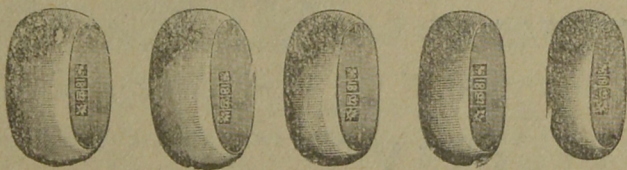

THEY WERE THIRSTY

Residents of Ontario Town Caught Whiskey in cans Dripping from Wrecked Car---
The Sequel

THAMESVILLE, Ont., Oct. 29.—(Special)—Eighteen informations have been issued in connection with the recent railway wreck at Thamesville.
A freight car which contained a quantity of whiskey was smashed in the wreck and the liquor leaking from car was promptly caught in cans by some of the people of Thamesville which is a local option town.
A young man with a camera took a picture of the scene and was selling these pictures, when the people whose faces appeared in the photos served him with notice that they would prosecute him if he did not stop.
At this point the Canadian Pacific Railway detectives were put on the case and after investigating got the names of the men who stole the whiskey and the informations were issued.
Some of the men who have been served with notice to appear in court are among the most prominent residents of the town.

DIED OF INJURIES

Native of Rusiagornish Thrown from Bicycle by Runaway Horse and Lived only Short time.

(Norwich, Conn. Bulletin, Oct. 26.)

Robert D. Campbell, who was knocked off his bicycle at the corner of North Main and Sixth streets, striking on his head, died at the Backus hospital at 4.30 o'clock on Friday afternoon, where he had been taken on Thursday. Mr. Campbell failed to rally and on Thursday it was decided that he had suffered a fractured skull and he was taken to the hospital, where the skull was trephined in the hopes of saving his life.

The news of his death will be learned with regret by his wide circle of friends. Mr. Campbell was employed by H. Blackledge & Company and was returning to work Tuesday noon when a horse attached to a covered wagon collided with him, throwing him forcibly to the ground. The driver was not on the team, the horse being frightened by an automobile. He never regained consciousness.

Mr. Campbell was born in Rusiagornish, Sunbury County, New Brunswick, the son of Samuel and Mary Ann Duncan Campbell. He was born February 18, 1854, and for the past thirty-three years has lived in this city, Hedge avenue, for the past twenty years. He was a carpenter by trade, being an excellent workman, and for a number of years was in the employ of the Norwich and Worcester road in the local shops. For about fifteen years he has been employed by H. Blackledge & Co. His genial disposition and kind nature made him many friends. He was of a quiet disposition, industrious and earnest in whatever he undertook. He was greatly devoted to his home. He was a member of Trinity Episcopal church, Norwich Lodge, No. 12, A. O. U. W., Shetucket Lodge, No. 27, I. O. O. F., and the Carpenters' Union, of which he was warden. He was janitor of the Preston chapel, in which he was much interested, and was treasurer of the Bridge school district, serving his third term.

Mr. Campbell is survived by his wife, his mother, who lived with him, two brothers, William, of Watertown, Mass., and Samuel, of this city, and four sisters, Mrs. Frank Q. Smith, Mrs. Rachel Olin, Miss Martha Campbell and Mrs. Daniel Dean, all of this city. He also leaves four children, Misses Edith J., who is teaching school in Lisbon, Elsie M., and Harold D. and Robert J. Campbell.

THE STOCK MARKET.

Canadian Pacific Dropped Several Points in To-Day's Trading

MONTREAL, Oct. 29.—(Special)—The Stock market evidenced its sensitiveness today by weakening as a result of the advance in the discount rate of the Imperial Bank of Germany.

This will interfere with the flow of gold to America, and has caused financiers to look forward with anxiety to Thursday with the question whether the Bank of England will follow suit.

Canadian Pacific surprised brokers this morning by the showing influence of the stringency more than any others.

This stock all through the recent panic had held remarkably firm. This is on account of large speculation. After closing 156 bid yesterday, London quoted the stock several points down, and the first transaction here was for 153½, the next sale 155½, and later it was offered at 148.

The balance of the local list moved 1 to 3 points, some of the more notable features being Toronto Railway, 88; Power, 83; Nova Scotia, 54½; Detroit, 33½; Twin City, 75½; Montreal Street Railway, 165; Dominion Iron, 14½; Preferred 40 and Bonds 69; MacKay, 51½, and Pfd. 51.

GONE TO SHEDIAC

Rev. Father LeBlanc of Kingsclear left for that Place last Evening--His Successor.

Rev. Father LeBlanc, who for the past seven years has been the popular parish priest of Kingsclear, left last evening for Shediac, to which place he has lately been transferred.
On Sunday last Father LeBlanc celebrated mass at New Market, at which place he preached his farewell sermon. At the conclusion of the service the reverend gentleman was presented with a purse of two hundred dollars by the Irish Catholic parishioners of Cork, Allendale and New Market.

During his residence at Kingsclear the reverend gentleman has worked hard to advance the interests of his parish, which comprise Hanwell, Cork, New Market, Allendale and up river nearly as far as Woodstock. About three years ago the historic old church at Central Kingsclear was destroyed by fire, and the handsome new building which now replaces it, is a monument to his energy.

Father LeBlanc has many friends in this city as well as in up river parishes, who will be sorry to learn of his departure, but will wish him every success in his new field.

While it has not yet been announced who Father LeBlanc's successor will be it is understood that Rev. Father Duke, now curate at Shediac, is the gentleman most likely to receive the appointment.

