ORIGINAL BILL PASSED.

The British government has followed the advice of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the matter of amending the Canadian constitution to provide for the readjustment and increase of federal subsidies, payable to the various provinces, securing the passage through both houses of the Imperial Parliament of a bill embodying the address of the Canadian Parliament on the question.

It will be recalled that when the Inter-Provincial Conference met at Ottawa last summer all the representatives of the several provinces agreed to a basis of readjustment of the subsidies, with the exception of Premier McBride, of British Columbia, who held out for an extra allowance for his province, and when he could not carry his point, abruptly left the conference, a course that was condemned by so good a Tory as Premier Whitney, of Ontario.

Mr. McBride went home and started an agitation against the new subsidy basis, and subsequently went to London to protest against its adoption by the Imperial Parliament in the form in which it passed the Canadian house. He got the ear of Mr. Winston Churchill, under Secretary of State for the Colonies, and induced him to strike out the words "final and unalterable," so as to leave a loop hole for British Columbia to renew its claim for a larger subsidy, and with these words erased the measure passed the British House of Commons.

But Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and Hon. W. S. Fielding were in London, too, and when the bill came before the House of Lords they induced the Imperial government to secure the re-insertion of the words "final and unalterable," and the measure on being returned to the Commons, passed as the Canadian ministers and the Canadian Parliament desired it.

Mr. McBride, who came home triumphant that he had got the bill amended to suit his fancy, now finds that his little scheme was finally blocked, the British ministry and parliament having carried out the will of the Canadian people, rather than taking the course suggested by the British Columbia Tory premier.

AN INTERESTING ADDRESS.

Earl Grey seems to have made a very interesting and effective address before the Canadian Club, at Halifax, on Thursday, dealing largely with the relations between the colonies and the mother country, and speaking more particularly of what Canada has done and is doing to aid in the development of the empire, and of our further duty in that respect.

Incidentally the governor-general paid tribute to the Canadian trade preference, the reduction of postage on British periodicals, and in passing spoke of how Sir Wilfrid Laurier had enhanced his great reputation at the Colonial Conference, the work of which Earl Grey warmly commended.

Touching on things yet to be accomplished by Canada, Earl Grey made a strong ap-

peal for Colonial aid to the Imperial navy and the "All-Red" steamship line project, and expressed his confidence that both these matters would be carried to a successful issue.

His Excellency, who has shown an intense interest in everything Canadian since he landed in this country, spoke of the pride he felt in Canada's great progress, and destiny, giving expression to feelings which will endear him to the Canadian people who have learned to respect and admire his pleasant personality, his great ability and his evident desire to render the best service possible in his present exalted position.

Earl Grey's utterances are all the more interesting to New Brunswickers and to Frederictonians by reason of the fact that next week we shall have the pleasure of welcoming him to this province and city, his first official visit, and no doubt the spontaneity and heartiness of his reception will convince His Excellency that we in New Brunswick are not unmindful of his many excellent qualities of mind and heart, and of the successful and satisfactory manner in which he is filling the position of the King's representative in Canada.

CURRENT COMMENT.

The Governor-General wants Canadians to think Imperially, and gives us credit for what we have already done to consolidate the empire.

The governor-general, it is learned, has strongly advised the Dominion Steel and Coal Companies to settle their differences out of court, and has suggested Lord Strathcona as a mediator.

Mr. McKane has gone to Montreal, taking with him the Telegraph editor, probably to exhibit that estimable young gentleman as the latest product of political independence, with a strong Tory string to it.

The weather seems to have cleared up, and the picnic projects are taking heart. The continued heavy rains have seriously damaged the crops, especially in the low lands, and have handicapped the farmers in the process of harvesting their hay.

The mayor and aldermen, having decided not to dine the governor-general, we trust His Excellency will not impute the failure to lack of consideration on the part of the citizens of Fredericton, who disclaim any notion of the representative character of the present council.

Mr. McKane and his party are said to have landed nine salmon and twenty-four grise during their recent fishing trip in Miramichi waters, but if the multi-millionaire cares to cast his golden flies promiscuously among the Tory hangers-on he can catch hundreds of suckers.

Commodore Stewart, of the Chatham World, copying after the hypocritical McKane newspapers, is declaring that his paper is independent, and the whole north shore is consumed with laughter, at the greatest joke the learned Commodore ever perpetrated. One might as well aver that the New Freeman is the organ of the Orangemen, of that the Orange Sentinel is the organ of Mr. Sbarretti.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has heard what the Liberal members for New Brunswick have to say respecting the filling of the cabinet vacancy, and in good time will make the selection of a gentleman he considers best fitted for the position. The choice is evidently between Dr. Pugsley and Mr. Carvell, and both gentlemen have not only strong claims on their party but are well qualified for a cabinet office. Whoever is selected New Brunswick will hope that he brings with him the portfolio of railways and canals.

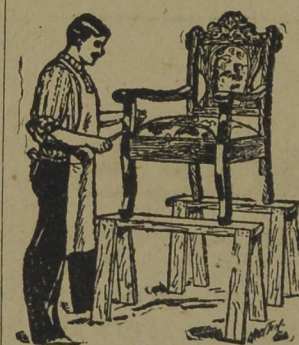
