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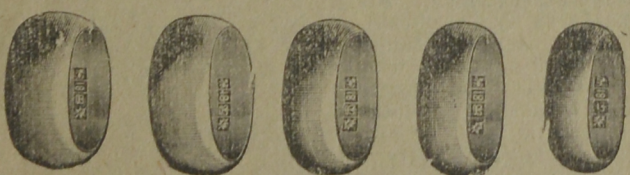

QUEEN OF THE SEAS.

**New Cunard Liner, Lusitania, Likely to Break
all Ocean Crossing Records.**

(Special to Herald.)

CAPE RACE, Nfld., Sept. 11.—The Cunard line steamer Lusitania, whose maiden voyage across the Atlantic, is expected to eclipse all previous records, came in touch through wireless telegraph with the American continent today.

At 5.30, this morning a message was received from the steamer, saying she was 225 miles east of Cape Race.

NEW YORK, Sept. 11.—The indicated position of the Lusitania is about 1,225 miles from Sandy Hook, so that if the big steamer can maintain a rate of 25 knots an hour, with which she is credited, she will reach the entrance to the port of New York about one o'clock Friday morning, which would make the time for the voyage, four days and eighteen hours, more than thirteen hours better than the record trip between Queenstown and New York of five days, four hours and thirteen minutes, held port Friday.

Such time, if made, would also wrest the best Atlantic record from Germany, now held by that country.

When heard from this morning the Lusitania had travelled 1,655 miles of the 2,780 between Queenstown and New York in 70 hours. This would make an average speed to that point of a trifle better than 23½ knots an hour.

It is known that fog interfered with the speed of the Lusitania for many hours after she left Queenstown, her speed being reduced at times to 20 knots, so she must have steamed faster than 23½ knots to secure that average.

The run from Cape Race down the coast is generally made at top speed as conditions are favorable, so that shipping men who learned of the Lusitania's position this morning, predicted that, barring accident, the Lusitania will be called the "Queen of the Seas" when she reaches port Friday.

TORY CONVENTION.

**Opponents of Local Government to
Meet in This City on Sept. 19.**

The announcement is made that the local opposition party in York will hold a convention at the county court house on Thursday, Sept. 19th, at ten o'clock a. m., for the purpose of nominating candidates for the House of Assembly. The object of holding the convention during exhibition week is to procure the attendance of people from the country districts who under ordinary conditions would probably not take the trouble of coming to the city on a mission of that kind.

Leading spirits in the party here say that there is no lack of timber, but anticipate some difficulty in making a choice. Of course Mayor McLeod is willing to run and will have no difficulty in securing a nomination.

Mr. James K. Pinder, who has all to gain and nothing to lose, is said to be very anxious for a nomination, but is likely to encounter pretty stiff opposition. The respectable element in the party regard Mr. Pinder as a source of embarrassment, but the doughty king of Nackawick is not disposed to allow himself to be shelved if he can help it.

SHORT COAL SUPPLY.

**I. C. R. Feeling Effects of Springhill
Strike.**

ST. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 11.—Reports received here show that unless the Springhill coal mine strike is soon settled there will be a very serious coal famine on the I. C. R.

Usually the government road buys 100,000 tons per year from Springhill, and since the strike has been in effect this supply has been cut off.

As an alternative, the I. C. R. has managed to get coal from Cape Breton, which is taken to Campbellton, but it is not expected that the Cape Breton supply will last. At present the coaling stations all over the road are short of fuel.
