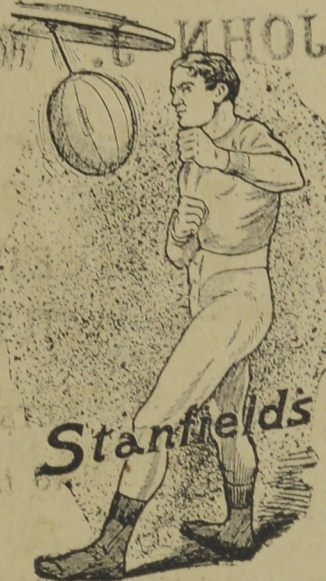

HOW TYPHOID IS SPREAD.

Brooklyn Physician Points out that Whatever Disease is Infectious is also Preventable.

"Typhoid Fever and Other Infectious Diseases. How they are spread," was the subject of a paper by Dr. Thomas Darlington, Commissioner of Health for the city of New York, delivered last night in the Library Building of the Kings County Medical Society before a large and appreciative audience and was the first of a series of the lectures on medical topics of general interest given under the joint auspices of the Kings County Medical Society and the Brooklyn Institute. Dr. G. R. Butler, the president of the society, in introducing Dr. Darlington, said that he was glad to see such a large attendance, as it was the intention of the society to make these lectures an annual affair if they were appreciated by the public.

"In speaking on the subject of infectious diseases one should have the fact firmly fastened in his mind that the statement that a disease is of an infectious character carries with it the thought that it is also absolutely preventable," were the opening remarks of Dr. Darlington. The speaker went on to say that quarantine and fumigation were absolutely necessary in the warfare against infectious diseases. Typhoid was due to carelessness and bad sanitary conditions. These were capable of being remedied. Infected water was one of the principal sources of typhoid, then came milk and food.

The doctor advised that it was a safe proposition here in Brooklyn that all water should be boiled for drinking purposes this fall, and especially when well water was used.

He argued strongly for a filtration plant to meet the requirements of the city. He deplored that everything in the way of a needed improvement for the city moved so slowly. If anything is wanted for the public benefit here in the city, obstacles are more common than assistance. So far in Manhattan there have been 1,500 cases of typhoid fever this year. Brooklyn shows a decrease; there were 1,900 in 1905, 1,200 in 1906, and this year, so far, there have been 600. Other sources of typhoid were oysters—where the fattening beds were near sewers—and uncleanness. He pointed out that there was no danger from association with typhoid patients if a reasonable amount of cleanliness was observed. Another source of typhoid was that of bathing near the outlet of sewers. Bathers invariably get water in their mouths when swimming, and thus become infected. Dr. Darlington claimed that a large percentage of the cases of typhoid fever were due to outside sources, especially where patients had been away from the city for the summer and had become infected. This was one reason why typhoid was so prevalent in the fall. He advised the use of carbolic acid freely, as the very best disinfectant.

Books used in the sickroom, in the case of measles, scarlet fever or diphtheria should be burned, as it was almost impossible to properly fumigate them.

Co-operation of each individual and physician is necessary in the community to assure its efforts of ideal attainment. Co-operation can only be reached by educating the public as to its vital importance.

TRAIN CHANGES.

The new time-tables on the I.C.R. and C.P.R. will go into effect on Sunday next, the 13th inst. It is probable that there will be no radical change in the time of the arrival and departure of trains on the C.P.R. here. On the main line that company will continue to run the Boston and Montreal trains separately during the winter, instead of having only one train as last year.

The I.C.R. people here have as yet had no word as to the nature of the changes in their time table. It may be that the express for Chatham Junction will leave here at five o'clock p. m. instead of 6.30, as at present.

Dr. J. R. Inch returned today from a trip to Montreal and Toronto.

Dr. W. J. Irvine, the popular dentist, returned by the noon train today from a fortnight's trip to the middle west, and contrary to expectations of some of his friends he returned alone.
