QUEBEC EMBEZZLER

Serious Charge against Treasurer of
a Railway Confessed by Culprit

Sherbrooke, P. Q., December 11.—A. H. Anderson, treasurer of the Quebec Central Railway, was arrested yesterday on the complaint of the general manager, Mr. Walsh, the charge being embezzlement. The company's auditor, on completing the periodical inspection of the books on Saturday discovered a large deficit. Mr. Anderson has acknowledged to the general manager his indebtedness to the company and has elected for a summary trial, which will take place before Judge Mulvina in a few days. The accused has been a well known and trusted employee of the company for many years, and the officials are feeling the blow deeply that they should be compelled to take action against their old co-worker, who is believed to have been a victim of the recent financial troubles in the United States.

SUICIDED BECAUSE SHE LOST FORTUNE.

Mrs. Clara Bloodgood Thought Sum of \$250,000 was Lost in Knickerbocker Trust Smash.

NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—An explanation of the mysterious suicide of Mrs. Clara Bloodgood, the well known actress has just come to light. Mrs. Bloodgood shot herself to death in her room in a New York hotel last Thursday evening, a few minutes before the time for her to go to the theatre in which she was playing, and her friends up to yesterday were at a loss to account for the unexpected tragedy.

It developed yesterday, however, that Mrs. Bloodgood was another of the many who have ended their lives because discouraged at the prospect of financial ruin due to the failure of the Knickerbocker Trust Company. It appears that a short time ago Mrs. Bloodgood inherited a fortune amounting to about \$250,000, from a distant relative. This money was in the keeping of the Knickerbocker company, and it is thought that worry over the supposed loss of the money was what led to her putting an end to her existence.

That the act was premeditated was shown by the fact that Mrs. Bloodgood had purchased two revolvers and had, it was shown also, been studying a book on the brain with a view of firing the bullet in such a way as to cause instant death. Apart from the financial trouble there is no other cause for her act. Her letter to her husband gave no explanation of it whatever.

SAW PREMIER RE BLACK SOD ROUTE.

Deputation From Ireland Waited on Sir Wilfrid Laurier re Eastern Terminus of "All Red" Line.

OTTAWA, Dec. 9.—The deputation from Sligo, Ireland, received a sympathetic hearing when they laid the claims of the Blacksod route before Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues Saturday.

Bishop Clancy and Dr. Ambrose, M. P., were accompanied by Senators Costigan and Coffey and Mr. Emmanuel Devlin, member for Wright. Dr. Ambrose emphasized the point that all parties in Ireland were in favor of the Blacksod route.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier was perfectly frank with the delegation. He said he need hardly remind them that he had always been a friend of Ireland, but the all-red steamship enterprise could not be considered simply upon political or sentimental grounds. The commercial aspect of the project must not be lost sight of; indeed, it was the primary consideration. While impressed with arguments of the deputation as to the advantages of Blacksod Bay, he declared his concern was so much with regard to the port of landing or embarkation on the other side of the Atlantic, but with the Canadian end. What Canada wanted was the shortest and quickest route for the Atlantic ferry, and if the advocates of Blacksod Bay could demonstrate this to the promoters of the enterprise, then he for one would be satisfied.

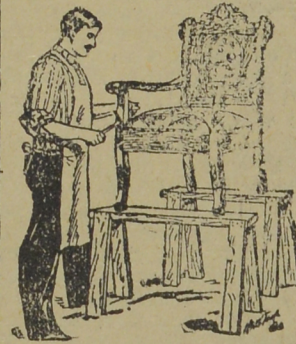
