TRADE RETURNS

Canada's Figures for the Past Year Show Very Gratifying Results

(Special to Herald.)

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 19.—Returns of the foreign trade of the Dominion for the twelve months to the end of June, have been completed by the Trade and Commerce Department, and show a marked increase over the record of 1906.

The imports and exports together amounted to \$612,652,107, which is an increase of \$65,723,069 over the previous year.

The imports of \$354,430,433 represented a gain of \$64,138,025 and the exports of \$258,171,674, a gain of \$1,584,044.

The imports from Great Britain of \$89,067,350 represented a gain of \$18,891,161.

The imports from all British countries together were \$103,857,252, a gain of \$19,771,624. Our imports from the U. S. \$215,739,701 showed a gain of \$39,877,630.

One of the most noteworthy features of the whole returns is the fact that our exports to the Motherland in the period in question, amounting to \$127,901,688 represented a decline of \$5,193,179, where for many years past we have been accustomed to large gains.

CANADIANS BEATEN

Old Countrymen Too Many for Their Opponents at Cricket

Rather unpleasant weather prevailed Saturday afternoon for the cricket match—Canadians vs. the World, but the game went on all the same with rain falling slightly most of the time and the Canadians were vanquished by a score of 59 to 42.

Although the ball was wet all the time and difficult to control, the feature of the match was the excellent bowling of the Fowler brothers for the Canadians and of Meldon and Galloway for the foreigners.

The batting of both teams with the exception of Powell, Etienne, McLeod, Campbell and Ward was rather indifferent, Powell and Etienne gave a good exhibition, scoring respectively 25 and 24.

The old reliable "Tom" Fowler won great applause when he clean bowled Meldon with the second ball, retiring him for nothing. The Canadians feared Mr. Meldon would run up a century as he has often done in first class matches, and their relief was great when he was so quickly retired.

Mr. Meldon however had satisfaction. He is an excellent bowler as well as a splendid batter and he made great havoc among the Canadians' wickets and his one hand catch of a sharp slip off the Mayor's bat was prettily done.

His Worship had a difficult job keeping wickets, facing such swift bowlers as the Fowlers, but he did good work, and made two sharp catches.

The Canadians were captained by Mr. Oxley and the Cosmopolitans by

Capt. the Hon. Thos. Ashburnham. The umpires were, Mr. H. V. B. Bridges and Mr. Geo. N. Babbitt.

CENSURED COMPANY

Coroners' Jury in Inquest on Indiantown Victims Find Derrick Was Not Securely Anchored

NEWCASTLE, N. B., Aug 19.—The coroner's jury in the inquest into the death of Herman O'Brien, William Stewart, and Joseph Czarney, who were killed in the Miramichi Quarr Company's quarry, at Indiantown Friday, after hearing the

evidence, decided that the men were killed by a falling derrick and that the fall of the derrick was due to the giving way of the guy wires through weak anchorage, and that reasonable precaution was not taken by the superintendent of the quarry in putting down the anchorage.

TRAGEDY IN WEST

Owen Fetterman, Farmer, Shot Through Heart When He Was in Bed

LARESHOLM, ALTA., August 19.—Thirty miles east of Nanton is the farm of Owen Fetterman, who early on Monday morning was shot by some person or persons unknown. The story told by the man's wife is that on Monday morning their dog came to the bed where she was lying with her husband and acted as if it wanted to get out. She therefore

arose and went to light the lamp but before she could do so she heard the report of a shot. Lighting the lamp she called to her husband but received no reply and on going over to him she found that he was shot through the head. The wife stated that the window was open just about five inches and that somebody shot her husband from the outside but that she saw nobody.

NOT WORKING WELL.

As was freely predicted at the time the section added to the game law last session giving farmers the right to shoot deer if they were found destroying crops is not working very satisfactorily for the deer. Reports from the upper section of the country are to the effect that quite a number of deer have been slaughtered, and in most cases they had caused no destruction to growing crops whatever. In some localities a deer that ventures out in a pasture field is in great danger of being followed up and killed and a number of such cases are reported. Those who do the shooting evidently take it for granted that the deer has done some damage to crops in the past or might do so if allowed to live and they do not deem it worth while to take any chances in the matter.

SOLDIER BOYS RETURN

H Company of R.C.R. Arrived Home From Petawawa on Sunday Morning

After eight weeks under canvas, the officers and men of H Company of the Royal Canadian Regiment, bronzed and sunburned, arrived home from Petawawa, Ont., at six o'clock Sunday morning. They came in a special train over the I. C. R. from Chatham Junction, the other companies of the regiment continuing on to their headquarters at Halifax.

Notwithstanding the fact that it was Sunday morning, and an early hour when the troops arrived here, the band of the 71st York Regiment was at the depot and played them to the barracks. It was a most thoughtful and kindly act and much appreciated by the officers and men of the permanent corps.

Quartermaster Sergeant Galloway had been notified by wire of the time of arrival of the troops and had the barracks in readiness and a supply of provisions laid in for them. The church parade was left out and most of the men spent the day in the barracks resting after their long railway journey. They left Petawawa on Friday morning and travelled in colonist sleeping cars. Meals were served on the train and everything was done to make them as comfortable as possible.

Ten men were transferred during the camp, so that the strength of the company is now only fifty, exclusive of the officers. Sergt. Major W. Duncan of the Hospital staff remained at Petawawa, and will not return until the artillery camp breaks up sometime next month.

Lieut. Col. Chinn, Major Fiset, Major Bridges and Lieut. duDomeine returned with the company, and the two first named officers are putting up at the Queen Hotel. Mrs. Chinn and Mrs. Fiset are spending the summer in Quebec and their homes are closed up.

The officers of the corps have received no information from headquarters in regard to rumored transfers, and changes, and expect to remain in Fredericton for a time at least. While some of the talk of changes were probably nothing more than canteen gossip, it is quite probable that when the members of the militia council get together there will be something doing in that line. Col. Wadmore, who has been in camp at Petawawa, is said to have been considerably surprised when he read in the newspapers that he was to be sent to Prince Edward Island. A member of the headquarters staff who read the newspapers reports, admitted that some changes were in contemplation, but declined to give out any information.

The camp at Petawawa is generally conceded to have been one of the most successful ever held in Canada, and the men of H Company enjoyed their sojourn there, although they say that the work of training was of a very strenuous nature. They were not allowed beyond the bound of the camp grounds. An athletic club was organized among the troops and cricket, baseball lacrosse and other sports were indulged in nightly on the grounds, providing no lack of amusement. A large proportion of the canteen fund was given away in prizes to the successful competitors in the athletic sports.

Col. Chinn in conversation with a representative of the Herald stated that the report that officers were to be sent here from Halifax probably arose from the fact that both himself and Major Fiset have been granted leave of absence to go into effect in a few days. Lieut. duDomeine is to leave shortly for Kingston for a course of instruction to be absent some weeks. Officers will therefore be sent here from Halifax or some other point to take charge of the depot during the absence of the regular staff.
