EXCELLENT RESULTS.

The sale of the horse importation in Fredericton was very satisfactory to the government. Hon. Mr. Farris, Commissioner for Agriculture, when seen by The Herald, after the sale, expressed himself as well satisfied at the prices obtained. "The best sale of government imported horses ever made in this province," was the way Mr. Farris expressed it, and he laughed at the Tory organ's statement of the cost of the importation.

The government does not go into the horse importation business to make money, but it uses its resources to place within the reach of the farmers and lumbermen of New Brunswick a good class of animals for breeding purposes at a reasonable figure.

There are few private individuals who have the means or other facilities for making an importation of thoroughbred horses, but through the good offices of the government those who desire to improve their breeds have the opportunity presented to them by such sales as took place in this city on Wednesday.

The horses themselves were without doubt the best collection of their kind ever brought to New Brunswick. They won the praise of everybody who is able to judge intelligently in the matter, and much deserved praise is bestowed on Mr. Farris and Mr. King, who made the purchase.

The effort of the more mendacious portion of the Tory press to discount the importation has utterly failed, and the purchase as well as the excellent results of the sale redound to the credit of the government, and reflects special credit on the commissioner for agriculture.

Twenty other horses of the importation are to be sold at Moncton on the 7th, inst. and equally good results are anticipated.

COAL VS. STEEL.

There is a great gathering of legal talent and coal and steel magnates at Sydney, N. S. to attend the trial of the case between those two great industrial concerns, the Dominion Steel and Iron Company and the Dominion Coal Company.

The question in dispute is the character of the coal furnished under contract by the latter company to the former, which a few months ago, refused to accept the article offered by the Coal Company. Judge Longley of the Nova Scotia Supreme Court bench is the trial justice, and leading lawyers from Halifax, St. John, Quebec and Montreal and Toronto are engaged in the case, which is running up a bill of costs for the loser to pay at the rate of several thousand dollars per day.

Such eminent men as Sir William VanHorne, President Jas. Ross, of the Steel Company, and President Plummer, of the Coal Company, are included in the long list of witnesses and the trial is exciting a great degree of interest.

Musical instruction in the schools of Fredericton is bound to come, although the trustee board is slow in the matter, which has apparently been postponed for further information and the scheme is somewhat marred by a reduction of its extent. Those at the board favorable to the enterprise must not lose heart.

CURRENT COMMENT.

Earl Grey is to have the distinguished honor, while in Fredericton, of dining with the city council, and the aldermen are said to be earnestly studying the latest publications on table etiquette.

The Telegraph and Times announce themselves for "British Connection." Mr. John McKane, who owns the twin Tory organs, is an old countryman, and has forged the golden chain by which the organs are enslaved with Yankee gold.

The projectors of the statue to Queen Victoria, which is proposed to be erected in this city, should tap the north shore millionaire for a generous contribution. He gave liberally to the Burns monument erection.

That Charlottetown lawyer, who has been brought up with a round turn, made hay while the sun shone. To get \$16,000 behind the game at the expense of trusting clients and others in two years, rather beats the New Brunswick record.

Woodstock seems so travel in hard luck, with respect to the large number of destructive fires which visit it. Unfortunately, that of Wednesday was attended with the loss of a life—that of a brave fireman, who died in the execution of his duty.

"I am a self-made man," declared a pompous politician on the stump to impress the rival voters of his great importance and claims on their support, to which came the chilling response from a man in the audience: "Your excuse is satisfactory."

Welcome to the Massachusetts cricketers. They are a nice lot of gentlemen, some of them Englishmen, others Yankees, and one a pure bred Australian. They play the game for the love of it, and they play it well. May they have a pleasant and successful trip through the Maritime Provinces.

One of the funniest things that has happened in New Brunswick journalism for many years is the declaration of Independence issued by the St. John Telegraph and Times. The original document which made its appearance at Philadelphia in 1776, scarce created a greater sensation. There isn't a school-boy in the province who would not grin if told that these newspapers, with Mr. McKane and the Tory party at the back of them, are going to be independent.

Premier Whitney, of Ontario, has a habit of using a rather extravagant form of language to express himself and is often the butt of the press funny writers. At present Mr. Whitney is in England, which leads the Toronto News to observe: "Mr. Whitney remarked yesterday to the King: 'I believe, Sir, that all the vicissitudes of your predecessors in this supremely exalted office were not to be compared with the tribulations I endure in listening to the crass absurdities and brain-wearying extravagances of Geo. Mr. Farris and Mr. King are honest men, who do not need newspaper talk to support their claims in that respect, but it seems despicable that they should be assaulted without an iota of evidence to sustain the attack.
