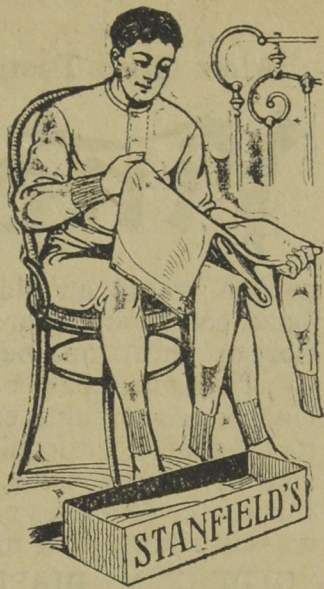

And a Fine Speaker, Second to none in the Province.

Said the Gleaner of Hon. H. A. McKeown

When Hon. H. A. McKeown was appointed Solicitor-General in March, 1903, he received a splendid certificate of character and fitness for the position from our much esteemed contemporary, The Fredericton Gleaner, and now that the gentleman has been promoted to the Attorney-Generalship he may naturally expect a hearty tribute from the same newspaper. At that time The Gleaner said Mr. McKeown was "an excellent lawyer, a fine speaker," and just the man for the office, and moreover, it expressed a strong hope that he would not be opposed in his re-election, and that Mr. Hazen would not lend himself to any such scheme.

It was then only five weeks after a general election, and it is now only a few months before a general election, so the Gleaner's argument against opposing Mr. McKeown now will apply with equal force.

The Gleaner then, as now, edited and controlled by Mr. James H. Crockett, published the following complimentary reference to Mr. McKeown in its editorial columns of March 26, 1903:

"Last evening the Hon. H. A. McKeown, who has been a member of the government without office for the past two years, was sworn in Solicitor-General. This is an arrangement that will be satisfactory to a majority of our people, for experience has shown that there is no economy in being without a Solicitor-General. As to the entire fitness of Mr. McKeown for his new position, there can be no question. He is an excellent lawyer, and a fine speaker; second to none in the province, and his political strength was very clearly demonstrated by the handsome vote which he received at the late election in St. John. The writ has been already issued for a new election, but it is not likely there will be any contest. It would certainly be a most ungracious thing to oppose Mr. McKeown at a by-election within five weeks after a general election, and it is not likely that Mr. Hazen will lend himself to any such arrangement."

STANLEY MAN'S DEATH.

Mr. Andrew Waugh, a well known and esteemed farmer, of Stanley, died at Mrs. Richards' private hospital this morning after a brief illness from pneumonia. He came to this city on Friday last to transact some business and while here contracted pneumonia, and was removed from his hotel to the private hospital. Since then he has been steadily sinking, and his death was not a surprise. The deceased gentleman was seventy-five years of age and a widower. One son, Robert Waugh, of Stanley, and Mrs. William Cochrane, of Cross Creek, survive him. The body has been prepared for burial by Undertaken Cohn G. Adams, and will be taken to Stanley this evening for burial.

DEATH AT PEEIAC.

Mr. John Bailey, an aged and respected resident of Peiac, died at that place last evening at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Isaac Lawson. The deceased was 79 years of age, and is survived by a widow and two sons, George W. and R. M. Bailey of Gibson. Three daughters also survive. They are Mrs. Isaac Lawson of Peiac, Mrs. Frank Mitchell of Marysville, and Mrs. James A. Porter of Dear Island, Charlotte county. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon. Service will be held at the house at one o'clock, and at house at three o'clock. Rev. Mr. Trafton, assisted by Rev. A. A. Rideout will conduct the services. Geo. W. Adams will act as funeral director.
