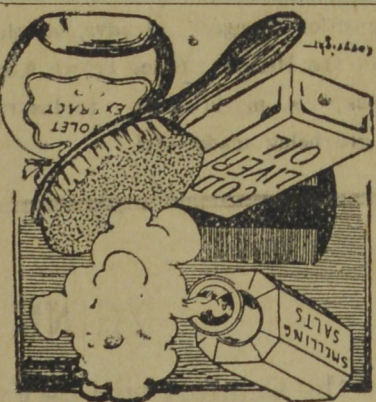

USE PSYCHOLOGY TO TRACE LOST BAIRNS.

Massachusetts Authorities to Make an Interesting Test in Ball Case.

BROCKTON, Mass., December 12.—Mayor Kent and City Marshal Kingman will make use of psychology and mental suggestion to discover the whereabouts of Mary Grace, aged nine, and Thomas, aged seven, the two children of Mrs. Mary R. C. Ball, lost some days ago.

The demented mother, now confined in the Taunton Asylum, will be used as the medium of experiment. Physicians are of the opinion that her mind can be connected with the period of her disposition of the children to such an extent that she herself will furnish the clue to their whereabouts.

All other attempts to find the lost have failed. "I can't remember what happened after I took my children in the snow," says Mrs. Ball in her little room at the insane asylum. "Everything seems blank except when I came to myself I found myself in the woods with snow all around me."

But it is in the hope that she may recall from one point to another the territory which she passed over with them that the belief exists that the bodies of the children will be found.

The officials contemplate taking the woman over all the territory which they have searched. They hope that she will unconsciously follow the route she took that fatal evening when the children were disposed of.

300 LEFT WIDOWS BY MINE DISASTER.

Most of Victims Were Married Men With Families—212 Bodies Recovered.

MONONGAHL, W. VA., Dec. 12.—Up to noon yesterday, 212 bodies had been recovered, and with large additions to the rescuing force it is hoped to have the mines cleared very soon.

Half a dozen relief stations are now in operation and supplies of all kinds are coming in rapidly and being as quickly disbursed. The cash contributions total \$40,000.

The relief committee estimates that there are 300 widows and 1,000 orphans as a result of the disaster, and destitution among them will be very great.

POLITICAL MEETING HAD TRAGIC END.

Galician Voters Injured Too Freely and One Was Killed on Way Home.

CALGARY, Dec. 11.—A political meeting for Victoria, Alberta, constituency, was held Monday, Dec. 2, to address the Galicians. After the meeting four kegs of beer were pro-

vided at the Wostock hotel, and nearly all got intoxicated. Two men, Ivan Palcap and Dymtro Mocipotski, started to drive home, and their horses ran away. Mocipotski had his arm broken and Palcap had his neck broken. He was instantly killed. He leaves a wife and seven children.
