MR. TARTE'S DEATH

Deceased Had Been in Delicate Health for Some Months

MONTREAL, P. Q., December 19.—Hon. Joseph Israel Tarte died at the home of his son-in-law, Dr. Martigny, on Sherbrooke street yesterday afternoon.

For some time past Mr. Tarte had been suffering from a fatal malady, and his friends knew that his days were numbered. The end came peacefully, after several days of suffering. He died surrounded by all the members of his family.

His Grace Archbishop Bruchesi was present from early morning until the end came.

For the past year Mr. Tarte had not been able to attend steadily to his journalistic duties, but spent most of the spring and summer in his garden at his country home at Bercherville. He had intended to spend the winter there and took his library from his town house over a month ago. The first change for the worse came nine days ago, when he fell unconscious in his library and on recovery came immediately to Montreal to the house of his son in law, Dr. Francois Martigny, on Sherbrooke street. Dr. Martigny saw at once that his condition was very serious and informed him that he had but a few days to live. Mr. Tarte seemed to recover a little, but on Saturday came a relapse, and unconsciousness, from which he never recovered. The end came peacefully at 2.15 p. m. Death was due more to a general breakdown of the system than to any specific cause. For many years he had been in poor health and since the general election in 1900, after which he went to Paris and was operated upon, his condition has been more or less serious, and only his indomitable pluck kept him at work.

CLOSED FOR VACATION

Parliament Continued Debate on Oriental Invasion and Adjourned for the Holidays

OTTAWA, Ontario, December 19.—The Commons started for home and Christmas after four full hours of important business, after the new government bill for the regulation of insurance was introduced and explained by Finance Minister Fielding.

This was followed by a debate on Japanese immigration. The leader of the opposition introduced the immigration matter by moving for papers and buttressing his request with a statement that Mr. Chamberlain had once advised Canada to pass a Natal Act for the exclusion of Orientals. He wanted to see the written assurance that the Japanese Consul General was said to have given the government when the treaty was signed that the Japanese government would limit emigration to Canada.

Sir Wilfrid in reply, said that all the papers would be furnished when Mr. Lemieux was home from Japan and not while the matter was under negotiation. He refused to believe that Japan was deliberately violating the understanding on which the treaty was signed. Therefore a commissioner had been sent to Japan to look into the case. If it was found that Japan was acting in bad faith, and not merely that some individuals were evading the act, then the Canadian government would have the Japanese treaty annulled. The house adjourned till January 8th.

LEFT BIG ESTATE

Hon. Dr. Parker's Generous Bequests to Baptists

HALIFAX, N. S., December 19.—The will of the late Hon. Dr. Parker which has been admitted to probate, bequeathes to the ministers' annuity fund of the Baptist convention of the Maritime Provinces, \$100,000.

To the Home Mission board of the Baptist convention \$100,000.
To the trustees of Walton, Hants county, Baptist church \$10,000 is left as a memorial to the testator's father and mother, the same to be invested and the income therefrom is to be used for the support of the minister of the church.

To his executors \$200,000 in trust for the benefit of the testator's children—Mary Ann, William F., Laura McNeil and Fanny Albion, during their life, they to receive the income half yearly and at their death their children are to receive the interest until twenty-one years of age, when they receive the capital.

LODGE MONEY BURNED

Incident of a Fire in a Moncton Tenement

MONCTON, Dec. 19.—One hundred and ten dollars in cash belonging to the Canadian Order Foresters' local lodge was destroyed in a fire which gutted the residence on Robinson street of Naman Wilson, local treasurer of the C. O. F.

The money was in a sack hanging in a closet, the wall near which caught and in the closet were a number of suits of clothes. In a pocket of one was a gold watch and chain, valued at \$50.

The fire had made its way well into the partitions when noticed and the house was filled with smoke. When Mrs. Wilson recollected that the money was in the house she was with difficulty restrained from rushing back in. After the partitions had been chopped away and the fire extinguished, the charred remnants of the clothing were brought forth and in the debris was found the remains of the bag in which the money had been stored. The house was owned by Hon. C. W. Robinson, and the damage will be covered by insurance.

TWO MEN KILLED

TORONTO, December 18.—The C. P. R. express ran full speed into a section of track torn up for repairs last night at Angler, forty miles east of Schreiber. The engine was turned upside down and William Small, fireman, was killed. Peter McAllen, engineer, afterwards died in the hospital at Port Arthur.

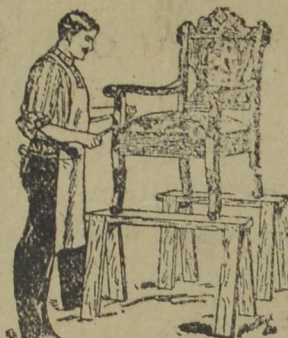
