

THE NEW MINISTERS

Hon. Dr. Pugsley Talks of the Distinguished Honor Extended Through Him to New Brunswick

OTTAWA, Ont., August 31.—management of the Intercolonial, which has become such an important factor in the development of trade between the Maritime Provinces and the west.

Hon. William Pugsley was sworn in as Minister of Public Works, and George P. Graham was sworn in as Minister of Railways and Canals, yesterday at 1 p. m. The oath was administered by the clerk of the privy council, Rudolphe Boudreau, in the presence of Earl Grey and Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Your correspondent had an interview yesterday with Hon. Mr. Pugsley shortly after he had been sworn in as Minister of Public Works. Questioned regarding the portfolio of Railways and Canals to which it had been pretty generally stated in the press he would be likely assigned, Dr. Pugsley said that he felt sure that neither the people of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island or Quebec who are more especially interested in the Intercolonial Railway by reason of its traversing those provinces nor the people of the rest of Canada, who are also deeply concerned in the progressive movement of Canada's national railway, will have reason to regret the selection of Hon. Geo. P. Graham as Minister. From his short acquaintance of Mr. Graham and from what he had learned of his ability and business capacity, he felt sure that the new minister's management of the Department of Railways and Canals would amply justify Sir Wilfrid's choice. It was not at all inappropriate that the minister should be chosen from Ontario, that province being the arduous duties of his position not only interested in the enlargement, improvement and application to the work of the extension of the canal system, department and a proper recognition of the claims of the different sections of the Dominion to problem of cheap transportation, but also in the successful solution.

BALLOONIST DROPPED TWO THOUSAND FEET AND LIVES

Professor Maloney had a Miraculous Escape From Death at County Fair When Parachute Failed to Work

BARNSTABLE, Mass., Aug. 31.—Nearly five thousand people at the annual county fair saw Professor Maloney, a balloonist, drop 2,000 feet to the earth, strike on the top of a cedar fence post, and escape probably with his life.

Maloney made his ascent as usual late this afternoon and as the visitors at the fair grounds gazed heavenward they saw that his attempts to cut his parachute were fruitless. A sharp easterly wind had twisted the rope which connects with the knife among the mass of cord, and out of reach of the balloonist, Fortunately two miles Maloney floated along. The hot air was rapidly leaking from the big bag above him and he prepared for the long drop.

Maloney and the balloon came eastward rapidly. As it neared the earth the canvas fell about the body of the aeronaut and prevented him from seeing where he was falling. He struck on top of a big cedar post, used by the farmers hereabouts to mark off their fields.

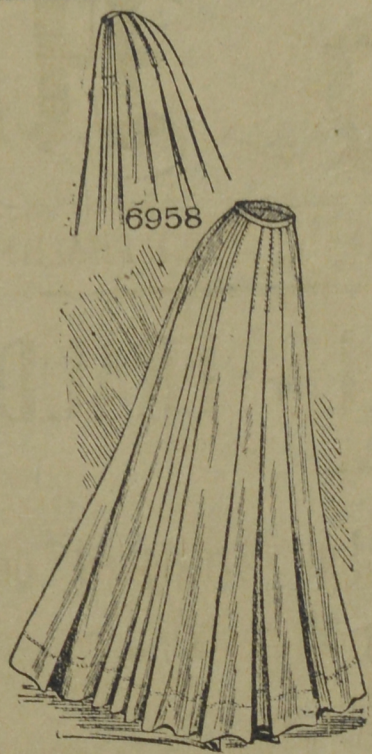
Luckily he did not fall squarely, but struck in a standing position. His back was terribly torn and his left arm was badly injured.

A GRACEFUL WALKING SKIRT.

The present season has produced no more attractive skirt than the 7 gored, tucked-plaited model displayed in the accompanying drawing. It possesses, too, the rather uncommon advantage of being equally becoming to slender or stout figures. The effect of combined smartness and elegance is achieved largely by the arrangement of the plait, a graduated teple box plait ornamenting both front and back, with two groups of tuck plaits appear between The plaits are stitched in position over the hips, and below are permitted to hang in free, well-creased folds. The wide hem is finished simply with a double row of stitching. As illustrated the skirt is cut to round length and made of navy blue panama; but the pattern may be adjusted to either short round or in-step length, if desired; while it may be developed with admirable effect in linen, taffeta, brilliantine or serge. For the medium size 8 yards of 44 inch material will be needed. 6958-7 sizes, from 20 to 32 inches waist measure.

A good way in which to keep water cold in hot weather is to take a thin glass jug or bottle and wrap a piece of well-wetted linen (or a stocking leg) tightly around it. Fill the bottle with cold water and stand it in a shallow dish filled with water. Place the whole in the shade where there is a draft, if possible, and the contents will remain cold for a long time. If the linen around the bottle becomes dry before the water is used the linen should be moistened again.

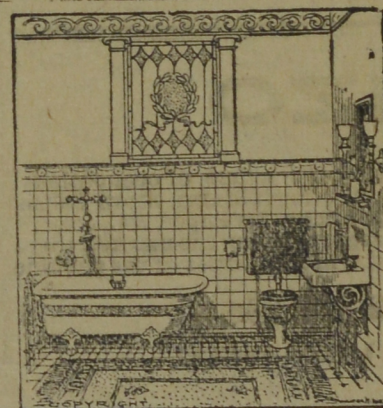
