

BULK OF PEOPLE FAVOR CHINESE

Deputy Minister of Labor Testifies to Sobriety and Efficiency of Orientals

VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 20.—Ouyang King from the Chinese Legation at Washington is in Vancouver representing the Chinese Government on the question of the anti-Chinese riots. Mr. King says that while the Chinese Government will make no claim for indemnity, Canada, or the city of Vancouver will be asked to pay for glass broken, signs destroyed and resulting damage from loss of business. The glass bill for Chinatown will alone be \$5,000, while damage from loss of business will be much greater still. Mr. Ouyang King said that while here he had been studying the conditions, and he found that the bulk of the people had nothing to say against his countrymen. They were invaluable in the labor market as domestic servants, mill hands, etc., and were getting good wages. The lowest sum paid for any work was \$1.50, while the majority of them get \$2.50 and many \$4. and \$4.50 as mill hands. They were preferred to whites because they never laid off, and were faithful in their work while whites could not be relied upon from one day to another. He was certain that the rough element were responsible for the riots, and not the better class of workmen.

Mr. W. L. M. King, the Dominion Deputy Minister of Labor, after studying the Oriental labor question, declares that Orientals are not employed because they are cheap, but they have superseded the whites in saw mills and like work because of their sobriety and efficiency. He found some Chinese employed in saw mills at wages of four dollars a day.

DIALECT OF THE PYGMIES.

Explorer to Live in the Tree Tops to Learn It.

The African Pygmies, who have been touring England, have returned to London, and will appear at the Earl's Court Exhibition throughout the season.

They are great favorites with those who have met them, and a countless has paid them repeated visits. Their favorite is Mongongo who, nineteen years of age, is the baby of the party. He is always kissed by the countess, while famous actresses delight in shaking hands with the little fellow who looks no larger than a boy of seven.

The party is just the same as Londoners knew it before, except that the women, Amuriane and Kuaki, are both now wives of Matuka. The latter bought his second wife at Scarborough by handing over the regulation three arrows, that being the purchase price for a wife in Iuria. In the autumn they will return to their native forests, accompanied by Mr. J. Osborne, who is preparing a vocabulary of their dialect. He will remain in the Forest of Iuria for another two years. For eight months of the year torrents of rain convert the forest land into an uninhabitable swamp, and during this period the pygmies and their white friend will live, like Peter Pan, in the tree-tops. Mr. Osborne is looking forward to his extraordinary experience, and after his sojourn in the tree-tops hopes to complete the only record of the Iurian dialect in existence.

Indian corn, roasted bananas, boiled mutton, which somewhat resembles the flesh of the African goat, fish, and eggs are the favorite diet of the little people while in England. Unlike other savages they are fond of hot baths, and take one every morning.

They have absolutely no religion, and in this respect they are probably unique among the known races of the world.

An Execution in India.

Execution of criminals as carried out in Hyderabad, British India, is vividly described by a military writer who gives an account of the death of a Pathan, or member of the Afghan race, who had shot his brother-in-law. "The decision as to whether the murderer should be executed or imprisoned for life was, as is usual, left to the arbitrament of the murdered man's relatives, and his wife, the sister of the murderer, voted for death," says the writer. "On the day for the execution there appeared in the streets a band of sweepers armed with leafy twigs, followed by a squad of the city Arab police with fixed bayonets. Then came the criminal dressed in new white garments, with a new halter around his neck and new ropes attached to his arms. The ends of those ropes were held by policemen. The ordinary thing is for the condemned man to walk, but in this case he was so overcome that he had to be conveyed in a jukta.

"On arriving at the fatal spot the murderer was made to alight and kneel down, while the policemen handed over charge of the cords to the executioner's attendants, one of whom, seizing the end of the halter, stood in front of the felon, while others held the cords pinioning his arms behind. The executioner, brandishing a broad, heavy sword, keen as a razor, in a suggestive fashion, and prancing up toward his victim, asked three times in a loud voice: 'Who authorizes the execution?' The chief of the city police on duty thrice repeated: 'The Amin.'

"Then an attendant armed with a long needle pricked the condemned man in the back, causing him to start forward. At the same instant those holding the cords laid themselves back in opposite directions as in a tug-of-war contest, with the result that the wretch's neck was stretched; and, following the reply of the chief of the police, the executioner's blade descended fair and true on the neck, severing the head completely."

THE PLATE RACK.

It May Be a Decorative Bit or a Discordant Note.

Plate racks tell many a tale of taste, or, rather, of the lack of it. One's collection, made by a series of contributions, may consist of many and varied ideas on the subject, but the plates displayed around a wall should be simple and dignified in style—anything that is garish carefully preserved in the darkest, deepest corner of a closet or intrusted to the hands of a servant who has made herself famous for her "outbreaks in china."

