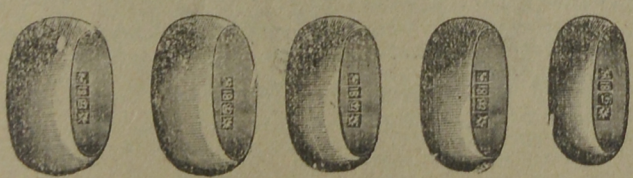

THE CHURCH SYNOD

Bishop Richardson's Address Chief Feature
of Opening Meeting---Wants Higher
Salaries for Clergy---Church
Union Question

(Special to Herald.)
ST. JOHN, N. B., October 1.—The Church of England synod of the diocese of Fredericton opened here this morning, Coadjutor Bishop Richardson presiding.
The feature of this morning's session was the bishop's address. He referred first to the growing need in the diocese of more men and more money. Ministers were overworked and their stipends are not large enough.

He would suggest that the synod in future, only work those mission fields which could be worked success-

fully, and not to try to do more than the ministers' strength could accomplish.

He also suggested that a graded system of stipends be adopted in the diocese.

As to means of raising money, he opposed picnics in all cases.

His lordship then discussed the question of church union, and said that the Church of England would never surrender its episcopal orders, but would stand by the faith.

Committee reports were adopted. The bishop of Nova Scotia was present at the meeting.

SHOT TO DEATH

Westmorland Youth Accidentally a Victim of
Companion's Rifle

MONCTON, N. B., October 1.—A story comes from Cape Bauld of a sad shooting tragedy which occurred at Little Cape, Westmorland County, on Friday last.
The victim of the shocking accident was Fred Melanson, aged 18 years, son of Judge Melanson. He and a companion were out in a boat fishing and shooting. Seeing some wild ducks, Melanson's companion, whose name has not been learned, hurriedly grabbed the loaded gun to have a shot at the game.

As the young man was preparing

for the shot the trigger in some way caught in the sleeve of his coat, and the weapon was accidentally discharged.

Young Melanson, who was sitting only a few feet away, received the charge in the breast, and was mortally wounded.

The wounded young man was taken ashore as quickly as possible by his companion, but only lived about three hours.

An inquest was held and the coroner's jury, after hearing the evidence of the dead boy's companion, returned a verdict to the effect that the shooting was accidental.

INFURIATED HORSE

Kicked Hosler to Death and had to be
Felled with a Club

SMITH'S FALLS, Ont., Oct. 1.—Edward A. Lambray, a hostler, at the Union Hotel, is dead of injuries inflicted by a horse.
Lambray went to feed the animal which began to kick wildly.
S. B. Clinton, the hotel keeper, hearing a commotion, went to the stall and found Lambray lying un-

conscious in a pool of blood.
He made an attempt to rescue the unfortunate man but was forced to seek refuge in the manger. He called for help and a couple of men rushed to his aid, but the horse had become so infuriated that no one could approach it, and it had to be felled with a club before any one could enter the stall.
Lambray remained unconscious until the time of his death.

IMMIGRATION PROSPECTS

Local Government Will Co-operate With Salvation Army
in Bringing Settlers to This Province

Premier Robinson, who is here attending a meeting of the local government, outlined the new policy of the government with regard to immigration and the establishment of industries in the province. Mr. Robinson said that the provincial government had decided to put immigration matters under the care of two men. An official would also be appointed to look after the encouragement of the establishment of industries in New Brunswick.

Mr. Robinson referred to his conference with General Booth and Colonel Lamb of the Salvation Army, which took place during the general's visit to Moncton. The result of that conference has been that Colonel Lamb has prepared a proposal to be submitted to the government at an early date. The proposal will be to bring out from England emigrants of a good class and settle them on crown lands. The premier said that the lands along the line of the Intercolonial Railway and also those in the tract in Carleton County, recently acquired from the New Brunswick Land Company, were considered to be suitable for settlement. The Salvation Army immigration bureau will be assisted by government loans.

