GOOD SALMON FISHING.

Salmon fishing on the Southwest Miramichi River above Boiestown is reported to be better this season than it has been for a number of years and some good catches have been made, notwithstanding the high freshet.

Mr. Harry Chestnut of this city and Mr. Alex Little of Harvey spent a few days on this stream recently and caught twelve salmon and gillie, which is pretty good record.

Fishing in the Hart's Island salmon pool at Springhill is not likely to amount to much this season on account of the high water. The salmon fishing season closes on August 15th.

COMING WEDDING.

The marriage of Miss Violet Marsh, stepdaughter of Bishop Kingdon, to Mr. Clements of Peekskill, New York, is announced to take place at the residence of the Bishop on September 3rd. MACHINISTS GET INCREASES.

Matter of Passes Over the I. C. R. Still Remains Unsettled.

MONCTON, N. B., Aug. 10.—Included in the monthly pay received by the I. C. R. machinists yesterday was the increase of pay recently granted and which dates from April 1.

The increase amounts to an average of three cents all around. The higher paid men received two cents an hour additional and the lower paid machinists were given four cents more.

In a few cases an increase of five cents was granted.

The increase brings the highest paid machinists, outside of charge hands, up to twenty-six cents an hour and the lowest paid men up to twenty-two cents.

Some of the men today drew more than \$100. The question now remaining to be settled between the machinists and the management is that of passes. Six passes a year for employees and families have been asked for, but the management have not yet acceded to this request.

With the wage question settled all over the road, however, the machinists are very hopeful that the pass concessions will eventually be granted.

THE DEAD RAT.

Dr. W. J. Weaver, chairman of the Local Board of Health has lodged a complaint with the civic authorities against City Marshal Roberts for alleged neglect of duty. It appears that several days ago the doctor discovered the carcass of an extra large rat lying on Queen Street in front of the Globe Laundry and in the discharge of his duties as a guardian of the public health notified the city marshal in writing to remove it.

The city marshal, so it is alleged, paid no attention to the chairman's order, and the result was that Health Inspector Phillips was compelled to arrange for the removal of the deceased rodent. Now Chairman Weaver has sent a communication to Secretary Beckwith on the subject and that official has forwarded it to City Clerk McCready. It is scarcely likely that a special meeting of the city council will be called at present.

CHARGES PILING UP.

Unhappy Position of that thieving Charlottetown Lawyer.

CHARLOTTETOWN, Aug. 10

—Pale from imprisonment, but cool, collected and confident of an ultimate favorable issue of the proceedings against him, Edwin O. Brown, the young barrister appeared yesterday for his third preliminary examination at the police court before Stipendiary Magistrate MacDonald to answer forgery charges for which the penalty is penitentiary for life, in a number of cases.

The court sat all day, and as a result, Brown was committed for trial at the next session of the Supreme Court in January next on the following charges, namely, for forging a mortgage purporting to be given by Miltn F. Vessey and wife, of Little York, to J. Ewen Matthews, of Charlottetown, for \$550, another from Warren J. Vessey, of Little York, to Thomas Campbell, contractor, Charlottetown, for \$750, forming two deeds of conveyance from Richard Vessey, of Little York, to Warren R. Vessey, these being given to Campbell as title deeds as security for the loan, forging the name of W. C. White, provincial registrar to the certificates of registration of these mortgages and deeds, making in all eight charges. Registrar White swore that none of his signatures to the certificates were genuine and all mortgages, one of them Brown's brother-in-law swore

that their signatures to the documents, which were charged to be forgeries, dated back to 1900.

In addition to yesterday's charges Brown had previously been committed to the supreme court on the charge of forging a certificate of registration to a mortgage for \$1,200, purporting to be given by Wardon R. Vessey to Eva Stamper, of Charlottetown; also on a charge of forging the name of Alexander Martin, M. P., as an endorser of a note of \$500, discounted at the Royal Bank of Canada.

Attorney-General Peters, the crown prosecutor, intimated that other charges are to be preferred. These, it is understood, include the forging of the Stamper mortgage, of a mortgage of \$1,200 purporting to have been given by Archibald Vessey, of Little York, in favor of L. C. Worthy, of Charlottetown, the raising of a note from \$200 to \$2,200, the forging of a mortgage for \$2,300, the forging of an endorsement of a note for \$500 and other criminal offences. On Monday next the trial will be resumed.

Brown was indignant on being told that he must appear again, asking what they meant by dragging him up before the court once more. The case is unparalleled in the history of the Island, if not in the Maritime Provinces.

BIG G. I. P. STATION.

Railway Company will Build Enormous Structure at Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Ont., August 10.—

Ottawa is to have a new central station, equal to anything in the Dominion, and costing more than \$1,000,000.

That is the project laid by Sir Wilfrid Laurier yesterday afternoon by William Wainwright, assistant to the general manager of the Grand Trunk Railway, and Mansfield Gilbert, one of the foremost architects of New York.

The Grand Trunk Company has decided to change its previous plans for a \$1,000,000 hotel and a new central station, to cost \$250,000, and today new plans for a splendid terminal station, to be erected on the site of the present station, were presented to the government.

These plans provide for a large building of striking architecture, with a central elevation of ten stories, for offices, etc. The structure is planned with a view to the future growth of the capital, and will be adequate for the traffic of many years to come.

The hotel project of the company may possibly be dropped and left for a private enterprise to undertake.

VICE REGAL MOVEMENTS.

Governor General and Party En Route St. John on Monday.

HALIFAX, Aug. 10.—His Excellency, the Governor General and party returned early last evening from a very pleasant excursion to Chester Nova Scotia's Saratoga. The weather was delightful, the sea calm, and the sail was greatly enjoyed. Last night the vice royal party were present at the illuminated boat race on the North West Arm which was witnessed by twenty thousand people.

This afternoon the vice royal party will witness the yacht race on Halifax harbour, proceeding later by special train to Canning, N. S., where His Excellency will be the guest over Sunday at the beautiful home of Sir Frederick Borden, Minister of Militia. On Monday they will visit Kentville, Wolfville, Annapolis and Digby, proceeding from that place by the government steamer Curlew to St. John.
