DIED AT SACKVILLE.

Mrs. Joseph Vandine Passed Away While Visiting her Daughter.

The death occurred at Sackville on Saturday night of Mrs. Vandine, widow of the late Mr. Joseph Vandine, who for some years represented Wellington Ward in the city council. She had been in delicate health for over a year and some months ago went to Sackville to visit her daughter. The change however, failed to prove beneficial, and her death was not a matter of surprise to her friends here. The deceased lady was formerly Miss McCausland and was a native of Ireland, but had made her home here for many years. She was seventy-four years old and is survived by a family of two daughters. Mrs. Palmer wife of Mr. J. M. Palmer, principal of the Sackville Academy, and Miss Minnie Vandine at present residing in Sackville. Mr. Dow Vandine of the customs staff is a brother-in-law of the deceased. The body will arrive here by this evening's train and will be taken to the former home of the deceased on Brunswick Street. The funeral will take place on Wednesday at three o'clock with services by Rev. J. W. McConnell. Interment will be made in the rural cemetery, George W. Adams, undertaker.

AN EXCITING RUNAWAY.
Mr. J. T. G. Hatt's Horse Made Things Lively Saturday Evening.

A spirited horse belonging to Mr. J. T. G. Hatt of Marysville made things kind of lively on Queen Street Saturday evening. 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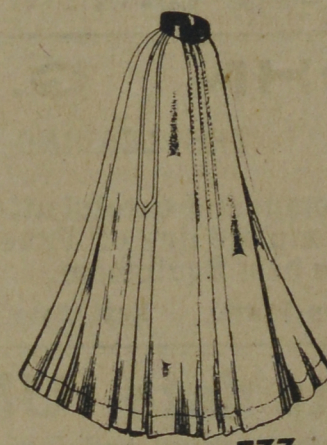
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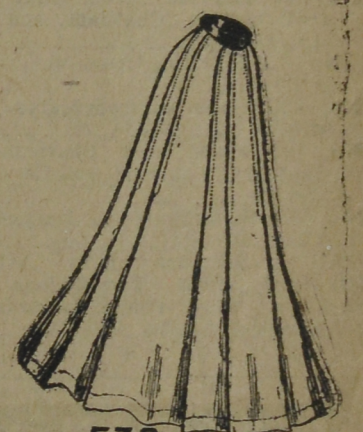
