

## DOCTORS MAKE UP FOR LOST BACKBONE

Alexander Adrehi Will be Short on Vertebrae Through Life, but Won't Miss Them.

New York, July 16.—When Alexander Adrehi, a patient in the City Hospital on Blackwell's Island, is discharged in a few weeks one of the most remarkable cases in surgery will have been completed.

For four years he lay almost constantly on a water bed in the hospital, with part of his backbone shot away. For the first few weeks after he was injured the lower part of his body was completely paralyzed. He has now so far recovered as to walk and go up and down stairs.

In May, 1903, Adrehi was shot in the back in a street fight in Brooklyn. The bullet hit the spinal column, shattering the tenth and eleventh vertebrae and almost severing the spinal cord. He was taken to the Brooklyn Hospital, and at first it was believed his death was but a matter of a short time, as it was deemed impossible to overcome the injury to the spinal cord.

## DR. FOWLER'S SKILL.

The late Dr. George Ryerson Fowler, who died a year ago, had charge of the case and he decided to operate.

An incision six inches long was made directly over the eleventh vertebrae. The tenth and eleventh vertebrae had been completely shattered. With a chisel the lamina of the tenth and eleventh vertebrae were cut away, exposing the severed cord. A narrow, ragged and contused strip of membrane, about an eighth of an inch wide remained. The bullet was removed, the ends of the spinal cord were then sutured, the membrane being included in the sutures. A drain, consisting of half a dozen strips of oiled silk was introduced and the wound sewed up.

This operation was performed May 9, 1903. A month later the man was able to move his toes. In November following he could sit up in bed. Every day he received massage treatment to restore and stimulate the circulation. Electricity was used for the same purpose.

## PREMIER'S RETURN.

Sir Wilfrid and Party Expected at Quebec Friday Afternoon.

Ottawa July 16.—It is understood that Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Lady Laurier are accompanied home by Hon. W. S. Mrs. and Miss Fielding, as well as by Hon. L. P. Brodeur and Madame Brodeur. The Empress ought to reach Quebec early on Friday afternoon next, but it is just possible that her arrival may be delayed so as to time the reception by the citizens of Quebec for the evening, which is the best time for a popular demonstration.

The Premier will probably stay in Quebec until afternoon on the Saturday so that the Montreal welcome may be timed for the Saturday night. This will enable him to spend Sunday in Montreal and, leaving there about 4 p. m. on the Monday, reach Ottawa at 7 in the evening.

The idea is that, after a few days, probably a week or two, spent in Ottawa putting domestic affairs into shape—an operation needed in every household after an absence from home—that Sir Wilfrid and Lady Laurier will spend a couple of weeks at their home at Arthabaskville. So that it is not expected that there will be any serious developments as to Cabinet reconstruction—if any such thing is contemplated, beyond the filling of the present vacancies—until at least the end of August.

There is every chance that the Premier will delay his departure for his old home sufficiently to enable him to take part in at least the opening ceremonies of the semi-centennial of Ottawa, which he has done so much to beautify and to develop.

## HE WAS UNCOMPLAINING.

Adrehi was cheerful, willing to undergo anything his attendants suggested for him. His patience was remarkable. Dr. Fowler took great personal interest in his case and visited him almost daily. When the operation had proved a success and it was seen the man's recovery was only a question of time. Dr. Fowler wrote an inextinguishable review on the case, which was published in The Annals of Surgery.

When Dr. Fowler died Adrehi was removed to the City Hospital on Blackwell's Island and placed in care of Dr. Louis Casamajor, who contrived a walking-machine for him.

## WALKED IN A HARNESS.

It consists of a harness which fits under his arms and supports his weight. This is suspended in a frame which moves about on ball-bearing casters. Adrehi propelled it with his feet, his weight supported by the harness. In a short time he was able to travel all about the corridor of the hospital.

Now he can walk without the aid of crutches or a brace, and goes up and down stairs by holding to the banisters. He exercises abundantly, and the massage treatment is administered only occasionally. He moves his legs and feet freely and the sense of feeling in them is fully restored. The circulation seems to have been perfectly established, and he is believed to be permanently cured.

He is short the tenth, eleventh and twelfth vertebrae, but Dr. Casamajor says nature will in time make compensation with a growth of tendon which will fully supply the deficiency.

The cost to the city in the care of this patient has been great. At the usual rate for pay patients of \$1 a day it would figure more than \$1,200. But for weeks and months, when physicians and nurses were battling with death to win him back to life, he required constant attention. It is doubtful if \$5,000 would cover the cost.

## SENTRIES BLUFFED.

Popular Actor Usurps Royal Pre-rogative.

"Lord Chancellor's" Ruse.

London Daily Mail: Mr. C. H. Workman, of the O'Flynn Carte Opera Company, usurped the prerogative of the King and the Lord Chancellor on Tuesday, and was guilty of a piece of audacity only equalled by the late Sir Frank Lockwood.

The Earl of Ellesmere gave a charity fete at Bridgewater House for the League of Mercy, and Miss D'Oyly Carte had kindly given permission for a number of the Savoyards to sing the different songs for which they are most famous.

Mr. Workman, who cast himself on this occasion for the part of the Lord Chancellor in "Iolanthe," went to the Savoy Theatre to dress for his song. There he was delayed, and finally he found himself very short of the time necessary to get to Bridgewater House. But he saw that he could reach his destination in time if he drove through the Horse Guards and so through St. James' Park.

That it was absolutely forbidden to anyone except the King and the Lord Chancellor to use this short cut, Mr. Workman was well aware, but feeling that anything was justified, in the cause of charity, and trusting to his admirable make-up to bluff his way through, he boldly ordered the coachman to drive through the Horse Guards.

The carriage dashed into the entrance to the Horse Guards and passed the mounted sentries, but its course was brought to a temporary termination by a sentry on foot, who demanded an explanation of the outrage.

Drawing himself up with an air of impressive dignity, Mr. Workman placed his eye-glasses on his nose, gave the sentry a look of withering scorn, and demanded in an awful voice: "Do you dare stop a Lord Chancellor?"

The sentry took one hurried and startled look at Mr. Workman's full-bottomed wig and his black and gold robes. Without another word he fell back, saluted, and allowed the carriage to pass on.

Mr. Workman arrived in time.

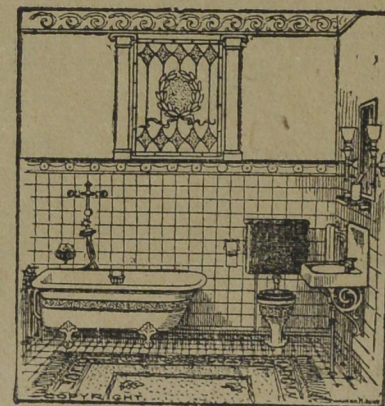
