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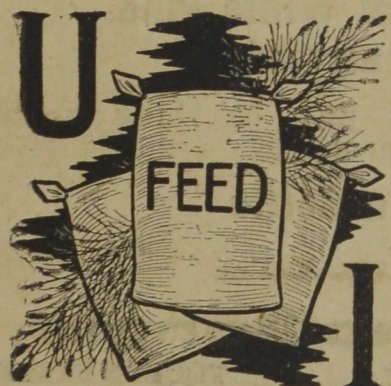

A STRATEGIC GIRDLE.

The Imperial Value of the All-Red Route.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—Hon. Clifford Sifton addressed the Liberal Colonial Club at Prince's Restaurant on the all-red route yesterday. He said the scheme justified itself on commercial and high political grounds. He pointed out that twenty-four knot steamers of 20,000 tons were quite feasible for the Atlantic section, and showed that there was considerably less fog than on the New York route. The ice was not dangerous, and the navigation of the St. Lawrence was not difficult and was constantly being improved. He dwelt emphatically upon the Imperial value of the route as a strategic girdle for the empire, and an easily protected food route. He declared it would undoubtedly prove a considerable success from the trade view point. All the governments were committed to the principle, and he anticipated an early and favorable reply respecting the feasibility of the scheme from his home government. Even if the scheme didn't materialize now, it would in the near future.

Hon. William Pember Reeves committed New Zealand to the proposal, which was also favored by Lord Brassey, H. J. Tennant, M. P. P., R. C. Munro-Ferguson, M. P., and R. W. Erks, M. P.

Lack of means had caused the young couple to keep their marriage a secret. Miss Buckley continued in her position, where she was highly valued because of her cleverness and ability, while her young husband, who is a civil engineer, went to Western Canada to do railway construction work. Success attended his efforts, and he came to fill a more lucrative position in this city.

The young husband reached the bedside of his wife late Saturday, and never left her until she died.

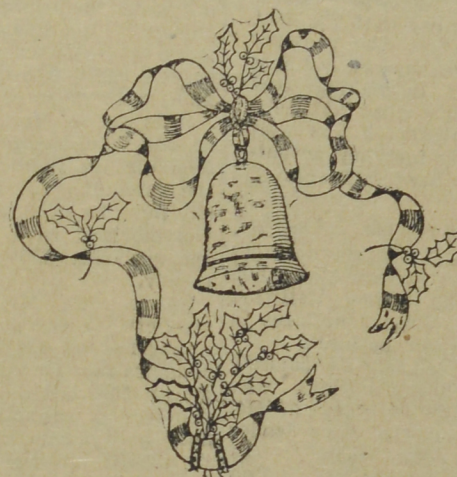

WHAT SCOTS SHOULD GIVE TO CANADA.

Rev. D. J. Fraser to St. Andrew's Society Urged Them to follow the Paths of the Covenanters.

Montreal Herald.—The seventy-second anniversary sermon was preached to St. Andrew's Society of Montreal at St. Gabriel's Presbyterian Church, St. Catherine Street, last evening by Rev. D. J. Fraser, of the Presbyterian College and chaplain to the society, formerly of St. John. The preacher's sermon was a brief and impressive review of the history of the struggle for political liberty and religious freedom in Scotland during the seventeenth century.

"Stirring and inspiring," said Rev. Mr. Fraser, "is the story of the heroic struggle of our ancestors for religious independence. None of us can trace who vindicated to Edward the supremacy of Scottish arms. Too many of us are prone to lose sight of the devoted years spent by the Scottish covenanter in their efforts to establish religious independence in Scotland."

The covenanter were free from the charge of intolerance; they fought for and won liberty of conviction and worship. It has been one of the distinctive characteristics of the Scottish struggle for religious freedom that those who sought it suppressed political and religious prejudice. St. Andrew's Society recognizes no distinctions of creed. Loyalty to one's ideals was the watchword of the covenanter. The struggle of the seventeenth century in Scotland was no paltry quarrel over theological views but a struggle for religious independence against sacerdotal domination.

The preacher then referred to the attempt of James VI of Scotland, (James I of England) to force upon his own church a foreign liturgy, and to the furor it aroused in Scottish circles. The Jenny Geddes incident was an upshot of this attempt to supplant an optional mode of worship with a traditional liturgy. John Knox's liturgy they were accustomed and satisfied to hear, but an attempt to establish arbitrary sacerdotal dictation would never be tolerated by the covenanter.

Jenny Geddes and those with her stood up for freedom of conviction and ownership. Their protest laid the foundation for civil and religious liberty. The covenanter fought not

against the King as a personage, but against his ecclesiastical tyranny. His secular tyranny did not arouse them. They actually had no sympathy with the revolutionary methods of Cromwell. It was the overpowering religious enthusiasm of the covenanter that drove Claverhouse and his dragons out of Scotland and which in 1688 raised Scotland up from the dust of her oppression to the pedestal of religious independence.

Rev. Mr. Fraser concluded by appealing to Canadians and to Presbyterians to be worthy of this legacy of liberty. "Our prime calling is to contribute to our nation this force of character."

Two Little Ones Met Watery Grave in Kent

REXTON, Dec. 5.—A sad drowning fatality occurred at Jardineville at noon yesterday, when two children of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Orr lost their lives. Grace, aged nine years, and Willie aged seven years, were going home from school and with two other children went around the shore road. Willie ran out on to the ice and broke through. His little sister ran out to save him and both were drowned. The bodies were recovered in about twenty-five minutes by Alex. Doucet and A. J. Scott, who found them in five feet of water.
