

PEKIN-PARIS 10,000 MILE MOTOR RACE.

Prince Borghese Completes One-third of Journey. Famous Motorist's Amazing Adventures.

Prince Borghese, the Italian willing peasant. The prince competitor in the Pekin to Paris motor race, arrived at Omsk on Sunday, having completed in a month and four days one-third of his 10,000 mile course. He has now 6,600 miles to go.

The arrival was not generally expected in the town, but the large, grey-painted car, with its kahaki-clad, muddy, and be-goggled travellers, escorted by galloping gendarmes, created a great sensation among the Sunday crowd of men in scarlet shirts and women in pink petticoats, the garb of the region. Marvelling greatly, they gathered round the hotel, gazing open-mouthed at the strange machine.

STUPENDOUS TASK.

In spite of the day's journey of 300 miles, over hot and dusty roads, Prince Borghese, tired and thirsty as he had arrived, accorred a London Daily Mail correspondent an interview.

He told of the fatigue, the difficulties, the accidents of the 3,300 miles across trackless deserts, mountain passes, and marshes, over rickety bridges and dangerous railway tracks. Sometimes he dropped under a scorching sun, ankle-deep in dust; then for seventeen consecutive days it rained. Between Kiachta and Tomsk the car often sank ankle-deep in the mud and had to be dug and lifted out, with the assistance of

The excellence of the car, which is of entirely Italian make, is proved by the fact that only three tires on the back wheels had to be replaced, while the front wheels had not been changed since leaving Pekin. It is a 40-h.p. car, and uses 60lb. of benzine over sixty-two miles. As it carries a supply of 600lb. it is able to cover some 620 miles between depots. This was necessary in crossing the Gobi Desert and parts of Siberia. Thanks to the help of Prince Leuchtenberg and the brothers Eobel, benzine stores are established at short distances.

Often on the journey water could not be obtained, and Prince Borghese and his two companions had to quench their thirst by drinking water drawn from the motor-car's cooling tank. Smelling vilely of oil and benzine, this was palatable only to a thirst engendered by the scorching heat of the desert.

Meanwhile, similar adventures are befaling the other competitors, who are many leagues behind. Everywhere they are received with amazing hospitality.

MAULED BY AN ELEPHANT

Narrow Escape of Keeper in Bronx Park Zoo

NEW YORK, July 31.—In a terrible rage because he apparently suspected his keeper of trying to steal a penny from him, Gunda, the prize elephant of the Bronx Park Zoo, almost killed Otto Hoffman, the keeper yesterday, in full sight of the afternoon crowd. A hard fight with the enraged animal followed, and to save Hoffman's life a dozen keepers had to drive pitchforks into Gunda's hide while a squad of detectives fought to drive the panic-stricken crowd of women and children out of the animal house.

Gunda is a trick elephant, and one of the things he has learned is to pick up pennies that are thrown into his cage and with his trunk throw them into a box and ring a bell. This has been one of the elephant's favorite pastimes for more than a year.

He gets so much delight out of it that he becomes ugly when big crowds pass through the house in which he is confined and no coins are thrown to him.

Yesterday a coin thrown to the elephant fell short of the cage, and Hoffman bent to pick it up. Gunda's trunk slid through the bars and circled the keeper's waist. Then, squealing and trumpeting he dragged the man into the cage, crushing him between the bars.

There rose a piercing shriek from Hoffman, followed instantly by a heavy thud as he was flung full force from Gunda's trunk, and then the elephant walked deliberately to the man and prepared to trample him. As Gunda was getting in position to crush the life out of him Hoffman had sufficient presence of mind to reach up, grip the animal's tasks and wind one leg around the thick part of the trunk. His screams brought several keepers to the spot. Gunda was driven back into a corner and the victim carried out. His injuries are not necessarily fatal.

WIRELESS 'PHONES

Experiments from Oxford to Cambridge—"Hullo New York" Soon?

London Daily Mail.—Experiments in wireless telephony are shortly to be conducted on an extensive scale in Great Britain. For some time past experts have been making investigations in Germany and Denmark, and so successful have they proved in the latter country that two persons, twenty-five miles apart, speaking into instruments totally unconnected by wires, were able to converse distinctly.

The Amalgamated Radio-Telegraphy Company possess experimental wireless telegraph stations at Oxford and Cambridge. These are now being converted to the wireless telephony system of Mr. Poulsen, the Danish inventor, and the management hope that when arrangements are completed the voice of a person at Cambridge will be audible at Oxford, sixty miles away.

Whether the system will ever prove "commercially possible" remains to be seen. The great obstacle to this has hitherto been the difficulty of obtaining some scheme of perfect attunement, in order that messages sent from a certain transmitter should not be received at any station other than that for which they are intended. This obstacle the Amalgamated Radio-Telegraphy Company now claim to have overcome.

Mr. W. O'Meara, engineer in chief to the postal service, when asked his opinion regarding wireless telephony, told an "Over-Seas" "Daily Mail" representative that he was not at all sceptical on the matter. "I do not wish to pose as a prophet," he said, "but a conversation across the Atlantic would not surprise me."

NEIGHBORLY ACT.

Canadian Government Grants United States Authorities Lease to Have Training Ship on Great Lakes

OTTAWA, Ont., July 31.—(Special)—The United States government has made another application for a training ship on the Great Lakes.

Some time ago an application was made and granted for a United States cruiser to go through the Canadian canals to be utilized as a training ship on Lake Erie. This time the application is made for one on Lake Ontario.

While the United States has formally presented the application to the Dominion Government it is really from the State of New York, and made on behalf of the naval militia with headquarters at Rochester.

It is understood that the application will be granted. There are no guns on these old cruisers which are to be used as training ships. Whatever guns are required for the naval officers and cadets will be kept ashore.

The granting of this application is regarded as a neighborly act, and in no way interferes with the arrangement as to cruisers on the Great Lakes which exists between both countries.
