

A LAUGHING STOCK

What the Gleaner Thought of McLeod, Pinder, Young and Robison Four Years Ago

(From the Fredericton Gleaner, February 16, 1903.)

The combination that has been put in the field by Mr. James K. Pinder, for the County of York, is the subject of a good deal of amusement in well-informed circles.

The only member of it, who is favorably known in this county is Mr. John A. Young, of Zionville, who is a respectable citizen, although he is in company with some violent and impudent partisans.

A prominent friend of the opposition party, on Saturday, when he saw the alleged convention coming out of the court house said pathetically: "Is this the state the opposition has been reduced to in this county?" It was not to be expected that such a convention would or could select candidates of any weight who would command the confidence of the electors.

Mr. Robison, who hails from Manner-Sutton, has for several years represented the opposition at the poll in his own parish, and has always been so unfortunate as to be defeated, a contingency which is certain to produce bad feeling and recrimination and a lack of confidence in the manner in which Mr. Robison used the "arguments" at his disposal.

It is unnecessary to say anything about Mr. Pinder, except that his heart fairly bleeds for honesty and purity in politics. It is true that Mr. Pinder gets snowed up occasionally on the eve of an election but he has fairly promised Mr. Hazen not to regard the state of the weather on this occasion.

Mr. Pinder, as a candidate, is amusing, and if there are any persons in the county of York who have any confidence in him they have not yet disclosed themselves. The lamentable condition of the Opposition is best shown by the fact that Mr. Pinder, in default of respected men, has become their leader in this county. In fact, Mr. Pinder stated at the convention on Saturday, that if it had not been for him there would not have been any opposition in this county.

Mr. Harry McLeod, who was nominated on Saturday, but hesitated before accepting, was nominated as a matter of form from failure of the convention to find a better man. Mr. Howe, who is well known to the electors, declined to accept the nomination because he knows the contest is hopeless.

And the putting up of such a ticket insures its defeat by a majority which Mr. Alex. Gibson said at the convention of the government party would be about 2,000.

It is perhaps needless to say that the combination is the laughing stock of the city.

AYLESWORTH'S SPEECH.

me from the public platform that there is no truth or foundation for them. If he says that in the witness box he will be the subject of a cross-examination, and I decline to express any opinion as to the result of the case until I have heard Mr. Borden's cross-examination.

He wanted the leader of the Opposition to understand that that if he preferred to fight political battles by such methods as those followed in his speeches at Chatham and elsewhere he need not expect to escape scot free. He would not hesitate to speak his mind to him at any place at any time, before his face or in his absence.

At Peterboro Mr. Borden said that Mr. Aylesworth was a discredit to Canada. On the floor of the House he had told Mr. Borden that he attached very little value to any opinion he might form of him. It might be that (Mr. Aylesworth) had a little prejudice against Mr. Borden because he was a comparatively recent convert to the Conservative faith. In any event, that gentleman was welcome to his opinions. The speaker took comfort in the thought that they were not the opinion of the country. When there was talk of discredit he wanted to know if Mr. Borden was not the man who stood discredited before the people of Canada. As the Conservative leader, he had not been able to find, even in his own native province of Nova Scotia, a single constituency that had any confidence in him. "Is he the man," asked Mr. Aylesworth, "to say that I am a discredit to Canada in my position? I reciprocate the compliment."

Mr. Aylesworth spoke of Hon. Dr. Pugsley's reassertion within the last two days of the charge that in the last elections the Conservative party had, and used, a corruption fund of \$500,000, and the same hon. gentleman's willingness to defend any action for libel in connection with that statement.

PLANNED A COUP D'ETAT.

"With that statement and challenge," said Mr. Aylesworth, "I think I may say to Mr. Borden, cast the beam out of your own eye before you look for the mote in mine." In the 1904 campaign, with the funds then at their disposal, and which they had no difficulty in obtaining, the Conservatives had planned a coup d'etat, by which Mr. Borden and his party were to be exploded into power. They had arranged as part of it the resignation of Mr. Blair.

In his concluding remarks Mr. Aylesworth said that as an illustration of the Conservative preparations for the battle a circular was issued by the organizer in the city of Halifax, after the last elections, asking for subscriptions aggregating \$5,000 a year for each of the five years between elections.

A like amount raised in each constituency would give an aggregate of \$1,000,000 a year. Sir John Macdonald had been turned out of power largely because he had demanded by telegram a modest sum of \$10,000, to be used for election purposes. Mr. Borden was apparently determined to build better even than his great protagonist.
