CONTEMPTIBLE CAMPAIGN.

From a miserable little Tory sheet, published in the obscure town of Magog, Quebec, Mr. Hazen's Fredericton organ extracts and publishes under scare heads, the lying announcement that New Brunswick is practically bankrupt; that banks and other financial institutions refuse to advance the government money, and a lot of other falsehoods too palpable to be worth denial.

The scandalous statements made in Mr. Hazen's sheet to injure the credit of this province are so clearly dishonest and malicious that people decline to entertain any belief in them, and no newspaper of any standing or respectability has cared to repeat them, but that kind of work is left to the scavengers of the Tory party.

The credit of the Province of New Brunswick never stood higher than it does today. It has assets in cash on deposit with the government at Ottawa, in valuable crown lands and other property that would pay the public debt twice over. Its various services are honestly and economically administered, and all the Tory falsehoods of threatened bankruptcy, of graft, etc. will not weaken the standing of this province in the financial markets, because the motive at the bottom of these attacks is so apparent.

Time and again New Brunswick has refused by overwhelming majorities to entrust the reins of government to the Tory party, and it has been so long in opposition and is so ravenous for the flesh pots, that its minions will stop at no falsehood, however glaring, to score a point against the administration.

In the legislature, where such charges can be promptly met and answered, Mr. Hazen and his friends dare not make the statements which their low down newspapers are scattering over the country. In all the years that they have had opportunities of making and proving their charges, they have utterly failed to establish one single instance of dishonesty or graft on the part of the government, but what they had not the courage to charge when face to face with the administration, their irresponsible and characterless newspapers are insinuating with the hope that some of the mud will stick.

NOT FOR SALE.

Three years ago it was Mr. David Russell who undertook the contract to turn New Brunswick over to the Tory party, but he failed to deliver the goods, has sold his newspapers and retired from the political field. Now it is another millionaire who seeks the same object, and he has lately come into possession of Mr. Russell's newspapers. While Mr. Borden and other Tories are shouting for clean elections and clean politics, their agents, with the gold, are laying plans along other lines.

New Brunswick is not for sale to the Tory party, and the millionaires may as well adapt themselves to the real conditions. Not all the wealth of the Nevada mines will be able to turn this province over to the Tory party, even when supported by flopping newspapers which change their politics with their varying financial needs.

CURRENT COMMENT.

The Tories are seeking to purify New Brunswick politics with McKane's "barrel," the Russell treasury being no longer available.

The Telegraph has taken the hint thrown out by The Herald. In its issue to-day its editorials deal with Canadian questions, the American feature being relegated to the rear.

The New Freeman is to absorb the Monitor, of St. John. Mr. T. O'Brien, editor of the latter, taking the position of business manager of the new publication.

It is said that Mrs. Harry K. Thaw will return to the stage. What a pity she ever left it, if remaining at her profession would have saved the world the nauseous revelations of the White murder and her husband's trial.

Mr. Hazen is taking to the stump in Westmorland, where he has about as much chance of carrying a seat as the Tories have of ever becoming a high-minded and honorable party. Will he take Millionaire McKane along with him to dazzle the people with his gold?

The editor of The Telegraph renews the expression of his delight at the stoppage of a water pipe leak in Fredericton. It is refreshing to observe the Telegraph taking interest in New Brunswick affairs, even if only the repair of a water pipe, but its joy may be discounted by the remembrance that if it had its way there would be little use for water as a thirst satisfier.

Mr. Powell, who was defeated and driven out of Westmorland, by the Liberals, is beginning to sit up and take notice again, revived by a look into the McKane treasury. It was during the last federal campaign that Mr. Powell thought he was going to be minister of railways, but not only was his party badly beaten at the polls all over Canada, but he was defeated in his own constituency by nearly 1000 majority. Shortly afterwards Mr. Powell gathered up his goods and chattels and removed to St. John.

The St. John Times says that the Liberal newspapers, including The Herald, which are attacking Mr. McKane's newspapers for their sudden flop, dare not impugn British connection, which is one of the planks in the floppers' platform. Great Scott! Is British connection in such a perilous condition in Canada that it must look for defence in newspapers purchased with Yankee gold? Why do not the Telegraph and Times add the Magna Charter to their declaration of principles.

The new management of the Telegraph has evidently decided to wipe out the American tendency of that paper's editorial columns during the past few years, and in a prominent place is given as one plank of the paper's platform "British connection." The editorial staff may find it hard to quit themselves of the American tendency, but its members should, by reading up a bit, be able to find live Canadian and British topics for discussion.

Housekeepers who are familiar with the name of Cross and Blackwell, of London, a firm that sends its preserved goods, such as jam and pickles, all over the world, will be interested in learning that the junior partner of the firm, Mr. T. F. Blackwell, died recently, at the age of sixty-nine years, after a remarkably successful career. The business of the firm dates back two hundred and one years, having been founded in 1706. It employs over 2,000 people, who have their own athletic and recreation clubs, and their own savings bank and allows 5½ per cent on all deposits—2½ per cent more than the inducement to thrift offered by the state.

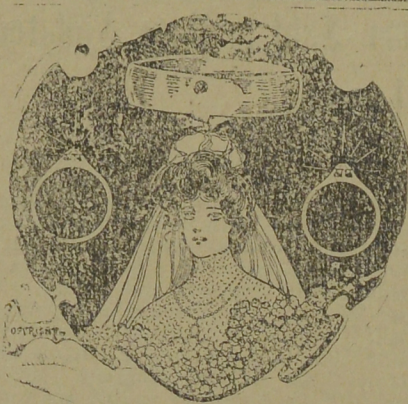

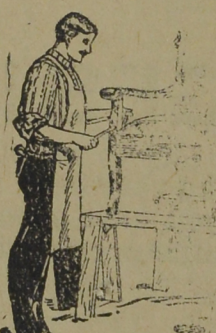
