A SHOCKING CHARGE.

Rev. Canon Welch Accuses Toronto Society Women of Drunkenness.

TORONTO, Oct. 8. (Special)—A solemn and impressive warning against the evils of intemperance was sounded by Rev. Canon Welch in the sermon which he preached to the troops of the local garrison and the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company of Massachusetts at the service held in the Massey Hall yesterday. Canon Welch quoted figures from the chief constable's report showing that the arrests for drunkenness in Toronto had more than

doubled within the past six years, and described the growth of intemperance as an alarming feature of Canadian life. He commented upon the grave amount of excessive drinking among women, and remarked that it was not an unknown thing for members of Toronto society to drink themselves at dances and entertainments into a state in which they were unfit for the company of respectable women. That, he maintained, could be stopped by the women of society if they chose.

AMAZING METHODS.

Toronto Globe Criticizes Management of C. P. R. Telegraph Company.

TORONTO, Ont., October 4.—The Globe says: "The conduct of the C. P. R. Telegraph Company, in its relations with the press of Western Canada is a fair illustration of that amazing business folly which is often met with in men responsible for the management of large business enterprises. There is no other folly quite so foolish in the whole business world. This is especially true in the case of enterprises that depend on the good will of the public, either

for profitable patronage or for charter privileges. The men in charge may have a large capacity and effectiveness within the limits of their special fields of business operations, but in their dealings with the public they are often as short-sighted as children and quite as unreasonable. "This controversy of the C. P. R. Telegraph Company provides an instance. Here is a great corporation chartered by parliament to give a service to the public. A portion of its business in the furnishing of a telegraphic news service to the press. Partly because of the increase of the volume of commercial telegraph business and partly for other reasons, the management decided to increase the rates to newspapers, in some cases as much as three hundred per cent. Such increases, and especially the way in

which they were made, were not only unjust and burdensome, but were provocative of criticism. The company was criticized by the press, and in at least one instance the service was withdrawn and would not be restored unless the newspaper gave a written guarantee not to criticise the conduct of the company.

"Now could anything be more foolish, even from a business point of view, and the essence of the folly is that such conduct creates and confirms public opinion in favor of the nationalization of the telegraph service in Canada as was done years ago in England. A few more pieces of business arrogance of this sort will be sufficient to make this item in the Globe's policy a strong and firm plank in the Liberal platform, and a determining object in public opinion.

"A folly of the same narrow visioned and reactionary kind is sometimes proposed by some high tariff extremists among the manufacturers. It is suggested that the extreme protectionists in the Canadian Manufacturers' Association agree to withhold all advertising from newspapers like the Globe, because of their opposition to the high tariff propaganda of a few protected manufacturers. That would indeed be the height of business folly from which the manufacturers of Canada, if they really value the privileges secured to them by a protective tariff, might well pray to be delivered.

"If there is one thing needed to arouse indignation in the good-natured purchasing public, the wage earners, salaried classes, farmers, millers, lumbermen and fishermen, who have borne with considerable patience the burdens imposed for the sake of the manufacturers that one thing is a high tariff demand from a few prosperous and protected industries, accompanied by a boycott on the part of their managers of the newspapers that will not join in the high protectionist campaign. That would be 'Herman's gallows' in dead certainty, and the boycott would be an inescapable noose."
