THE JOKE ON McBRIDE.

Premier McBride, of British Columbia attempted to make political popularity for himself by abruptly leaving the interprovincial conference last summer at Ottawa when the representatives of the other provinces refused to agree to the exorbitant demands which he made for his province in the readjustment of the federal subsidies.

He went home to British Columbia dissolved the legislature, played the martyr business and won a renewal of power. Then he packed his grip and started for London to head off the passage through the British Parliament of the agreement reached by the conference settling the new basis of subsidies.

He got the ear of Winston Churchill under secretary for the colonies who amended the agreement in the House of Commons by striking out the words "final and unalterable," leaving a loop-hole through which British Columbia might further agitate for the extra consideration which Mr. McBride had urged in the conference. Then Premier McBride sailed for home quite proud of his triumph and has since been playing to the gallery as the successor of his province.

He got a rude jolt, however, in the midst of his rejoicing in the shape of a cable that Sir Wilfrid Laurier had induced the government to reinsert the words "final and unalterable" in the measure when it went to the House of Lords, and that it was likely to pass in that shape.

Mr. McBride is indignant and threatens to return to London if his views are not met, and it is really distressing to think of what may happen if he gets his hands on the British authorities. He may blow up the parliament buildings, assassinate Campbell-Bannerman and Lord Elgin, the Colonial Secretary, and returning to Canada with blood stained hands, may slay Laurier, Fielding, etc.

It was old Joseph Royal, was it not, who used to say that "a Tory robbed of office was as savage as a she bear when her cubs were taken from her, and this condition quite accurately describes Premier McBride's condition."

THE WELCOME TO LAURIER.

If anything were required to show how close Sir Wilfrid Laurier stands to the hearts of the people of Canada, the exhibition was made Friday night at Quebec and at Montreal Saturday night, when many thousands of people joined in the welcome to that distinguished statesman as he passed through the densely packed streets and addressed enormous multitudes, speaking with his old time vigor and enthusiasm.

The welcome was a spontaneous one and no wonder its recipient showed signs of emotion when he arose to speak.

The old fervor for the idol of the people burns more fiercely than ever among them, all over Canada and the scenes that were witnessed at Quebec and Montreal could be reproduced in every constituency in Canada.

Sir Wilfrid was the recipient of most flattering addresses from the city councils of the ancient capital and the commercial metropolis of Canada, the welcome in both cities being of a non-partisan character, and similar demonstrations will be made on his arrival at Ottawa, where the premier is especially admired and revered.

No conqueror returning from the scenes of his triumph could have been received with greater acclaim than has been extended to Sir Wilfrid, who in his addresses speaks of the delight he feels at being back among his own people, and in his beloved Canada.

The Liberals of Canada are not worrying about Mr. Bourassa, whether he remains in parliament or takes to the Quebec legislature. Mr. Bourassa has been trying to form a third party in parliament for the past three years, and he has but one follower, Mr. Laverne, who is said to have cheered for Kruger when Canadian soldiers were embarking at Quebec for the South African war.

CURRENT COMMENT.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier still wears the smile that won't come off.

Has the managing director of Mr. Hazen's organ never had personal experience of a tightness in the money market?

St. John Tories have not yet found a candidate willing to go up against Dr. Pugsley.

The local government is to hold a meeting in this city on Wednesday, and it is probable that the work of reconstruction will be proceeded with.

Everything Laurier touches seems to go. Even the steamship on which he came from England went faster than she ever did before, breaking all records in trans-Atlantic travel.

A newspaper of the standing of the Montreal Star should be above disseminating the unfounded suspicions and charges of Mr. Hazen's Fredericton organ respecting the financial condition of the province.

Mr. Borden in his stumping tour is to give only two days to New Brunswick, and while he is out west the electors of St. John will be sending a Liberal to Parliament to replace a Conservative.

The King of the Nackawick is said to have "fainted dead away" when he made the startling discovery that one of the government horses has white eyes, but it was a dose of "white eye" or "White MacKie" that revived him.

Toronto News: Mr. Bergeron, M.P. says that at the next general election the Conservatives will carry twenty-five seats in Quebec. The Dominion analyst should take a look at Berg's cigarettes. There's something in 'em.

Poor Mr. Borden is between two fires. The Orange Sentinel is ripping him up the back for catering to Quebec by his disavowal of party responsibility for Col. Sam. Hughes' attack on the French priests, and the New Freeman enquires if the time has not arrived for the Tory leader to repudiate Hughes and Dr. Sproule. The Orange Sentinel calls Mr. Borden "a trimmer."

His Worship the Mayor who is said to be making strenuous efforts to finance a lot of city bonds, and finds the money market very tight at present will be able to sympathize with the alleged difficulty the government has in making advantageous loans. The newspaper of which His Worship is a director, makes fierce attacks on the provincial secretary in connection with the matter, but it has no reproach for the mayor. His Worship will scarcely consider this a fair deal, and will no doubt see to it that either the reproaches against the government are stopped or that even handed justice is passed out all round.
