

OLD TIMES RECALLED.

A Glance Into the Local News of Fredericton Twenty-six Years Ago.

(Farmer Files, August 4, 1881.)

William Graham, of Canterbury Station is 103 years old. Prof. and Mrs. Rivet are in New York, and will not return home till September.

Rev. Mr. Wadman has been inducted into the pastoral charge of the Lincoln Methodist church.

The bark extract factory, at Lower Haynesville has commenced operations. It started with a stock of 4,000 cords.

Attorney-General Fraser and Mr. Robert Thorburn spent last Sunday in the pleasant village of Stanley. They were the guests of Mr. Joseph Thorburn.

The heavy rains of last week caused a rise in the river of about three feet, enabling the "Florenceville" to resume her trips to Woodstock on Saturday.

Mr. M. McDade, for several years city editor of the St. John News, is about to resume the editorial management of a new sporting journal in Toronto.

The Gibson Leather Company will send samples of their productions to the Dominion Exhibition, which opens at Halifax September 21st, and the Quebec Provincial Exhibition at Montreal. Mr. P. A. Logan, the manager of the company's works, will attend the latter.

Mr. William Segee's hotel at Springhill, was entered and robbed of some \$20 in cash and a small quantity of goods last Thursday night. The robbers accomplished their purpose by cutting out a pane of glass in a back window and unfastening it, through which they entered.

The New Brunswick Railway machine shops at Gibson are turning out a box car a day, and one or two flat cars a week, for the broad gauge, which will soon be completed for the entire length of the road. The wheels are made at the Londonderry, N. S. iron works.

Mr. Daniel Fowler, who died last Friday, was well known to many of our citizens. The deceased for a long time before the introduction of the steam fire engines was a useful member of the fire brigade, and was at one time a non-commissioned officer in the 71st battalion. A large number of friends regret to hear of his death.

The Messrs. Shaw Bros. are making rapid progress towards the completion of the new bark extract factory, immediately below Woodstock. The building is nearly ready for occupation, five large boilers are on the ground, a large quantity of bark has been secured, and a branch railway, connecting with the N. B. Railway has been constructed. The management of the business there is in the hands of Mr. W. H. Crocker, a very capable and pleasing young gentleman.

Rev. Joseph McLeod on Tuesday united in marriage at the residence of the bride's father, Kingsclear, Miss Jennie B. Estey, daughter of Mr. Abel Estey, and Mr. Abraham Grant of Bright. The newly wedded pair were at the Queen Tuesday evening and left for Halifax for a short bridal tour yesterday morning.

Mrs. Mehitable Brown, the notice of whose death appears under the proper heading, lived to see four generations of her descendants, who numbered six children, 24 grandchildren, 50 great grandchildren, and one great great grandchild.—St. Croix Courier.

FATAL ACCIDENT.

A sad and fatal accident occurred about a mile back of Gibson at noon on Saturday. A young man named James Ferguson, of Boston, who was visiting at his uncle's, Mr. John Peppers, Gibson, went berrying with two lads, Frank Cowperthwaite, and Eddie Hanson, Ferguson taking a revolver with him to have some sport. He emptied one chamber and the second refused to go off, and when in the act of examining the cause it was discharged into his breast. He ran a few feet, staggered for a moment, uttering to his companions, "I'm shot," and then fell. Two women, who were also in the field rushed to the victim's side, and young Hanson was despatched to Gibson for assistance, but before he returned the unfortunate young man was dead, having survived the accident only about ten minutes. An inquest was held the same afternoon by Coroner McKeen, and the jury returned a verdict of accidental death. Ferguson was a son of Mr. Robert G. Ferguson, Boston Highlands, formerly of St. John N. B., the latter being a brother of Mrs. Peppers. He had only arrived in Gibson the week previous, to make a short visit, as has been his custom for several summers past. The remains were sent to Boston Monday morning.

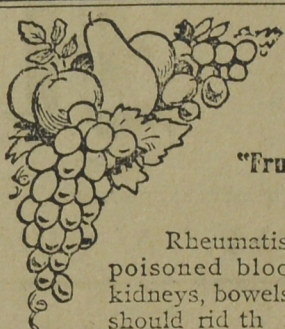

DEATH OF A. A. MILLER.

It is with no ordinary feelings of regret that we record the death of A. A. Miller, dry good merchant, of this city, which occurred about three o'clock Tuesday afternoon, after a serious illness.

Mr. Miller was the only son of our respected fellow citizen, Mr. A. P. Miller, and was born in this city in 1842. He was early apprenticed to the dry goods business with the late John Thomas, and with whom he remained some length of time, and next was employed with Mr. John Armstrong, of St. John. 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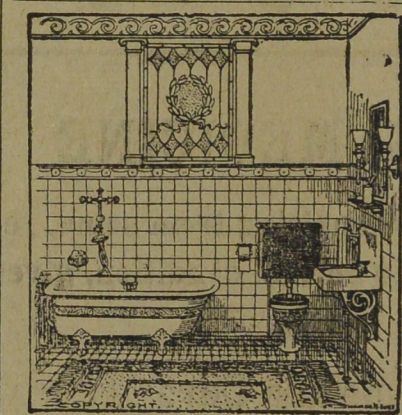
