does not believe that Hon. Mr. Fielding is as pure and honest a statesman as ever drew the breath of life."

READY TO MEET HIM

"Last week at a public meeting in the town of Dundas I read an extract from Mr. Borden's speech, and I had a word or two to say by way of answer. Since then the newspapers of this province have been profuse in their accounts of challenges to wordy war and combat from Mr. Borden to myself. I was waited upon not long ago by the representative of a Toronto newspaper, who wanted to know where I would meet Mr. Borden. I had no other answer to make than that I had met him before on the floor of the House of Commons and would meet him there again. Mr. Borden will be welcome if he comes to any meeting where I happen to be present. I shall be pleased to see him. But it is a vain and idle thing that he as champion of the Conservative party should be issuing vilifications throughout the country and challenging his opponents to meet him. Does he think I am going to follow him? I am here, let him come."

IN A GLASS HOUSE.

"I said before, in referring to Mr. Borden, that he had better look to his own case. I said what I am prepared to uphold anywhere, and before any tribunal in this country, that certain statements of what the petitioners in the Halifax election case said they could prove in regard to Mr. Borden's own connection with corrupt practices at the late Dominion general elections had been submitted to me, and I expressed my opinion on these statements, as any lawyer might. I said what I repeat today, that if these things were established at the trial, Mr. R. L. Borden would stand disqualified for eight years from the House of Commons in Canada."

NOT LESE MAJESTE.

In the eyes of Mr. Borden and his supporters, Mr. Aylesworth continued, it would seem that the speaker had been guilty of a crime only to be compared with that of lese majeste, about which European monarchs were so touchy because he ventured to say of Mr. Borden something much less harmful than that gentleman had said of Hon. Mr. Fielding. "I have been attacked right and left," he proceeded, "not merely by Mr. Borden, but by party newspapers, as well, but the proof is not upon me. I know nothing personally about the affair. I simply know what it is which the petitioners against Mr. Borden say they have proof of, and I have said to them, as I say to the people of this country, if you can establish that you can succeed in your petition and you can disqualify Mr. Borden."

THE WITNESS BOX THE TEST.

Mr. Aylesworth made no claim to being a prophet, and especially in regard to the result of litigation, his 30 years' experience as a lawyer having proved the unwisdom of that. "I do not know what Mr. Borden's answer to these charges will be," he said. "He tells

CHINA MAY HAVE A MODERN GOVT

High Officials Petition Dowager Empress to Establish a Parliament.

PEKIN, Sept. 21.—An imperial edict was issued to-day authorizing Prince Pu Lun, who was Chinese envoy at the St. Louis Exposition, and Sun Chi Ana, in co-operation with the Grand Council, to frame regulations for the establishment of a council of deliberation to aid the Government, "so that the foundation may be laid for a Parliament." The Dowager Empress says that in the establishment of a representative Government the opinions of all must be considered, and that though upper and lower houses are the foundations of administrations the throne is unable to establish them in China at present. Both Cheng Chi Tung and Tuan Shi Kai since coming to Peking on their appointment as grand councillors, have urged the establishment of a constitutional form of government, recalling the fact that this reform had been promised and that China and all the rest of the world expected to see it carried out.

Memorials to the throne from the highest officials throughout China continue to reach Peking in large numbers, urging the throne to grant China a constitutional government.

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
