

DEATH OF MRS. J. J. FRASER.

Highly Esteemed Fredericton Lady Suddenly Called Away at St. John.

The sad news of the death at St. John yesterday afternoon of Mrs. Jane M. P. Fraser, widow of the late Hon. John J. Fraser, Lieutenant Governor of the province, was received with great regret by her large circle of friends and acquaintances in this city. Mrs. Fraser has not been in the enjoyment of good health for some weeks, and about 10 days ago went to St. John in the hope that the change would be of a beneficial nature. While staying at the Royal Hotel she contracted pleurisy and pneumonia and removed to Miss Hegan's hospital for treatment. Although she had the best of medical care and everything possible was done for her, she continued to sink rapidly and the end came shortly after five o'clock yesterday afternoon.

The deceased was born in this city a little more than seventy years ago. She was one of the four daughters of the late Hon. Charles Fisher, sometime judge of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick. In May, 1841, she became the second wife of Hon. John James Fraser, then judge of the Supreme Court of the province. Previous to his elevation to the bench, Mr. Fraser had

been attorney general and premier of New Brunswick.

In December, 1893, Judge Fraser became Lieutenant Governor of the province and continued to discharge his duties up to the fall of 1896, when he had an administrator appointed and accompanied by Mrs. Fraser, and her sister, Miss Fisher, left on a trip to Southern Europe for the benefit of his health. He died at Genoa, Italy, on November 24th of that year. His body was brought back to this city and interred at Forest Hill cemetery.

After the death of her husband Mrs. Fraser continued to reside at Farrall Place, Queen Street. The sudden death of her sister, two years ago, was a severe blow to her, and since then she has been seen very little in public. Her marriage to the late Governor Fraser was without issue, and she is survived by no immediate relatives. The late Mr. L. P. Fisher, of Woodstock was her uncle, and Dr. Bayard Fisher of Marysville, W. S. Fisher of St. John, George E. Fisher of Chatham, Mrs. D. Pottinger of Moncton, Mr. W. M. Connell of Woodstock are near family connections.

The late Mrs. Fraser was possessed of a noble Christian character and her loveable disposition, many philanthropic acts won for her the esteem of all who enjoyed her acquaintance. She was very popular in social circles, and her beautiful home was quite frequently the scene of pleasant functions.

Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Fraser Winslow, and Mrs. George J. Bliss, intimate friends of the deceased lady went to St. John last evening, and will accompany the body to Fredericton this evening. It will be taken to Farrall Place, from which the funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at 3.30 o'clock. Services will be conducted at the Cathedral by Rev. Sub-Dean Street and interment will be made in the family lot at Forest Hill cemetery.

CLOSE TO \$30,000

Surveyor General Sweeney says Revenue from Game Licenses this year will be large.

Hon. F. J. Sweeney, surveyor-general, is among the visitors to the city today, and he told a representative of The Herald that the total receipts for the sale of game licenses this season will run very close to the \$30,000 mark. Although the weather conditions have been anything but favorable for outings, and many American sportsmen were unable to fill their engagements with guides for business reasons, already the substantial sum of \$25,000 has been paid into the provincial exchequer by resident and non-resident sportsmen. The hunting season still has five weeks to run, and the surveyor-general is quite positive that from \$3,000 to \$5,000 will yet be collected from the sale of game licenses. Last season the total receipts from this source was slightly in excess of \$27,000, and it was easily the best record made in the history of the province up to that time.

The present local government has not only protected the big game of the province as it was never protected before, but has succeeded in making it one of its principal sources of revenue. The work of advertising the game resources of the province has been carried on by the Tourist Associations, who have for some years been receiving generous grants for the purpose from the government. It might be added here that in 1896, the year the Fredericton Tourist Association was organized, the revenue from the sale of game licenses was less than \$300.

MRS. MACKEY'S DEATH.

Mrs. Emily Mackey, widow of the late Mr. R. H. Mackey, died this morning at her home on Brunswick street, after a lingering illness from Bright's disease. She was formerly Miss Emily Roberts of this city, and was forty-two years of age. Her only daughter passed away a few months ago. Mr. James Roberts of Marysville, is a brother of the deceased. The funeral will take place at four o'clock tomorrow afternoon, with services by Rev. Canon Cowie. Mr. John G. Adams has charge of the arrangements.
