

SIR WILFRID LAURIER.

Mr T P O'Connor, Famous Journalist and M P, Draws Interesting Sketch of the Canadian Premier.

This is how Mr. T. B. O'Connor, the witty Irishman, who recently visited Canada, and who has been the pioneer in the journalism of anecdote, sketches Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in P. T. O., his new weekly. After speaking of the cares of Government, Mr. O'Connor says:—

"And now what manner of man is he who bears upon his shoulders the Atlantic burden? The best description I ever heard of Sir Wilfrid Laurier was given to me by a very interesting Canadian personality, Mr. Ross, who was for many years Prime Minister of the Province of Ontario. 'Sir Wilfrid Laurier,' said this dour, grained, kindly, shrewd old Scotch Canadian, 'is a picture gallery all in him self.' This praise—which will always remember as witty and picturesque—gives you some idea of the impression which the appearance of Sir Wilfrid Laurier makes upon you. He is like some splendid portrait that has walked down from the walls of a mediaeval French chateau and is again stalking the earth. You could never mistake him for anything but a man of French blood. Nor could you, at the same time, ever take him for a modern Frenchman. With all his intensely progressive and broad spirit, Sir Wilfrid looks the man of the chateau and of the eighteenth century. The Frenchman born before the French Revolution; one who had exchanged repast with Voltaire, who had smiled benignly at some of Voltaire's jokes on the gullibility of mankind.

Imagine a very tall a very slight, almost bony figure; imagine a face exactly the same—that is to say, long, narrow and bony—and you will have some idea of what Sir Wilfrid Laurier is like in the flesh. There is not a spare ounce on that body, which, nevertheless, seems as alert and enduring as that of some deerhound. The face seems to concentrate itself in the mouth usually of the orator—mobile, slightly pursed. The face is clean shaven which also gives a certain look at once of academic distinction and of eighteenth century character. You could take him, for a great scientific scholar, for professor of letters, for a high ecclesiastic—one who was a cardinal, and might be a pope; or you might fancy that he was a brilliant wit and encyclopaedist—one of the band that prepared the French revolution. You could take him for many things, but never for anything that was not intellectual, distinguished and well born.

And there is about the whole man a certain trimness and precision which are almost suggestive of France and of the eighteenth century. He dresses with a perfect appropriateness to his figure, his face, and even his position. The coat is usually a frock coat with spangly tails; the waistcoat—if I remember rightly—is somewhat low cut, and his collars are, in their way, as prominent and remarkable as those

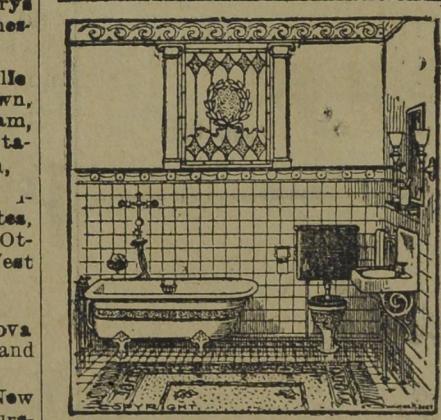

WASHADEMOAK DROWNING.

George Smith Lost His Life While Swimming in the River—Brother Was Burned in Crystal Stream.

George Smith, aged 25 years was drowned in the Washademook river, Queens Co. while swimming at this place Monday morning.

The young man with his younger brother, Ira, had been working in the hay field, and getting very warm, the two went down to the river for a swim. They entered the water while in an over-heated condition.

George started to swim out to a post that was sticking up some distance from the shore, but when about half way he gave a little yell and sank, before his brother could make any attempt to save him. He never came up. Ira Smith could swim a little, but not enough to dive for his brother, so he rushed away for help. There were no

neighbors, however, and it was some time before anyone was informed of the accident. As soon as possible a number of people assembled, and with grappling irons started to search for the body. It was soon recovered, and the coroner having viewed it decided that an inquest was unnecessary. The deceased, who was a successful farmer at McDonald's Corner, was a native of Shannon, where his mother and two sisters live. He was married on last September to Miss Lucy Beloe. His death is particularly sad, owing to the fact that his brother Fred, who was a deckhand on the steamer Crystal Stream, lost his life in the fire which destroyed that boat at Cole's Island a few weeks nearago.

THE C. P. R.'S NEW ONE.

A third Trans-Continental train has been inaugurated on the Canadian Pacific Railway, running three times a week, leaving Montreal on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays at 12.30 noon during July and August, covering the distance to Vancouver in a little over three and a half days, stopping only at most important points. They call it the "Trans-Canada Limited" and it is composed of the latest built and newest designed sleeping and dining cars—beautiful and luxurious, and affording all possible comfort.

Only first class sleeping car passengers are carried on this train, which makes close connections at Moosejaw with the new electric lighted Spokane train operated via the Crow's Nest Pass and Kingsgate.

A despatch from Vancouver states that Esquimaux, which was some time ago abandoned as a British naval station, is likely to again become a naval base. The announcement is

made that the British government has decided to store twenty-five thousand tons of Cardiff smokeless coal at Esquimaux as a precautionary measure. The first two shipments are already enroute. It is thought in Vancouver that the eastern war loud and the transfer of an American squadron to the Pacific may result in a rearrangement of Britain's naval force there.
