FRIEND OF CANADA.

Governor General made Impassioned Address
at Halifax on Colonial and Imperial Relations.

Laurier, he says, Added Lustre to a Great Reputation
by his Course at Colonial Conference.

HALIFAX, Aug. 9.—A vigorous and almost impassioned appeal for colonial contributions to the support of the royal navy and for the confederation of the Empire, a profound faith in "the majestic future of the Dominion, a strong plea for the nationalization of the Canadian route for transatlantic mails, glowing tributes to Halifax, Howe and Grant as far-seeing statesmen and a graceful compliment to and warm appreciation of Nova Scotia, which holds a position second to none in the Dominion, were the outstanding features of a half hour address which Earl Grey made to the Canadian Club yesterday.

It was three years, he said, since he had landed at Halifax to take up the duty of Governor General. He had employed the interval in visiting as much of Canada as possible, in making the acquaintance of the people, and in learning the stimulating and inspiring story of her unlimited resources. Every province in turn had captured his heart and confirmed his faith in the majestic future of the Dominion. And he had no hesitation in saying that so long as the heart of the people was sound, wholesome, honest and patriotic—and they must remember that no river could hope to rise above its source—then so long would they be justified in entertaining ambition to make their Canada one of the greatest, perhaps the greatest, of all the self-governing dominions which contribute to the might and glory of the crown and to the civilization of mankind.

He told the members of the great work for the empire that had been wrought by the fathers of confederation, of the noble accomplishment since then in Australia, of what is yet to be in South Africa, and on the bearing of it all of the great problem of imperial unity.

His excellency spoke of the sacrifices that had been made by the United Kingdom, by Canada and by the southern dominions beyond the seas, one-half of the empire at large, and the imperial idea, and he alluded pointedly and forcibly to the share yet to be taken up by Canada, and the rest of Greater Britain, particularly in the matter of naval defense.

Speaking of sacrifice which one part of the empire may have to make for another, his excellency said that he felt proud to belong to that small portion of the British Empire which considered it a privilege to carry the whole burden of the naval defense of the empire so long as they were able. He warned them that, with the population of Germany fifty per cent, and the United States 100 per cent, above that of the United Kingdom it was obviously impossible for the people of the United Kingdom to keep command of the seas unaided for ever.

The sacrifices that Canada made for the empire were imperial preference and service in the navy, the regulations which made it possible to bring British mails and printed matter to Canada at a lower rate, the expense being borne by Canada. A result was already shown in the fact that the mails from the United Kingdom for the month of May were double those of the preceding May, while for June they were three times as much as they were for June last year.

Canadians had given an example of sacrifice and service in the navy with which they had forced their trade east and west instead of north and south against the laws of nature and geography in their desire to throw their trade into Great Britain, if he might quote the words of their premier, Sir Wilfrid Laurier who had returned from London with an added reputation, which endeared him to Canadians of every party. Few things had surprised him more than the fact that they had so long neglected to seize the overwhelming advantages with which nature had endowed them by placing Canadian ports 1,000 miles, or two days nearer Liverpool than New York.

Howe in 1850, fifty-eight years ago, pointed out the folly of the arrangement under which the British government was paying £145,000 per annum in order that transatlantic mails might traverse 1,107 miles more than were necessary, and in order that the correspondence of all Europe with all America might be delayed 56 hours beyond the time required for its con-

Coin Collections. . . The United States is said to have the smallest collection of rare coins of any government possessing a coin collection. At the present time the collection contains not more than 20,000 pieces, and the government expends only \$900 annually for additions to this collection. The Bibliotheque Nationale of Paris owns 250,000 pieces, the Royal Cabinet of Coins at Berlin contains 270,000 coins, the British museum possesses 250,000, the Numismatic Cabinet of Munich contains 180,000 and the Archaeological museum at Madrid contains 120,000 coins. There are thirteen other government coin collections in Europe, containing from 20,000 to 95,000 coins.

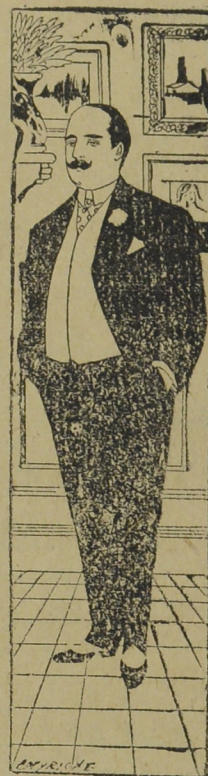
