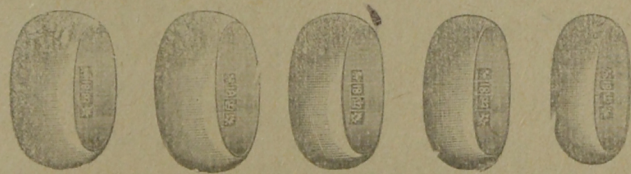

SAVED THE TRAIN

Prompt and Heroic Action of a Young Lady Averted a Terrible Railway Disaster

WELLAND, Ont., Oct. 23.—(Special.)—By her presence of mind and prompt action, Miss Mabel Wheeling, a country school teacher, on Monday night saved the fast Michigan express, from almost certain derailment and probably averted a great railway disaster.

Miss Wheeling was walking along the tracks from this town about 9 o'clock at night, when she discovered a pile of iron on one of the rails of the westbound tracks.

She tried to lift the heavy pieces of metal from the rails, but was not able.

Retaining her presence of mind, Miss Wheeling dashed back to the signal tower on the west side of the

canal. Arriving there breathless and exhausted, she told the signalman of the condition of the track.

Without delay as the train was almost due, the station was called up by telephone and just as the express neared the semaphore lights flashed the danger signal, and the train was brought to a standstill.

Yesterday afternoon, the Michigan Central detective, Mr. Nanham, arrested Edward Palmer, who lives with a farmer near the spot as being the guilty party.

Palmer, who is twenty years of age, confessed to an officer, and when arraigned before Magistrate Burgard, pleaded guilty and was remanded.

CHANCE FOR YOUNG MEN

Dominion Government Offering Special Inducements for Land Surveyors.

OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—(Special.)—The Government has decided to offer special inducements to young men who desire to become surveyors.

Before being eligible for final examination as a surveyor, the law requires three years service as a pupil to the Dominion lands surveyor of which 12 months must be on a survey party.

In the case of graduates in engineering these periods are reduced to 12 months and 6 months respectively.

To help pupils in complying with the requirements of the law, the government has decided to offer places in survey parties to those who have successfully passed the preliminary examination.

Graduates in engineering will go as assistants at \$4 per day and there others will be paid \$3 a day.

UNSOUND IN DOCTRINE

Wesleyan College Professor Dismissed from His Position.

MONTREAL, Oct. 23.—(Special.)—Rev. R. G. Workman has been asked to resign the chair of old testament exegesis at the Wesleyan Theological College.

The decision was reached by the College board about two o'clock this morning, after a six hours' sitting.

It is claimed by the board of Wesleyan College that Dr. Workman's views on the doctrine mentioned are in general Unitarian.

Dr. Workman was formerly a member of the Victoria University faculty, and was asked to resign as the result of some of his utterances.

THE STOCK MARKET.

Prices Declined in Sympathy with Wall Street Operations.

MONTREAL, Oct. 23.—(Special.)—Prices in local stocks weakened one to three points this morning in cases of most active issues, the chief influence being the continued New York financial troubles.

The decline in Dominion Steel was a notable feature. The price touched 12 1/2, although pfd. held at 40; Detroit declined from 37 to 35 1/2; Montreal to 78 1/2; Mexican 39 1/2; Twin City 80; Toronto Railway 94; Toledo 12; Montreal Street Railway 165; Rio, 32 1/2; Lake of the Woods Milling, 69.

CHURCH GUTTED

Baptist Church at Halifax Almost Totally Destroyed.

HALIFAX, Oct. 23.—(Special.)—There was \$1,000 insurance on the West End Baptist church on Quinpool road which was almost totally destroyed by fire this morning.

Pastor Rev. G. A. Lawson is at present out of town. The loss will be \$8,000.

MET THE PREMIER.

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 23.—(Special.)—Hon. S. N. Parent, president of the Quebec Bridge Company, Mr. R. Audette, vice-president, with Hon. John Sharples, Gaspard Lemoine, Hugh Allan, J. B. Latilbert and H. M. Prince, all directors of the company, waited upon Sir Wilfrid Laurier today and talked over matters connected with the company.

SPLENDID CONVENTION

Sunday School Workers Here from all Parts of the Province--Officers Chosen.

The annual convention of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Sunday school association opened in St. Paul's church last evening. The audience was a very large one, and was made up principally of delegates and Sunday school workers. Rev. G. A. Kuhring, rector of St. John's (Stone) church, St. John, opened the proceedings with a Bible lesson, which was very much enjoyed.

The president of the association, Mr. Robert Reid of St. John, then took the chair and delivered his annual address, which was most attentively listened to. He extended a hearty welcome to the delegates, also to Mrs. Brynor, and expressed the hope that the convention would be of a very helpful character to all connected with it. He mentioned the fact that the association had met in Fredericton on three previous occasions viz., 1886, 1894 and 1901, and concluding said: "We meet in the celestial city, the city of political advantages, the city of some of the finest residential streets in the province, the best time of the year when nature has on its autumn robe of varied hues."

