Premier and Lord Strathcona both Confident that Scheme will Succeed.

OTTAWA, Ont., August 9.—Lord Strathcona came to Ottawa from Montreal yesterday afternoon for a few hours, and had another conference with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, relative to the "All-Red" line.

Both Lord Strathcona and the premier are confident of the ultimate success of the undertaking.

The British government, before committing itself to the project, is anxious to obtain all information possible as to the routes, cost, advantages, etc., and this is one of Lord Strathcona's present missions in Canada.

THE STOCK MARKET.

C. P. R. Broke in To Days Trading to 169.

MONTEAL, Aug. 9.—(Special)—Canadian Pacific broke to 167 today. There was no trading here in that issue yesterday, but it closed in Wall street yesterday at 170 and sold previously at 171 and 175 early in the week.

LIBERAL CONFERENCE

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Heard New Brunswick M. P.'s as to Mr. Emmerson's Successor in the Cabinet.

OTTAWA, Ont., August 9.—The Liberal members and senators from New Brunswick: Messrs. Turgeon, LeBlanc, Michaud, Loggie, Carvell and Thompson, all saw Sir Wilfrid Laurier at various times yesterday, and left for the east again last evening.

The filling of the cabinet vacancy opened by the resignation of Hon. H. R. Emmerson was the chief topic which was discussed.

The members gave Sir Wilfrid their advice as to the way in which the selection should be made and left with the assurance that their representations would be carefully considered and that the man would be chosen who was regarded as best for the country and the province.

The names of ex-Premier Pugsley and Mr. Carvell, were those mentioned in connection with the portfolio. It was agreed by all of the members that both have strong claims to the place and that either would make a capable minister.

One of the gentlemen before departing said: "I am satisfied that Sir Wilfrid has not yet made up his mind as to whom he will select as his confrere from New Brunswick, but I am certain that it will either be Mr. Carvell or Hon. Mr. Pugsley."

Messrs. Reid and Emmerson are the only members of the New Brunswick Liberal delegation in the house who were not there.

The situation in New Brunswick was talked over with the Premier in all its bearings, and the representation of individual members was given to the Premier, and, doubtless, will have due weight with him when the final choice of a minister to succeed Mr. Emmerson is made.

Whether the new minister is to be Mr. Carvell, the member for Carleton, or Hon. Dr. Pugsley, ex-premier of New Brunswick. Each has strong claims for the vacant portfolio.

Announcement of cabinet changes probably will not be made for three or four weeks yet.
