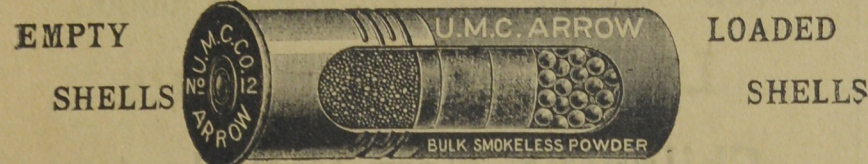

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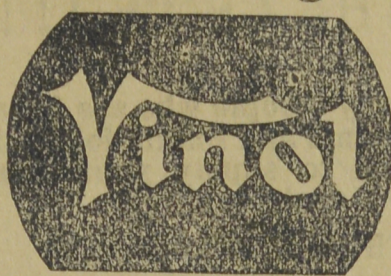

BRIDGE DESIGNER HEART-BROKEN

Paul L. Szlapka Spent 18 Years Working Over Plans for the Quebec Structure.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Sept. 4.—For Paul L. Szlapka, its designer, eighteen years of diligent toil counted for naught and the ambition of his life was dashed to pieces when the Quebec bridge fell into the St. Lawrence river. As a result he was nearly heartbroken as he boarded the train to hasten to the scene to examine into the cause of the accident.

Mr. Szlapka has been with the Phoenix Bridge Company since 1882, having come to the United States from Germany in 1880. He is a man, about fifty-five years of age and has devoted his life to the study of engineering. He was educated in the University at Hanover, province of Prussia, Germany, and took post-graduate courses at Posen and other celebrated German institutions.

It was in the early part of 1882 that he became associated with the Phoenix Company and shortly afterward he was made designing engineer. With that inborn German instinct, everything undertaken by him was with a zest to make it the best. Early in his service with the bridge company he turned his attention to cantilever bridges. With eagerness he dived into the principles of his profession for ideas and they were evolved with rapidity.

Eighteen years ago the energetic engineer began to draft the outlines of the bridge which he hoped would place his name among the engineers of the world. The contract for the Quebec bridge was obtained by the Phoenix Company in 1901 and with renewed efforts Szlapka entered into the work of calculating to the smallest fraction of an inch the details of

the big structure. Almost night and day he and his corps of assistants bent to the task.

Finally the working plans were completed and submitted to the engineers of the Quebec Bridge Company and the Canadian Government. They were promptly approved, with commendation for their execution. Szlapka watched with great personal pride the work as it progressed.

Continually he was devising wonderful machinery with which the heavy pieces of steel could be put into position. Much of this machinery was built specially for this work.

Mr. Szlapka made frequent trips to the bridge and watched it grow panel by panel. Only last week he returned from a trip of inspection to tell his wife that the object of his highest ambition in life was growing into a reality. His wife took even more pride in hearing the details of the bridge's erection. Everything seemed to be going better than planned.

It was no wonder then that the expert designer laughed and called it all a joke when he was called to the telephone on Thursday night and told that the bridge lay a mass of twisted steel at the bottom of the St. Lawrence River. He laughed heartily, then hysterically as the news was impressed upon him as real. Tears coursed down his cheeks as he realized what it all meant.

Among the notable structures built by the Phoenix Bridge Company are the Girard avenue Bridge, in this city, the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad bridge over a mile long, at Cincinnati, O., and a bridge over the Ohio river at Louisville, Ky.

TO EDIT PAPER ON A HOUSEBOAT

Editor May Improvise Floating Printing Office at Prince Rupert to Fight His Enemies

VANCOUVER, Sept. 4.—John Houston, ex-M.L.A., has a big fight on his hands. Word comes from the north that the veteran editor, politician and mining prospector, has declared war against the Grand Trunk Pacific railway for its persistent refusal to sell him a lot in Prince Rupert, the proposed western terminus of the road. Mr. Houston owns the Empire, a weekly newspaper. He writes his "copy" in a tent at Prince Rupert, but the sheet is printed in Vancouver. The copies are then sent north for distribution.

Mr. Houston, finding that the peaceful policy he inaugurated in the first issues, would not placate the railway company, has decided to carry the war into Africa. He now talks of building a houseboat as a printing office and anchoring it off the foreshore. There he expects to be able to entrench himself and fire broadsides at his new enemy. Those who know something about the personality of Mr. Houston agree that he is able to carry out his threat. A special volley will be timed for the arrival of President Hays and General Manager Morse, who are expected

to reach Prince Rupert early next month. Recent issues of the Empire have "grilled" the railway corporation of the true Houstonian style. Mr. Houston is especially exasperated over the condition of his printing outfit, which after having been unloaded from the steamer, was dumped on the wharf. There it remains exposed to the daily rains of Prince Rupert. The plant is not housed and threatens to soon be fit for the scrap heap.

Mr. Houston, according to report, has the sympathy of the majority of people in that region. He has been advised that the newspaper franchise in Prince Rupert is being reserved for Mr. Duncan Ross, M. P., of Greenwood, who it is said, will retire from politics after the next dissolution of parliament and establish a daily up there in the interests of the railway company. Mr. Ross has been editor of the Boundary Creek Times for many years and many were the newspaper controversies he carried on with Mr. Houston, then an editor in Nelson, B. C. The indications are that Mr. Houston—in the quiet seclusion of his houseboat—will give Mr. Ross a noisy reception.

BLACKMAILERS CAPTURED.

Black Hand Leaders Taken in New York.

NEW YORK, Sept. 5.—Caught in the act of taking money from a victim whom they had threatened with death, three Italians, who the police believe are leaders of the Black Hand Society, were captured today by detectives after a wild fight on a trolley car in Second avenue, in which one of the Italians was shot while diving through the car window in a final effort to escape. One Annoni, a wealthy barber, has been receiving letters demanding \$500 for more than a year. He was told that his place would be blown up and his family annihilated unless he heeded the demands. Annoni informed the police, and today it was planned to lay a trap for the blackmailers.

The barber met his men in Second avenue, paid over the money and gave a signal to the police, who were concealed nearby. The three Italians sprang on a passing trolley car, and might have escaped, but the motor-man stopped the car. Two of the Italians jumped from the car, and after a short sprint were captured. The third Italian made a long dive through the car window, and was shot while in mid-air.
