The I. C. R. express yesterday brought to the city six American sportsmen who have been hunting big game in the mighty forests of the Miramichi. All of them registered at the Queen hotel, and left for home by last evening's train.

Mr. Frank Trump of Jersey Shore, Pa., and Dr. Donaldson, of Williamsport, who have been hunting near Blackville, with Mr. J. Ronald MacDonald as guide, secured a nice moose each early in the season, and have since been trying for caribou but without success. Mr. Trump is an old time sportsman, and this is his fourth trip to New Brunswick after game.

Mr. Coleman Carnegie, nephew of the steel king, and Dr. A. A. Moore of New York, who have been hunting at McNeil Lake with Mr. William Griffin, Jr., as guide, also returned to the city yesterday. The doctor shot a moose, but Mr. Carnegie failed to find one to suit his fancy, although he saw quite a number.

Messrs. J. S. Dickinson and W. J. Tilt of New York, who have been hunting on Cain's River under the guidance of Mr. Chipman Bartlett, returned to the city yesterday each with a nice moose head. They claim to have seen seventy-eight moose during the trip.

Mr. W. H. Hayden of New Haven, Conn., was here yesterday en route to the Little Southwest Miramichi, to hunt big game under the guidance of Mr. Harry Braithwaite.

The heads of two nice moose shot at Mr. Charles Cramin's camps at Bathurst Lake by Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Hayden of New York, were received at Emack Bros' establishment yesterday.

The Slow, Pottering Gordon Setter.

Years ago the Gordon setter was quite a favorite and much in use by sportsmen of this country. In later years, however, this really good dog was displaced in greater part by the pointer and English setter. The Gordon, says Ed F. Haberlein in Dogdom, is the largest and heaviest of all bird dogs, more clumsy and usually slow. Where most hunting is done in woodland and thickets and a slow working dog is needed so as not to get "lost" almost continually he fills the bill well—works close to gun, has good nose, is steady on point and if properly trained a very good retriever from land and water. The Gordon is easily trained and retains his training well, is also of good pleasant disposition and an admirable companion. At this age, however, when so very much stress is laid on speed and wide range, the Gordon is not "in it" because he is a slow, pottering dog as a rule.
