RESIGNED HIS SEAT.

The present organ was built by an English firm who sent their men out here and it was built in the cathedral at the time the building was erected.

CAN'T HELP IT

If Hindus Are Coming to Canada Government is Powerless to Prevent Them

(Special to Herald.)

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 6.—The immigration department has had no information concerning the report that 750 Hindus are on their way from Bellingham, Washington, to British Columbia.

Canada cannot prevent Hindus from arriving in this country. If there are any "Undesirables" among them they will be deported. Any of them suffering from disease, or likely to become a public charge in the community will not be allowed to land in Canada.

Beyond this, which is provided for under the immigration act, and is applicable to British subjects as well as foreigners, there are no restrictions upon Hindu immigration.

G. I. P. CONSTRUCTION

Corbett of Franklin, Pa., Bringing Three Steam Shovels to Start Moncton Chipman Section

Senator King, who came from Toronto yesterday, said that in the Grand Trunk Pacific offices in Montreal he was told that Mr. Corbett, of Franklin, Pa., a big contractor to whom the G.T.P. Company had sublet part of the Moncton-Chipman section of the new railway, was now on his way east with his plant to begin construction work.

Mr. Corbett's contract covers fifty miles from Moncton to within eight miles of Chipman and these eight miles are to be built by Mr. McManus, of Memramcook, as before announced.

Mr. King said he believed construction work would be soon begun. Mr. Corbett will bring his plant to Norton via I.C.R. and thence in to the scene of operations.

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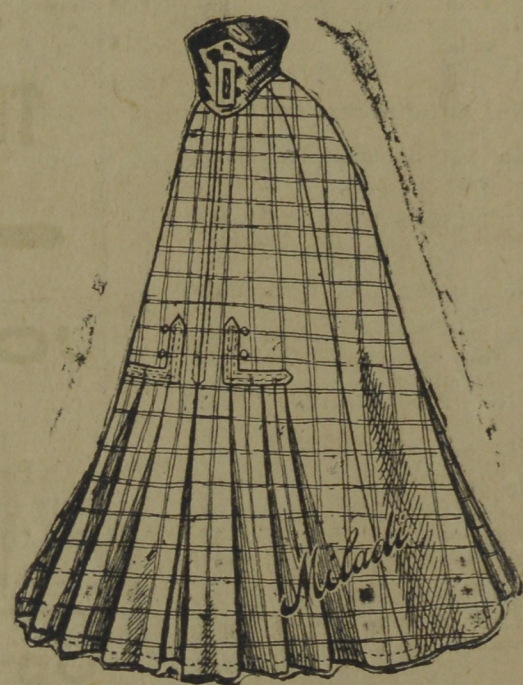
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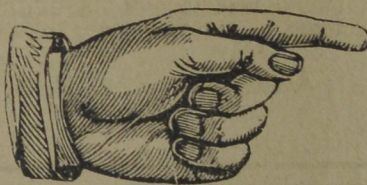
