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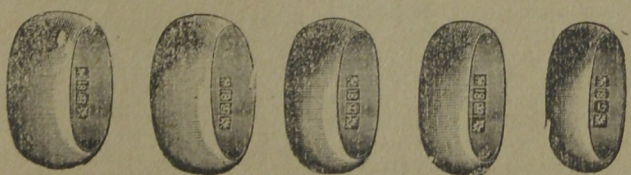

NIAGARA FALLS FRAUD

Erlanger, Confidence Man, Arraigned on Charge of Obtaining Money Under False Pretences

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Sept. 3.—Jacques Erlanger, who is alleged to have conducted a gigantic swindle here, was arraigned in the police court on a charge of obtaining money under false pretences and remanded.

The police are getting deeper into the case, and have secured evidence which seems to indicate that Erlanger has been engaged in other business of very questionable character in New York and Boston.

At one time Erlanger posed as king of astrologists.

It may be that there is such a man as Rogers, but the police have not located him.

Erlanger is a native of southeastern Europe, and has correspondents in Bucharest and other cities.

SACRIFICED HERSELF

Quebec Woman While Demented Burned Herself to Death

MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 3.—Believing that she had been directed by Christ to die as Joan of Arc died, Mrs. Joseph LaFonde, of St. Lazarre, near Vaudreuil, burned herself to death yesterday.

The woman went out to a hill

near the village and built a funeral pyre, hung her clothing on the surrounding bushes, and stepping into the fire, stood amid the flames till death ended her sufferings.

Coroner McMahon, of Montreal, after inquiry, reported that she had committed suicide while temporarily insane.

STAY OF PROCEEDINGS

Halifax Election Trials Are Again Hung Up

HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 3.—The trial of the election petition against William Roche and Michael Carney was resumed in this city to-day, and also the counter petition brought by Wm. Roche against R. L. Borden and J. C. O'Mullin.

A great number of subpoenas have been issued. Among the more notable men who have been served with subpoenas in the case of Roche vs. Borden are Wm. MacKenzie, head of the MacKenzie & Mann system; David Russell, of Montreal; E. L. Pease, general manager of the Royal Bank of Canada; H. V. Meredith, manager of the Montreal branch of the Bank of Montreal.

HALIFAX, N. S., Sept. 3.—The election court today granted a stay in the trial of the election petitions against Messrs. Roche, Carney, Borden and O'Mullin, as the appeal taken to the Supreme Court of Canada is still pending.

LAST SAD TRIBUTE

Remains of Late Ald. Hanlon Followed to the Grave by Many Citizens

The funeral of the late Ald. James D. Hanlon was held from his late home on King street at nine o'clock Monday morning, and was attended by a large and representative body of citizens, showing the great esteem in which the deceased was held in the community. THE HOSPITAL BOARD

Complaints Made Against Employes to be Fully Investigated

The regular meeting of the hospital trustees was held at the hospital last evening, when Senator Thompson presided, and the other trustees present were: Vice president Allen, Mr. Tennant, Mr. Kitchen, Mr. Bliss, Dr. VanWart, Judge Barry and the secretary treasurer.

At this meeting the medical staff was invited to talk over matters or present suggestions. The staff was represented by Dr. G. J. McNally and Dr. R. H. McGrath.

Matters concerning the hospital were discussed, and in response to the president for suggestions from the staff, Dr. McNally read from the minute book the following: That the operating room be enlarged so as to include another room for convenience of patients and surgeon; that a private patient entering the hospital and asking advice as to what physician is best to employ, that in such case the visiting physician for the

month be recommended; that the matron and head nurse be one person; that a strong room be provided for a patient who may become violent; that the fee for ward patients be reduced to three dollars, that a small room in front of the building now charged seven dollars per week be reduced to five dollars.

Some of the suggestions seemed to be favorably received but others were said to be impracticable.

The members of the board promised to carefully consider the suggestions and the members of the staff then withdrew.

In view of sundry rumors heard by some of the trustees reflecting upon the internal management of the hospital it was decided to invite complaints or charges against any of the officials, and a most thorough investigation will be held by the trustees at the hospital on Thursday evening of this week.