The province itself will have a system for the encouragement of immigration and that coupled with the elaborate machinery of the Salvation Army, in the opinion of Premier Robinson, will bring about the settlement of much of New Brunswick's vacant territory. Already the Army has chartered several vessels to bring parties to Canada. Some of the ships will land the immigrants at the ports in the Maritime Provinces. This is considered necessary as those landed at Quebec have a tendency to work quickly toward the West.

So far the emigration system of the Salvation Army has worked admirably. People of good class have been gathered in the Old Country and brought to Canada. Many have been located in the West, some in Ontario. In the latter province the government has aided this class of immigration by loans to the Salvation Army in the same way that the settlers are provided with houses and advanced money by the Army, all on the understanding that repayment is to be made as soon as possible. During the past year the Salvation Army immigrants have prospered to such an extent that the repayments have been fifty per cent. greater than was expected. Premier Robinson looks for great success to attend the Salvation Army immigration work in this province.

The system by which the establishment of industries throughout the province may be encouraged in not yet perfected, but competent men are now working upon it. "I do not see," said Mr. Robinson, "why New Brunswick is not suitable for the establishment of many industries both large and small."

JAPANESE INVASION

OTTAWA, Oct. 1.—The Japanese consul general for Canada has protested against the Japanese being detained at Vancouver port because they were not provided with passports from the Japanese government. The consul-general maintains this is a violation of the treaty. He also says that the treaty sets aside any understanding there was between the two governments as to restricted immigration.

OTTAWA, Ont., October 1.—The Supreme Court met here to-day. The Halifax election cases were at the foot of the list. This, the Supreme Court officials say, was done at the request of the parties concerned. It will delay their hearing for a couple of months.

CITY COUNCIL MEETING

New Alderman for Carleton Ward
Sworn In—Hyde & Webster's Claim

The city council held its regular monthly committee meeting last evening, several of the aldermen being absent. Mr. Thomas Morris, lately returned by acclamation for Carleton Ward, was sworn into office by the mayor and took his seat at the table.

The accounts contracted during the past month were gone over by the committee, with the assistance of Auditor McKay, and ordered to be paid.

Mr. Webster, of Hyde and Webster, Montreal, was heard by the committee in regard to a claim which his firm has against the city for sewerage pipe, condemned by the engineer after delivery. The firm has been threatening to bring an action against the city, but it is understood that terms of settlement have been agreed upon. No definite action will be taken, however, until Ald. Scott, chairman of the sewerage committee returns from Montreal.

The regular monthly meeting of the council will be held this evening.

THE STOCK MARKET.

Canadian Pacific Moving Upward
Again

MONTREAL, Oct. 1.—(Special)—Canadian Pacific was the sole issue which showed much action in the stock market today.

In a generally steady market, Pacific moved up to level more in conformity with Wall Street parity, following yesterday's striking squeeze of shorts in late tradings.

With New York as high as 171 and closing at 170, the local price only 104 as high as 168 yesterday.

Today trading commenced at 167 and rose two points.

Dom. Steel was quiet but firm at 20 1/4 for Common, and 56 1/2 for Preferred.

Some Mexican bonds changed hands

at 71 to 73, with Common at 45 1/4 to 45, and Rio bonds at 71 1/4.

BANK ROBBERS

Made Unsuccessful Attempt to Loot
Sovereign Agency—Fired on Men
Who Chased Them Off

HUTTON JCT., QUE., Oct. 1.—(Special)—An unsuccessful attempt was made by five men to rob the Sovereign Bank agency here this morning about 2 a.m.

After an explosion, which only wrecked the outer part of the safe, the robbers were fired upon by R. S. Ward and E. S. Cutley, two of the bank's staff, who roomed across the street.

The burglars escaped, and made off south, firing their revolvers as they went. Postmaster Charles Griggs, who joined in the chase, was shot in the foot by one of them.
