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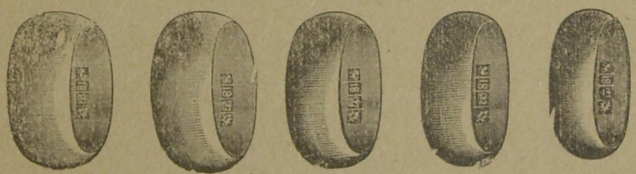

## JAPANESE QUESTION

Dominion Government likely to Appoint a Commission of Enquiry.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 1.—(Special.)—It is probable that the Dominion government will appoint a commission to enquire into the business methods of Japanese immigration companies operating here.

Commissioner King intimated yesterday that upon his return to Ottawa he would make representations to the government to have a commission appointed.

"It is very much in the interests of the government," said the commissioner, "that the subject should be fully considered, and I felt it my duty to make representations to that effect. The sooner an inquiry is held the better for his country, and for Japan."

Mr. King did not cease in his labors yesterday. A feature of the proceedings was a protest by Duncan, counsel for the Japanese government, against the commissioner enquiring too closely into the methods. Duncan declared this is out of the scope of the commission.

The protest ensued on the admission by an official of the Japanese company, that the Japanese were brought to Canada under agreement to supply railway contractors with men.

The commissioner said he could not understand why Duncan would raise the objection, the interests of both governments were to have the facts brought out.

## THE SCHOOL BOARD

Trustees not in a Receptive Mood at Last Monthly Meeting

The regular monthly meeting of the school board was held on Wednesday afternoon, Dr. Atherton presiding. The others present were Messrs. John J. Weddall, A. A. Sterling, J. T. Sharkey, W. Kitchen, Dr. VanWart and Mrs. W. G. Clarke.

An application from the teachers of the High school, backed by a petition from eighty parents, asking for change in the hour of opening and closing of the afternoon session of the High school, was read and discussed at some length. A majority of the trustees decided that it would not be advisable to make the change at the present time. The petitioners asked that the opening hour be made 1.30 instead of 2, and that the school close at 3.30 o'clock instead of 4. It was contended that by closing the school at 3.30 the pupils would have a better opportunity for recreation than is now afforded. The trustees did not agree with this view, and bowed out the application.

A requisition from the High school teachers asking permission to engage Mr. Hagerman to teach a special class in drawing in connection with High school was also turned down. The High school teachers also made application to have music taught in their departments, but the trustees, by almost a unanimous vote, refused the request.

A letter was read from Manager Sharp of the Bank of B. N. A., notifying the board that in future the bank would charge 6 per cent on overdrafts instead of 5 per cent.

An application was read from the teacher at Doak Settlement for a fifty dollar increase of salary, but no action was taken.

Secretary Sampson announced that he had received through Senator Thompson a number of valuable maps for the use of the schools. He was instructed to convey to the Senator the thanks of the board.

On account of today being a feast day in St. Dunstan's church Principal Hughes of the Regent street school was given permission to hold school on Saturday instead of Friday.

## PRISONER ESCAPED

Man Charged with P. O. Burglary broke out of Digby Jail.

ST. JOHN, Nov. 1.—(Special.)—Chas. Elderkin, in Digby, N. S., jail on a charge of burglarizing the Weymouth Bridge post office, escaped last night, and his whereabouts is unknown.

Elderkin has been alone in the cell since Tuesday. Last night he removed a portion of the floor, let himself down through the hole, then removed the stones from the basement wall, and fled.

## HALLOWE'EN CELEBRATION.

The regular police were assisted by several special constables, the old canon and Bdrns monument being special objects for their vigilance. ## BRAVO! U. N. B.

Boys of College Hill Whitewashed the much Vaunted Mount Allison Football Team

Score 3 to 0 in a game that was full of Sensational Incidents

HIGH SCHOOL DEFEATED ST. JOHN MICMACS.

Yesterday will remain a red letter day in the history of U. N. B. football.

After a good clean game in the King-Richardson trophy series, the University boys got a verdict of 3 to 0 over the crack team from Mt. Allison University, Sackville. The visitors came with full expectations of victory.

They had been very successful thus far this season, and the record of games between the two New Brunswick colleges may possibly have made them a little confident.

During the past fifteen years Mt. Allison has lost but twice to the U. N. B.

As for yesterday's game it might be said that the local Varsity boys hoped for rather than expected victory. Among the sporting fraternity some betting was indulged in with the odds in favor of Mt. Allison.

As the teams lined up the visitors were noticeably heavier men, but this seemed to give them little or no advantage in the scrimmage.

They were very good on the tackle, but scarcely equal to the U. N. B. boys in passing. The latter were ably supported by their full back McKnight. He had little to do in the first half, but in the second, time and time again returned the ball to his opponents' territory, before it could be followed up to advantage. Baird and Dever both did excellent work as halves, and Capt. Rutledge did some star playing as quarter. In the scrimmage Deedes was a whole team.

The visitors had two good quarters, Russell and Llewellyn. Graham of the forward line, also came in for very favorable comment.

## THE GAME

The game was called at three o'clock, the U. N. B. taking the kick off, but the ball was quickly returned by the visitors to the twenty-five yard line.

In this vicinity it remained during almost the entire first half. There were no long runs and few kicks; most of the work was in the scrimmage. Baird and Dever were alert, but the visitors were very aggressive, and by a series of short plays worked the ball towards the U. N. B. touch line. McKay made a clever pass to Fawcett, who succeeded in gaining several yards for his team. A scrimmage followed near the touch line, which gave the home team an advantage.

Rutledge got the ball, made a short run and passed to Kinghorn. He also made considerable headway before being tackled. A penalty kick at this point returned the ball dangerously near the U. N. B. goal.

Several times it looked as if the visitors would score, and it was a great relief to the University supporters when half time was called. The half was easily Mt. Allison's but a slight breeze and the sun was in their favor.

## THE SECOND HALF.

During the second half the playing was more open. The halves and quarters of both teams had a chance to show what they could do. A few minutes after resuming play Colter followed up a good play from the Varsity backs and secured a touch down. Rutledge failed to convert this try into a goal, and the score thus far was 3 to 0. For a few minutes the visitors seemed to have lost their heads, but soon recovered their equilibrium and made a desperate effort to tie the score.

They worked the ball to their op-

ponents' territory, but McKnight ably defended the U. N. B. goal and prevented a move.

Score 3 to 0 for the U. N. B. When the close of the game was announced there was intense enthusiasm over the U. N. B.'s victory.

Cheer after cheer went up from their supporters among the six hundred spectators.

The members of the team were carried off the field and Captain Rutledge posed for a photograph on the shoulders of his admirers.

W. F. Carney, of Moncton, son of Mr. Carney, M. P. of Halifax, formerly of the Dalhousie team, referred in a manner satisfactory to players and spectators. Smith of Mt. Allison, and Ruggles of the U. N. B., were tough judges.

There were fully 600 spectators at the game, and while of course the bulk of the people wildly cheered U. N. B., the Mount Allison team had quite a bunch of friends, and their colors were strongly in evidence.

Previous to the opening of the game the U. N. B. students, led by Stanley Bridges, marched around the field singing College songs, in which it was announced in various ways that Mount A. would bite the dust. Their mascot was Ald. Jewett's goat bedecked with the U. N. B. colors, and even the little animal seemed to catch the spirit of the jubilation when the game was over. The students, after the march around, took up a position at the west end of the grand stand, and cheered their comrades to victory with their