The president referred briefly to the convention held at Montague, P. E. I., last week, and also the world's convention held at Rome in May last. He referred briefly to the death of the late Rev. Dr. Potts, chairman of the International Lesson Committee, and paid a tribute to his memory. In closing he urged the delegates to erect a tabernacle with four square foundation stones as follows:

1.—The Bible, God's message to man.

2.—Prayer, getting acquainted with God.

3.—Faith, taking God at His word.

4.—Science, the expression of love.

Rev. A. D. McLeod of Maddock, P. E. I., was called upon and responded with a vigorous address. He spoke very hopefully of Sunday school work on the Island, and incidentally remarked that good work was being done there on behalf of the cause of temperance. He predicted that the convention would be a grand success.

Miss Lindsay of St. John, was next called upon and rendered a vocal solo in a charming manner.

The feature of the evening was the address of Mrs. Mary Foster Brynet, of Illinois, a member of the International committee, who is recognized as one of the leading Sabbath School workers in the neighboring republic. Her address was devoted principally to the World's Sunday School Convention at Rome, which she attended as a delegate. Mrs. Brynet is a very fluent and pleasing speaker, possessed of fine descriptive powers, and her address was followed with the greatest interest. At the outset she extended greetings from the State of S. S. conventions of Maine and Vermont. Speaking of the World's convention she said that thirty-seven nationalities were represented, and as more than one-half of the delegates were from the United States. Two steamers were engaged to transport them across the Atlantic. The steamer, by which she travelled, called at the Azores and Algiers, and the delegates were given an opportunity to visit the missionary stations at those places and inspect the work first hand. The ladies of the party were so interested in the mission at Algeria that they subscribed a fund of \$800 to enable two additional missionaries to be added to the staff. Later on the male members of the party, not to be outdone, met and pledged a fund of \$55,000 to establish mission stations in Northern Africa, with the object of combating Mohammedanism. Before the close of the convention this fund was increased to \$75,000.

Referring to the convention Mrs. Brynet said that it was composed of 1,118 delegates, 625 of whom came from North America, 14 being from Canada. Rev. J. B. Ganong, the Field Secretary, was the representative of New Brunswick. The delegates from North America travelled 12,850 miles, and the average distance travelled by all the delegates was 5,150 miles. A great many courtesies were extended to the delegates, and the Italian government, besides allowing them free admission to places of amusement, allowed them to travel on the railways at reduced rates. No public building could be secured large enough to accommodate all the delegates at one time, but they got over this difficulty quite easily, by having the delegates from different countries hold separate conferences. One of the most astonishing features of the convention was the many samples of Sabbath school literature displayed for the benefit of the delegates. They were given the privilege of holding one meeting in the great Roman Coliseum, and while on their way to Jerusalem, Rev. Dr. Potts conducted a service on Mar's Hill. She thought these meetings would never be forgotten by the delegates.

In closing the speaker referred briefly to the convention at Prince

Rev. Mr. Rideout, in his report, stated that he had addressed ten meetings during the year in the counties of York, Northumberland and Queens. He dwelt on the great importance of the work, and urged the co-operation of the pastors.

Mrs. Bullock's report for the temperance department was listened to with much interest. Owing to circumstances over which she had no control, all the plans formulated had not been carried out, and she had found it very difficult to obtain statistics. Three thousand copies of a song entitled "The Cigarette Must Go," had been printed and circulated for use on Cigarette day, which fell on March 24th last. St. John has seventeen temperance departments, with a membership of 730, and York has five, with a membership of 325. Altogether there are 66 departments in the province, with a membership of 2,436. Mrs. Bullock acknowledged in graceful terms the many kindnesses and words of sympathy received during the year from pastors and other workers.

The new president was escorted to the chair shortly before twelve o'clock, and briefly thanked the convention for the honor done him. The number of delegates in attendance now exceeds one hundred and fifty.

EXECUTIVE REPORT.

The following is the report of the Executive Committee:

During the year that has just passed since its last report to this association your committee has held regular meetings, though less frequently than in former years, a change having been made from monthly to quarterly meetings.

Whether this change is in the best interests of the association can only be proved by a further trial.

WORLD'S CONVENTION.

During the year the world's convention was held in Rome, at which our field-secretary was privileged to attend and where a decided advance in Sunday school work was made, especially in the line of missionary labors.

INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION.

Next June the triennial convention of the International Sunday school association, is to be held at Louisville, Ky., and the preparation should be made by many of our provincial workers to attend and receive the inspiration that such gatherings always give.

OUR CONVENTION.

The convention held in St. Andrew's church, St. John, last year, was attended by Mr. W. C. Pierce, from the International Association, and proved to be one of the most helpful yet held.

We are grateful to the International Association for the aid they rendered by allowing this brother to come to us, and also for sending to
