

ELECTROCUTING A TRIBE.

Japan Trying to Exterminate Formosa Head-Hunters.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., December 11.—The extermination of savage, murderous head-hunters by electrocution is the latest novelty introduced by the Japanese in Formosa, according to Walter Clifton, manager of a Formosa mercantile company, who arrived here yesterday on the Japanese liner America Maru.

"Those head-hunters," said Clifton, "number about one hundred thousand and infest the entire east coast of

the island. All efforts to civilize them have failed. They recently inveigled a party of 300 Chinese and Japanese into an ambush on the pretence of showing some treasure, and killed all but three of them.

"In punishment for this treachery the Japanese inaugurated a method of electrocution. Large bodies of troops were sent out, and now when a company of head-hunters is located the place is surrounded by a wire fence. The wires are charged with electricity. The soldiers begin to shoot; the savages begin to stampede, and then the deadly wires get those the bullets miss."

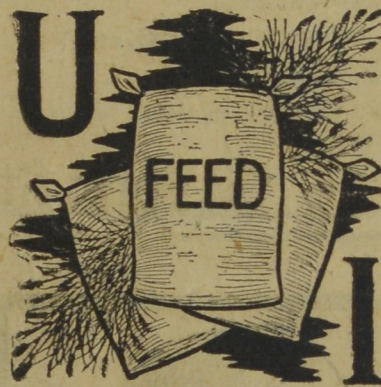

NEW YORK'S FIRST BLUE SUNDAY

Most Exciting thing was the Meetings to Protest against Closed Theatres

NEW YORK, December 11.—Reports from all over greater New York were brought in to police headquarters yesterday showing that on the previous day New York spent the bluest Sunday within the recollection of the oldest inhabitant. The metro police spent its Sunday just as Justice O'Gorman declared, that the law, devised for the purpose by up-state rural legislators, intended it should be spent.

The most frivolous and exciting amusement in the entire city was found in the gatherings of thousands of persons in various places to protest against the new method of administration. Men and women could not go to theatres or concerts, but they could meet and denounce those who did not let them.

Most important of the meetings of the day were those of the United German Singing Societies and the United German Societies of New York, representing all told, not less than 300,000 members and the labor unionists representing 250,000 workmen. Between 2,500 and 3,000 delegates of the two German organizations met on Terrace Garden, in Fifty-seventh street, and declared for action which would bring the laws on the books more in keeping with the spirit of the times.

Other meetings were held on street corners and in parks, and the police had the utmost difficulty in keeping some of them in order.

Not a theatre opened its doors. Not a moving picture show batted a single flicker of the calcium, except in Brooklyn, where five of them had been bright enough to take out an injunction. Scores of "penny arcades" were closed up by officers, who threatened to arrest the proprietor if he kept open, and only in one or two places did the arrest have to be made.

Immense throngs paraded up and down Broadway, laughing at the

"closed" signs on the theatres and geying the policemen, but everybody was orderly.

Only the liquor business was unaffected. The serving of a "meal," for which the permanent and unchangeable property sandwich has been declared legally sufficient, enabled any saloon with a hotel license to do all the business they wanted to.

Blue law advocates yesterday were much pleased with the result of the experiment, and declared that the orderliness of the day showed that the laws were acceptable to the better class of New Yorkers.

SURRENDER OF THE BLACK NAPOLEON

Dinizulu has given himself up to Authorities--A So of King Cetewayo

PIETERMARITZBURG, Natal, Dec. 10.—Dinizulu has surrendered to the Natal authorities without resistance of any kind. He is the Zulu King who has been held responsible for the threatening situation on the borders of Natal arising from the increasing boldness of the natives, who have of late been indulging in murder and other outrages.

Dinizulu, son of the famous Cetewayo, King of the Zulus, has been referred to the "Black Napoleon," because he was at one time exiled to the Island of St. Helena by the British.

Unlike Cetewayo, who gave so much trouble to the British authorities, Dinizulu is an up-to-date monarch, from the South African standpoint, and wears European clothing instead of skins and fashions.

At the close of the troublesome period of 1870-1880 the Zulus, under King Cetewayo became a grave danger to the British Colonies, and war followed. After a lengthy campaign during which the Prince Imperial, son of the French Emperor Napoleon III was killed, General Wolsely August 28, 1885, crushing defeated the Zulu army at Ulundi and captured Cetewayo, who later was taken to England, where he was lionized. The British in 1883 to end local difficulties between the Zulu chiefs, restored Cetewayo to his rank of King and kept him at Ekurhuleni, more as a captive than free. But Cetewayo who lost his prestige, was again disposed before the end of 1883 and died the next year.

DINIZULU AT ST. HELENA.
Cetewayo was succeeded by his son, Dinizulu, who soon became hostile to the British, and, aided by the Boers, attempted to form the so-called New Republic, and extended his control to Santa Lucia Bay and Um-latdi.

In 1887 the Boers and British arrived at an understanding by which the new republic was recognized, but it was annexed to the South African Republic in 1888, and Zululand proper was declared to be a British Crown Colony.

Dinizulu rose in insurrection in 1888, and was captured and exiled to St. Helena, but later he was sent back to his country, where he seems to have sided with the more warlike of his subjects and caused considerable trouble.

BAMBAATA'S REBELLION.
His attitude is alleged to have been the indirect cause of the murder of a magistrate, Mr. Standbank, and several mounted police, in May, 1906, which was followed by an uprising, headed by Chief Bambaata, as a protest against the collection of the poll tax.

A strong force of troops, mounted police and volunteers had to be sent against Bambaata before the disturbance for which the Ethiopian church was partly blamed, was suppressed, with considerable loss of life. Bambaata was among the natives killed.

Recently the Zulus and Natal natives have been very restless, and a number of murders and other outrages have occurred. Two chiefs, friendly to the British, were killed, and Dinizulu was held to be responsible for the situation, which threatened to result in a wholesale uprising of the native warriors. Consequently formal charges were made against the Zulu king, a warrant for his arrest was issued, and a magistrate—Mr. Stewart, was entrusted with the task of taking Dinizulu into custody.