Seriously, though, that plate rack is either a bit of attractive decoration or an inharmonious something which spoils the whole room, no matter how carefully every other part of the furnishings has been chosen.

So called handsome pieces are to be avoided. They are usually conspicuous in every sense of the word—a confusion of color and design without a single really attractive feature about them. They are usually expensive, these monstrosities in the shape of gift plates, for surely nobody ever went so far as to buy one to live with! Less expensive plates are passed over purposely in spite of the fact that their dignity of style and an exquisite simplicity of coloring make for the prettiest sort of decoration.

Avoid those plates which are gay with a profusion of highly colored roses, perhaps made still more striking (3) by a broad band of green—the strong, insistent shades of the fields and trees in midsummer—touched off (save the mark!) with irresponsible splashes of gilt. They cost probably \$1.50 and make, as one woman said, with unconscious irony, "such a showing for your money."

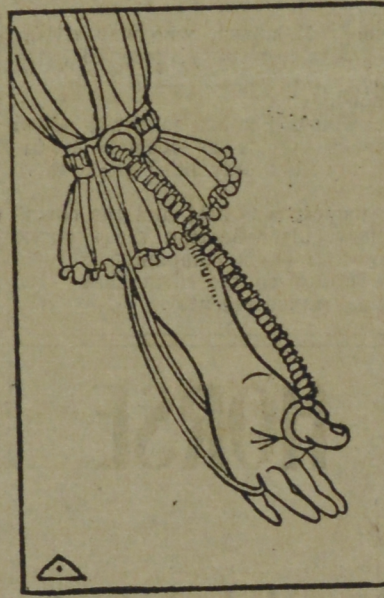
There is a rule that is worth adhering to in choosing such plates, and that is to choose only simple designs and colorings, unless you do, as one woman did, make a hobby of collecting plates of a certain country or kind. She went in for Chinese plates and used only the pretty variations of medallion and its kindred wares, with the result that her plate rack was interesting in its orientalisms.

Another woman, whose dining room—the whole house, in fact—was a copy of quaint old English styles, used only old plates of English make on her rack, picking them up one at a time.

SLEEVE HOLDER.

Ingenious Contrivance For Preventing Crushing of the Sleeve.

If it were permissible, many a young lady would be tempted to use a cuss word every time she puts on her coat. We have all watched her struggle in the attempt to tuck the big balloon sleeves of her waist into the armholes of the coat. Naturally it must be uncomfortable to have the inner sleeve

bunched at the shoulder. An ingenious Englishwoman has invented a simple contrivance which does away with all these trying perplexities, and she thinks so highly of the device that she has had it patented in the United States. As shown in the illustration, it comprises a narrow elastic band, having on each end a ring, one being larger than the other. Attached to the band is a double cord. In using this device the band is formed into a lasso (by slipping the smaller ring through the larger one), which is slipped over the end of the sleeve of the waist. The fine end of the band is then secured to the thumb by the ring. The cord is attached to the little finger. After slipping the arm into the sleeve of the coat the ring on the thumb is released and the band pulled out of the armhole by means of the cord.

To Broil a Steak.

Few housewives understand the art of broiling, and consequently chops and steaks are often robbed of their delicate flavor by frying in a pan.

A steak or chop properly broiled should have a thin, well browned crust. Beyond this crust the meat should be red and juicy, hardly a shade less done in the middle than near the surface.

If the broiling is to be done on a range, have the fire very bright and clear. Open every draft, that smoke and flames may be drawn up the chimney. Place the piece of meat in the double broiler and hold it as near the coals as possible until the surface is brown, turning frequently. It will take three or four minutes for this. Now raise the broiler several inches above the bed of coals and continue the cooking until the meat is done.

The broiler must be turned often. A good rule is to count ten slowly, then turn the broiler. A steak or chop cut a little more than an inch thick will cook nicely in ten minutes. If liked well done, it should be cooked for twelve minutes.

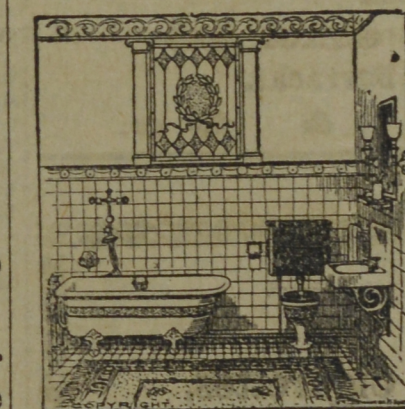
