

CONJUGAL INFELICITY.

Deserted Husband Follows Wife from Philadelphia to Moncton--Another Man in the Case.

Moncton, July 20—(Special)—There was an unhappy family reunion at Moncton depot last night.

The party consisted of Jacob Zeitz, his wife and three children. Zeitz was the in the role of an injured husband. He hails from Philadelphia, where he is engaged in the tailoring business.

He arrived in Moncton last evening on the St. John express in search of his wife, whom he alleges deserted him without cause or reason.

Zeitz states that his spouse ran away from her Philadelphia home with another Jew by the name of Herovich, a junk dealer, who is supposed to be at present in Montreal.

When Mrs. Zeitz left home she took with her, her three children, the youngest of whom is a mere babe. The party put up at the Depot last night and the children slept soundly on the floor oblivious to all turmoil around them or parental squabbles.

Zeitz claimed that Herovich had been visiting at her home in Philadelphia for two or three days at a time, and on departing from his last visit he was accompanied by Mrs. Zeitz. They were promptly followed by the enraged husband. He overtook the pair and after some argument, the woman agreed to return home, which she did.

All went happily again for a few months, but about a month ago she

again left home, taking with her this time their three children, and incidentally sixty-four dollars belonging to her husband.

This time she came to Canada, first to St. John and on finding Zeitz was hot on the trail, Herovich departed for Montreal, and the woman came on to Moncton yesterday.

Zeitz says that before separating, the two had arranged to meet in Montreal. Zeitz's first act on arrival here was to try and convince his wife of her folly, and induce her to return to their once happy home.

His pleadings, however, met with a cool response. The woman seemed deaf to her husband's pleadings.

There was considerable talk between the pair, and on one occasion the runaway wife displayed a very hostile attitude. She rolled up her sleeves and proceeded to end everything there and then.

Bystanders prevented the husband from being seriously injured, although he is wearing a discolored optic as a result of the argument.

When asked what steps he proposed to take in regard to regaining possession of his wife and family, Zeitz stated that he intended laying a complaint before the police magistrate.

Up to the present the unhappy family group are still hopelessly divided, as before the deserted husband's arrival upon the scene.

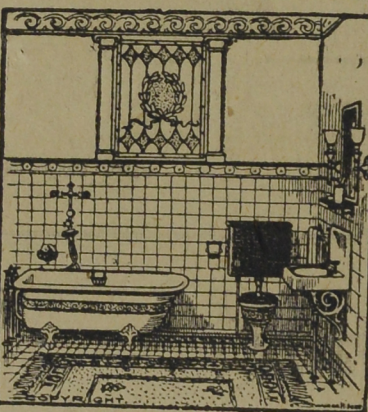