McADAM BOY'S DEATH

Young Nason Lived in Agony some Hours after being run down by Shunter

Norman Nason, the twelve-year-old son of E. E. Nason, of McAdam Junction, as briefly told in the Herald's despatches, was fatally injured at 9.30 o'clock Monday morning, in the yard at McAdam, and died six hours later after enduring terrible agony. A. C. P. R. brakeman was dropping coaches from No. 32 train, the Woodstock train, which was standing on No. 6 siding, and the cars gliding along the rails after being uncoupled, struck young Nason as he was crossing the track, and cut him badly.

One arm and one leg was severed, and his head was severely injured. The brakeman who occupied the cars says that the lad was walking alongside the track, watching the Boston train, which was standing at the station, and did not look around as he stepped across the rails. The trainman called out to the boy as the heavy cars approached him, but he evidently did not hear until too late. The boy was carried to his home, a short distance away, and Drs. Butler, Johnston and Young attended him, but were unable to save his life. His father is engineer of the C. P. R. steam shovel working at Andover, and he was sent a message to hurry home. The lad passed away, however, at 3.30 o'clock in the afternoon, and the father did not arrive until evening.

LAI TO REST.

The body of the late Mr. Horatio N. Hanson, who died at Fairville on Sunday, arrived here by this morning's train and was interred at Sunnybank cemetery. Services were conducted at the Baptist church, Gibson, by Revs. H. R. Boyer and J. C. Berrie. Mr. R. B. Adams was the officiating undertaker.

TROUBLE AT CORK.

Five residents of Cork have been summoned to appear at the police court here on November 5th, to answer to the charge of obstructing the highway road at that place. Mr. Martin Kennedy is the complainant.

M'KEOWN SWORN IN

Popular St. John Lawyer and Former Solicitor General Accepts Attorney Generalship and will seek Election in St. John County.

Writ Issued--Nomination Nov. 8th Polling Nov. 15th

Hon. Harrison A. McKeown, K. C., of St. John, was sworn into the office of Attorney General at Moncton Monday evening before Lieut. Governor Tweedie, the oaths of office being administered by Mr. Joseph Howp Dickson, K. C., clerk of the executive council. Other gentlemen present included Premier Robinson, and Hon. F. J. Sweeney.
The new Attorney General returned last night to St. John, and will seek election to the legislature in St. John county, Dr. Ruddick, one of the members for that constituency, having resigned his seat to make way for Mr. McKeown.
In the last election in St. John county the government candidates were returned by enormous majorities, notably in prominent criminal cases. Mr. McKeown has been twice married, his present wife being a daughter of the late Mr. John P. C. Burpee, of St. John and a niece of the late Hon. Isaac Burpee, Minister of Customs in the MacKenzie government. In religion Mr. McKeown is a Methodist, and in politics a Liberal, who has done splendid work on the platform for that party, and is recognized as one of the most effective stumpers in the province. His three sisters are respectively the wives of Rev. G. M. Campbell, assistant secretary of the Canadian Bible Society, Mr. George J. Clarke, M. P. P., St. Stephen, and Dr. Bonnell, of Fernie, B. C.

It is not yet known whether the position will nominate a candidate against Mr. McKeown.

MR. M'KEOWN'S CAREER.

Hon. Harrison Andrew McKeown, K. C., was born at St. Stephen, N. B., November 28th, 1863, and is therefore nearly 44 years old.
He is a son of the late Rev. Hezekiah McKeown, a former well known, and popular Methodist clergyman, who at one time was pastor of the church in this city and of his wife, Elizabeth S. Harrison, a native of Shediac, and sister of the late Dr. Thomas Harrison, chancellor of the University of New Brunswick.

Hon. Mr. McKeown completed his education at Mount Allison University, from which he graduated bachelor of arts, 1881, and received the L.L.B. degree from the Toronto University. Entering upon the study of law, he was admitted to the New Brunswick bar in 1884 and soon acquired a lucrative practice in St. John.

Mr. McKeown entered the political field in 1890, when he was elected to the legislature. He was re-elected in 1900 for the county of St. John, and in 1899 and 1903. In 1902 he entered the government without portfolio, and in March, 1903 was appointed Solicitor General, being re-elected by acclamation. He resigned that position in 1904 to contest St. John for a seat in the House of Commons in the bye-election of that year, but was defeated, and was again an unsuccessful candidate for parliament in the general election of the same year. Since then he has not been in political life, but has given unremitting attention to his large law practice, winning many successes.

THE PREMIER PLEASED

Speaking of the appointment Premier Robinson said: "There seems to have been a feverish desire on the part of the local opposition to have some person sworn in as attorney general, and both the opposition barn stormers and their press have been supplementing their lamentably weak attacks by reckless statements that this important office had been hawked about the country from lawyer to lawyer."

"I do not desire to censure our opposition friends too strongly for their oft-repeated misstatements in this regard, as I confess that had I as little real solid ground to stand upon I might have been compelled to resort to similar tactics."

"I can only deny the misstatement and say that in making the offer to the Hon. Mr. McKeown I was influenced by the fact that Mr. McKeown's experience and standing at the bar, his well known ability as a skilful debater both in and out of the house coupled with his residence in the city of St. John, where he will be easily accessible to all those having business with the chief crown officer of the province, make him pre-eminently fitted for the position."

"While there are a number of lawyers in the province with sufficient ability to fill the office creditably whose services were available, I am sure all will agree that none can be found in the province today who would perform the varied duties of the position more acceptably than Mr. McKeown."

"I feel that the province is to be congratulated in securing such an excellent attorney general, and I am sure that even our opposition friends will admit that it was difficult to have Mr. McKeown appointed to the office during his absence in England."
