

ROYAL MEETING MAKES FOR PEACE

Germany Reassured by King Edward's Visit--Friendship is Restored--Relations Between Kaiser and King Edward Now Cordial

PARIS, August 17.—French opinion generally regards the meeting between King Edward and Emperor William at Wilhelmshohe yesterday as marking another stage in the relaxation of European tensions. Like the Swinemunde meeting and the approaching interview between King Edward and Emperor Francis Joseph at Ischl, the papers think it may be principally important in calming the sensibilities of Germany concerning the series of agreements Great Britain has been completing, and that from this standpoint it will strengthen the peace of Europe. Moreover, yesterday's meeting is contrasted with the handshake between King and the German Kaiser last year at Kronberg, and there is a disposition to consider the Wilhelmshohe meeting as being something in the nature of a genuine reconciliation between the two sovereigns, whose relations heretofore have been notoriously cool. So far as French interests are concerned, the impression prevails that they can not be prejudiced by what occurred at Wilhelmshohe and that they may be advanced especially should circumstance later necessitate a broadening of the mandate which France and Spain received at Algeiras.

GERMANY RECONCILED.

LONDON, August 17.—The morning papers and their German correspondents comment most enthusiastically upon the heartiness of the reception accorded King Edward at Wilhelmshohe yesterday, the friendly character and the success of the meeting, declaring it mark the turning point in the relations between Great Britain and Germany, and is an official endorsement of the reconciliation which for long has been in official progress. The fact is recalled that only two years ago on the occasion of a similar journey of King Edward, the relations between Great Britain and Germany were so strained that His Majesty was not able

to make a halt in German territory. Special satisfaction is felt here at the fact that Emperor William expressed his personal disappointment in King Edward's arrival, because it would shorten the already brief time he was able to spend with the British Monarch, as well as with Chancellor von Buelow, who publicly expressed opinion that the meeting of yesterday was an evidence that the relations between the two countries were daily growing better.

A FRIENDLY PARTING.

CASSEL, August 17.—King Edward left Wilhelmshohe this evening shortly after midnight. His visit with Emperor William was of short duration, but nevertheless it is regarded as most important, and it is stated in well informed political circles that in the course of the conversation between the two monarchs the political situation was discussed in the most friendly terms. Prince von Buelow and Sir Charles Harding also had a long and earnest conversation, and it is the general opinion that the results of the visit will be far-reaching, and place the relations of Great Britain and Germany on a better footing.

The toasts at the dinner in the palace were most cordial. Emperor William thanked King Edward warmly for his visit which, he said, he regarded as an expression of the most friendly feeling. He then referred to the good relations which always existed between the two countries during the reigns of King Frederick and Queen Victoria, and concluded by saying he considered that King Edward represented the English nation, and that his visit was an expression of the desire for a good understanding between the two nations. King Edward replied that his dearest wish was to see good relations between the German and English peoples, and he assured the Emperor that on the occasion of his coming visit to England he would receive a most hearty and popular welcome.

FARM LABORERS' EXCURSION.

Advises just received by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company indicate that the wheat crop of Manitoba and the Canadian Northwest will though not as heavy as last year owing to the increased acreage under cultivation equal the enormous harvest of last season. The call of the West for help is one that must be heeded—for upon it depends largely the growth and development of our country.

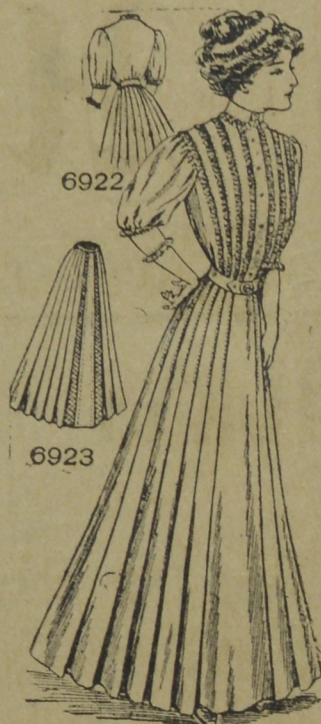
A Farm Laborers' excursion will be run from all points in Nova Scotia, and from points in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island on Tuesday, August 20th. One way second class tickets to Winnipeg will be sold from coupon ticket stations. The rate from C. P. R. lines in New Brunswick will be \$12.00 going and \$18.00 returning. From points on I. C. R. lines in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, also from points on the P. E. I. R. the rate will be \$13.50 going and \$19.50 returning. Tickets will be sold to female as well as to male laborers, but tickets will not be sold at half rate to children. (See advertisement in this issue.) With each ticket purchaser will receive a verification certificate with an extension coupon, which when signed at Winnipeg by a farmer showing the holder has engaged to work as a farm laborer, will be honored prior to September 30th, for a free ticket to any station in Manitoba or Saskatchewan southwest, northwest, or west of Winnipeg, to and including Moosejaw, Swan River and Kamsack. From these points to Calgary and McLeod, including Strathcona and McLeod branches, tickets will be issued at one cent per mile. If on arrival at Western destination, verification certificate is deposited with agent and holder works at least thirty days as a farm laborer, he will be issued on or before Nov. 30th, 1907 second class ticket from Moosejaw, Swan River, Kamsack, and any station East there in territory mentioned, to original starting point in the East by same route as travelled on the going journey on payment of the returning rate as shown above, and from stations

A dress built on these lines which is suited to development in any of the fabrics, silks, mohairs or light-weight worsteds has its waist and skirt laid in plaits, those of the waist turning out prettily finished with narrow pleated frills of a contrasting fabric. For mohair, which will be much worn during the coming weeks, the frills should be of tulle, these being pretty upon the cuffs as well. 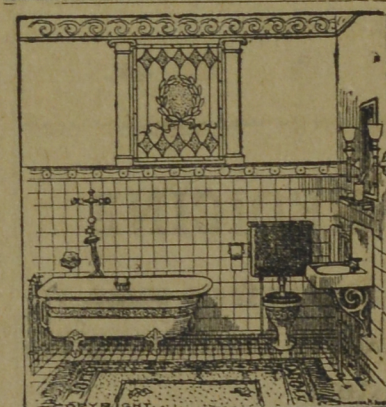
