NEWEST APRONS.

They May Be Daintily Trimmed With Lace and Ribbons.

The dainty aprons which appeal so strongly to a woman can be made to be both useful and ornamental. Both for fancy work and afternoon tea or for a chafing dish party a pretty apron is a very necessary as well as an attractive addition to one's dress.

Every one likes a novelty, and even the work apron can be cut in a new shape, while those for afternoon tea or to be used with the chafing dish can be made as charming as possible.

They may be very elaborate with lace and embroidery and bright ribbons to add to their beauty or quite simple of fine sheer material, with a featherstitched ruffle, edged with valenciennes lace, as the only decoration.

Some women wear fancy aprons when they are dressed for an afternoon at home, and a fine white one can be changed in appearance by having several shades of delicate ribbons to use on different occasions.

These aprons are tiny affairs, just large enough to serve the purpose and preserve the name. The more useful work apron should be of generous proportions, as it is not generally used for dressy occasions.

Colored embroidery is used frequently upon fancy aprons with dainty effect and is a welcome change from the all white embroidery.

Attractive little aprons of colored lawn or dimity are shown to be worn with light dresses. One of pale blue lawn, embroidered with white mercerized cotton, will be quite effective. The ruffle on this is graduated in shape and lies perfectly smooth along the sides.

The hem is finished with featherstitching, also in white, and edged with valenciennes lace. Large polka dots are embroidered around the edge of the apron where the ruffle is joined, and this hem may also be finished with featherstitching.

The band for the top is of wide cambric beading, through which pale blue satin ribbon is run for the strings.

Any light color, also white, can be used for this apron.

FILTERING WATER.

A Cheap Method of Purifying Drinking Water.

As efficient a filter as can possibly be secured may be made in a few minutes by any one at the cost of a few cents.

Take a new flowerpot, close the opening in the bottom with a piece of sponge, on top of which place a layer of small stones, previously well cleaned. The layer should be about two inches deep. The upper stones should be smaller.

Next procure some freshly burned charcoal, which has not been kept in a damp or ill aired place. Reduce this to a powder and mix it with twice its bulk with sharp, cleanly washed sand.

With this mixture fill the pot to within a few inches from the top, cover it with another layer of small stones and place a piece of flannel around the rim. The flannel should be large enough to tie around the pot and also to leave a little hollow in the center.

The charcoal should be renewed about twice a month.

SEWING ROOM NOTES.

If a yoke is not desired on the back of the waist, it is always advisable to put one of muslin across the shoulders on the inside. The waist wears much better, for the strain is lessened.

Tucked shirt waists are much more satisfactory in appearance and fit if the tucking is done before the waist is cut out. Tuck a long strip for the two fronts. In this way they are sure to be alike without so much tiresome measuring.

The temptation to keep one's thumb on when not in use is a great one, but it is one which should be resisted. The constant pressure will partially change the shape of the end of the finger, and the heating and consequent moisture will soften the nail.

Home Dressmaking.

To get a child's skirt perfectly even at the bottom let the child kneel on a table; then turn the skirt up and pin or mark the exact length with a piece of tailor's chalk. Another way which will be found to simplify the dreaded ordeal of hanging a skirt, but which should not be depended on as final, is

to baste the waistband of a finished skirt and that of the one being made together and hang the skirt on a skirt hanger; then mark the new skirt at the bottom according to the length of the old one. Baste the skirt up and try on. It will be quite easy to make any little alteration that may be found necessary.

Finger Cakes.

Beat two eggs very light, add one tablespoonful of vanilla and a cup of sugar, reserving two tablespoonfuls. Stir in one cupful of cream of tartar and one-half teaspoonful of soda, adding a half teaspoonful of salt. Add flour to make stiff dough. Roll into a thin sheet, dredge with reserved sugar, pressing it in lightly with rolling pin. Cut into strips a finger in width. Bake light brown in a quick oven, being careful that the strips do not touch one another.

Tomato and Cucumber Salad.

Put lettuce on plates. Peel tomato carefully, cut out the top and scoop out some of the seeds. Dice cucumbers and mix with the dressing. Fill the tomatoes if preferred. Put more dressing over all. Do not put cucumbers in salt water, as they get too soft.

AIDS TO BEAUTY.

At night apply to the nose an ointment made after this formula: One dram of powdered sulphur, two and one-half drams of powdered starch, one and one-half ounces of ointment of zinc oxide and three drops of oil of rose.

A red nose is often the outward sign of a deranged stomach, and the ruddy glow will disappear with the return of normal digestion. Drink hot water every morning before breakfast. Wear loose clothing, for tight lacing will produce this flamboyant condition almost invariably.

The following mixture has been found excellent for the blotting out of moth patches: Thirty grains of bismuth oxide, thirty grains of pulverized starch, one fluid dram of kaolin, two fluid drams of glycerin and two fluid drams of rosewater. Paint the spot with this at bedtime, bathing away next morning.

Living Room.

In a living room where all things receive constant use, and hard use at that, it is often something of a problem to know what to have as covering for the couch cushions, beauty being desired as well as durability. The materials that have proved most satisfactory from every point of view are the art tickings, cretonnes and chintzes. These all stand repeated laundering as well as hard wear. They are pretty and possessed of great variety as to color and design. Stripes, floral designs galore and beautiful Persian patterns may be had in these cottons and linens, and when used in conjunction with each other they make of the living room couch a most cozy and inviting spot, luring the unsuspecting on to many an idle hour.

Dainty Window Curtains.

One can have much prettier window curtains and with the expenditure of less money by making them oneself than by buying them.

Two pairs of beautiful curtains for a bedroom or dining room window may be made of bobbinet worked with luster thread. They are hemmed on both sides and one end with a three-quarter inch hem, but the luster, which is rather coarse, is run in and out through the holes of the net for three or four rows to give the appearance of a wider hem.

Papers Under Mattress.

Lay two thicknesses of newspapers on the bed springs and then lay the mattress on the papers. This keeps the mattress from getting black marks on it. Sometimes in rainy weather the springs get rusty and it gets on the mattress, but if you keep paper on the springs it picks up all the rust.
