DEATH OF H. F. BOYLE.

The First Australian to Bowl out Dr. W. G. Grace.

Sydney, Dec. 5.
Mr. H. F. Boyle, the famous Australian cricketer, died today.

Mr. Boyle was a member of the first Australian side which visited this country, in the summer of 1878. With Mr. F. R. Spofforth, he bore the brunt of the attack, and although his bowling did not prove quite so deadly as that of "The Demon," he nevertheless proved most effective, and he, moreover, had the distinction of being the first Australian to bowl Dr. W. G. Grace. Mr. Boyle relied more upon his superb length than any particular break, although he did a little work from leg.
In the famous match at Lord's when the M. C. C. were dismissed for totals of 35 and 19, Mr. Boyle took six wickets for six runs in the second innings. The Australians, who were only set to make 12 runs in the last innings, won the match by nine wickets on a pitch which Dr. W. G. Grace declared had been made almost

THEY FEAR NO MICE.

English Suffragettes Give Demonstration of Courage.

LONDON, Dec. 11.—Mice and suffragettes played the leading parts in a little drama enacted at a public meeting at Nottingham this week. Miss Pankhurst and other leading suffragettes occupied seats on the platform, and at a given moment they were suddenly joined by a number of mice let loose by mischief-making spirits in the audience. Did these strong-minded women scream or jump on chairs or otherwise demean themselves according to the wont, traditional or otherwise, of their sex? Not

unplayable by the hot sunshine which followed the soaking showers.

It was not until the 1882 tour, however, that Mr. Boyle was seen at his best as a bowler. In that year he headed the Australian averages with the fine figures of 144 wickets for 11.6 runs apiece.

It was in these tours that Mr. Boyle amazed the spectators by his hard hood in standing at very short mid-on, a position which afterwards came to be known as "silly mid-on." Dr. W. G. Grace was always telling him that he would be killed if he fielded so close to the batsman, but he persisted in his temerity, and, although he occasionally came in for some hot knocks, he brought off some brilliant catches.

As a batsman he was not first-class, although on one occasion in Australia he hit up a century.

ANOTHER COMING.

NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—Another English boxer is to invade the United States, and this one will bring with him \$5,000, belonging to the members of the National Sporting Club of London, who are willing to put up that amount that he can whip any feather-weight in the world.

This wonder is Jim Driscoll, who is considered the cleverest boxer that England has produced since the days of Charley Mitchell, and who holds the featherweight championship of England at the present time. Driscoll has beaten Jem Bowker twice, and, so his backers say, practically chased Owen Moran out of England.
It would be fine, indeed, if when Driscoll arrives here, he should find that the "chased" Moran was already ahead of him, and had defeated the American title holder, Abe Attell. Moran will have to go some to make such a surprise possible, but, if he does, Driscoll will find himself with a fight on his hands.

A COMING BOUT.

LOS ANGELES, CAL., Dec. 10.—Attell, of California, and Owen Moran, of England, will fight for the international featherweight championship at Jimmy Coffroth's club, in San Francisco, Jan. 1.—The fighters had been dickering with Tom McCarey's club, of Los Angeles, but his offer did not meet with the approval of Moran.

Coffroth's bid is 5 per cent. better than McCarey offered. The boxers are to get 60 per cent of the gross receipts, 65 per cent of which goes to the winner and 35 to the loser.

BURNS WILL FIND IT.

The Detroit papers are all loyally supporting Tommy Burns. Here's what the News-Tribune says of his next opponent in America, Jack Johnson, the negro heavyweight:

"There's no questioning the fact that this Johnson is a great boxer, and that he has the appearance of a champion. It would be hard to find among the world's fighting men a more magnificent fighting specimen than the big negro. He looks like an ancient bronze, finely proportioned, tall, clean-cut and muscular. He is quick as a flash and clever as Joe Gans. But he is crooked as a manzanita twig. He hasn't fought half a dozen fights on the level since he began. He has the mental twist of Jack O'Brien. Even his own backers are always suspicious of a double cross when he enters the ring. Johnson can't help faking. It's his natural way of working."

"Burns' chances of beating Johnson are good, although the negro will have an advantage of 20 or 30 pounds in weight and a head in height. Burns is just as fast and clever. And he is game to the core. He will tear into Johnson steadily, and on two or three occasions the big black has shown that he doesn't like that kind of milling. If there is a yellow streak in Johnson Burns will find it. 'I'll make that smoke break all high-jumping records,' says Burns."

SNEEZING BROKE UP BOXING SHOW.

With the principals, the referee, the seconds, and the entire audience seized with severe sneezing attacks, a Pittsburg boxing show came to a sudden end last night. Six four-round bouts were on the programme. Five had already been held, the participants being local boxers. The final bout, the principal one of the show, was between "Kid" Tyler and Tom Connolly. It had not progressed far when somebody in the audience began to distribute fine "kaou-chou" powder through the hall by means of blowing it off the palm of his hand. The powder got in its work in quick time and before many minutes had passed there was a perfect storm of sneezing in the hall. The boxing show was broken up amid a deafening chorus of big, little and medium nasal outbursts.

LATEST ABOUT MISS "HELEN MALONEY."

Philadelphia Heiress is Re-United to Arthur Osborne, but Family Doesn't Like it.

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—Interest was added yesterday to the complications surrounding Helen Maloney's elopement to Montreal and Europe with the Englishman, Samuel F. Clark, by a statement attributed to Arthur H. Osborne, her youthful husband.

At the recent Yale-Princeton football game at New Haven, Osborne, surrounded by friends, was mercilessly chafed over the loss of his bride. Turning upon his tormentors, Osborne is alleged to have said:

"Well, boys, I've got her now, and what is more to the purpose, I mean to keep her."

This declaration was made public yesterday, simultaneously with the circulation of a report that Helen Maloney and Osborne were together in this city, and that the bride's millionaire father, Martin Maloney, had instituted a suit to annul their marriage.

Mr. Maloney is said to be as eager to put Osborne out of his daughter's life as he was to end her romance with Clark.

William J. Fanning, Mr. Maloney's lawyer, talked evasively as to the reported suit to annul the Osborne marriage, but he was emphatic in denial of the report that Miss Maloney is still abroad and in the hands of "marriage conspirators," who are demanding large sums for her release.

"That story is absolutely false," said Mr. Fanning. "Miss Maloney is in this country, and her whereabouts is known to her father."
