

## U. S. CHILDREN HAVE PHYSICAL IMPERFECTIONS

Over a Million in Schools are Suffering From Easily Cured Maladies

NEW YORK, September 10.—The reopening of the public schools throughout the country is to be the occasion of a report on the physical condition of school children, by a committee of prominent educationalists, headed by chairman Burlington, former president of New York Board of Education. The inquiry has taken a wide scope and the observations apply not only to the school children of New York, but also those of Boston, Chicago and other cities.

In general the report shows that about one-third of all the school children in the United States are behind their proper grade because of physical defects that could be remedied.

A synopsis of the report says in part: "Based on the physical defects and home conditions of 1,400 school children of New York city, it is estimated that 12,000,000 of the children of the United States have physical defects more or less which should receive attention from parents and physicians. If the percentages recorded by the Board of Health should be maintained throughout the country (and it seems likely that would be as adenoids and impaired vision, mal-nutrition, and defective breathing are found in rural as well as urban schools), there must be 1,440,000 ill-nourished children, 5,615,000 with enlarged glands, and 6,925,000 with defective breathing in the United States. In New York city, the

estimated figures are: Mal-nutrition 48,000; enlarged glands, 187,000 and defective breathing 230,000.

"The large percentage of the defects indicated are easily remedied, and many could be prevented by proper care, though, except in the case of defective vision, the cases are not always easily determined."

A comprehensive plan for dealing with the physical defects of school children is outlined in the report, including a thorough examination of all children, notification to parents, the enforcement of existing laws, and securing proper authority, where this is now lacking, to compel parents, who refuse to take the necessary steps; enforcement of health, tenement house and child labor laws; the establishment in connection with the boards of education, of school hygienists whose duties it shall be to see that school buildings are so constructed and so conducted that they cannot themselves produce or aggravate physical defects and in school the curriculum should be so devised and executed as neither to produce nor aggravate them; to study the effect of school government—curriculum, building, home study, physical training—upon the child; and to teach hygiene so that the children will, themselves, cultivate the habits of health and see clearly the relation of health and vitality to present happiness and future efficiency.

### HAD REVENGE.

Baptist Preacher Asked for Rain To Spoil Fair.

NEW YORK, September 10.—The Herald has received the following despatch from Worcester, Mass.: The power of prayer is a general topic of comment today because rain spoiled the New England fair, after the Rev. Orson E. Mallory had prayed for such an event because some of the concessionaires worked on Sunday.

The officials, who admit that the fair will end with a \$6,000 loss, are very unhappy. The farmers and the general public, disappointed at not being able to see the fair, are criticising the clerical petition for rain. The concessionaires, who paid for ground privileges, and whose work last Sunday in getting their booths and tents ready called down the wrath of Mr. Mallory, are also disturbed.

Mr. Mallory says he did pray for rain and rain came, and he is glad of it.

Mr. Mallory, who is pastor of the Dewey Street Baptist church, heard early Sunday morning that the men were hard at work on the fair grounds. He offered a prayer at the morning service that the Lord would send rain to spoil the fair and punish the officials for allowing Sunday desecration.

Rain came promptly on Monday, and on Tuesday there was more rain. The downfall came in a perfect flood yesterday, and today the fair officials admit the enterprise is a rain-soaked failure.

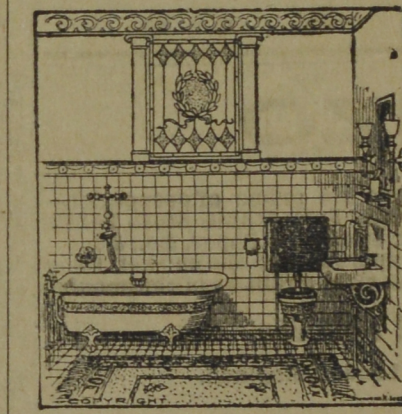
