

The Subject for Some Pointed Remarks by Rev. J. H. MacDonald.

In the Brunswick Street Baptist Church Sunday night the pastor, Rev. J. H. MacDonald, in referring to the tragic death of Mr. Edward Morgans had some strong and pointed remarks to make. He called the church to greater consecration and appealed to the members of his congregation to lead godly and unselfish lives and to extend a helping hand to those in danger.

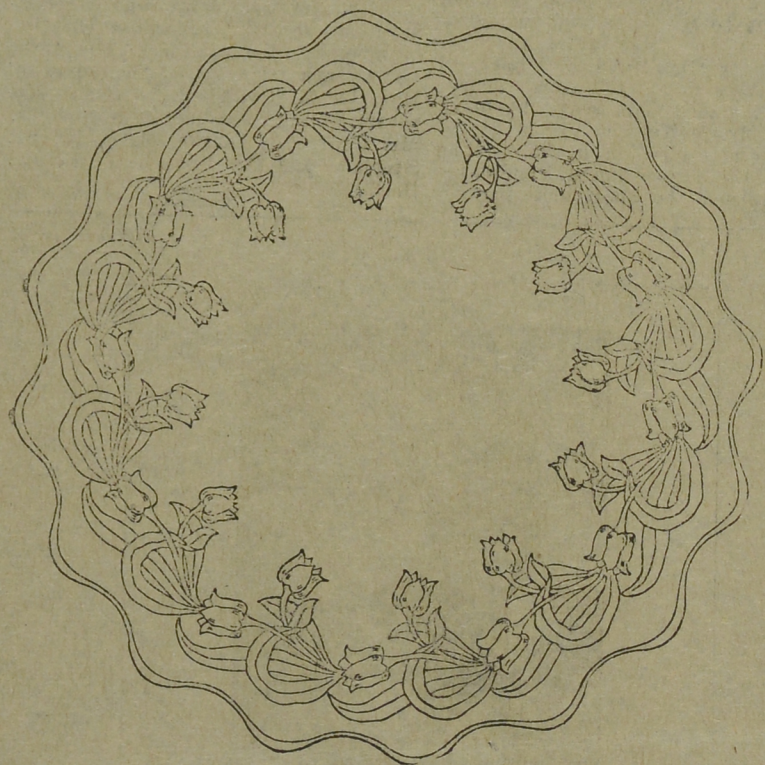
He appealed also to those in authority in the city to enforce its laws and make life as well as prosperity safe. The Canada Temperance Act has been prostituted and made actually a license law. As a result the drink traffic during the past fifteen months has led to the sacrifice of life. There is perhaps no place in Canada where during the same period a greater number of men, according to our population, have been sacrificed on the altar of strong drink.

Referring to the testimony given at the coroner's inquest he said: What an unmitigated angel the bar-tender of the Hotel Commercial must be! And what a kindly and benevolent soul must the proprietor of that notorious place also be! From the testimony given one would suppose the bar of that house was a sort of a Good Samaritan Home where home-

less and friendless wayfarers were taken in and tenderly cared for and soothed in their dying hours and not lone to death. You would suppose that over its portals might be written "The Way of Heaven" and not the gate of hell. Such evidence as that may oblige the jury to bring in a verdict that will attach no legal blame to the place where the unfortunate man met his death; but the day is coming when the cry of broken hearted widows and mothers will not go unrevenged.

It is not long since it was reported that the city authorities during a period of financial stringency finding they could not sell city bonds to advantage consulted with a number of citizens prominent in financial circles and no doubt they acted wisely. The preacher respectfully called on the Mayor and members of the committee that have to do with the administration of Justice and the regulation of the police if they find themselves unable to cope with this evil that they call in like manner a number of the citizens who are known to have the moral interests of the city at heart so that our laws may be enforced and the dens of vice which abound may be wiped out.

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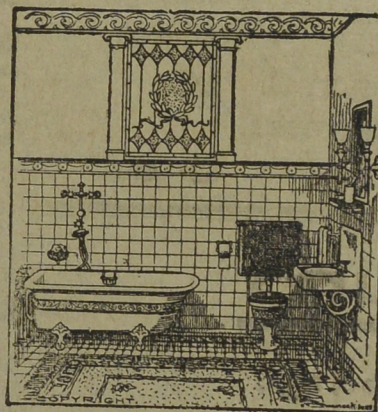
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
