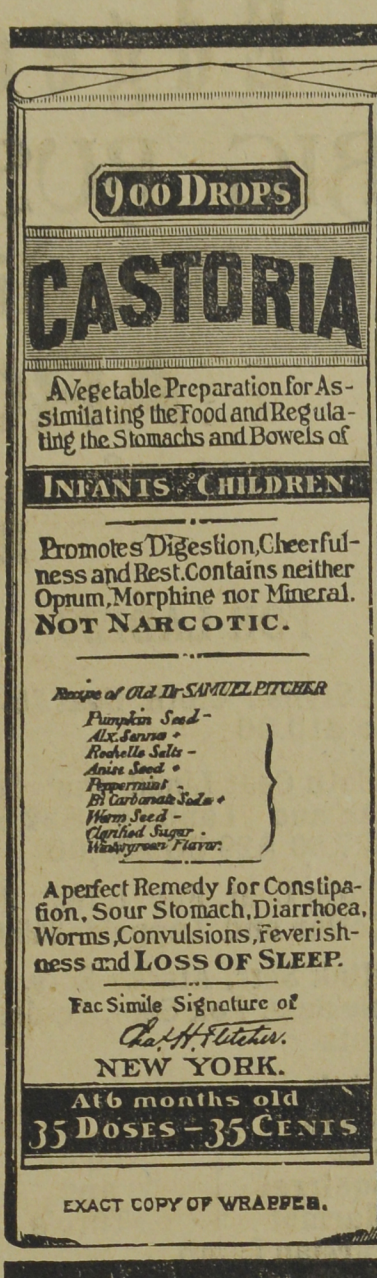

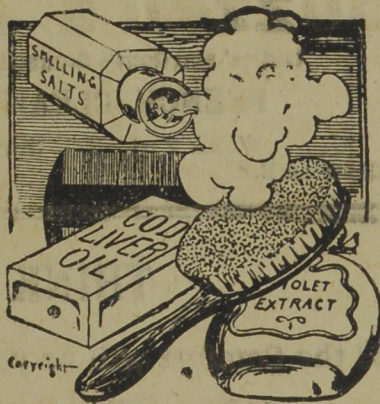

APOLOGIZED TO SIR FRED.

Leading English Magazine makes Amends to Minister of Munia who will still press his Suit

OTTAWA, Dec. 18.—A copy of the last issue of "The Nineteenth Century" and "After," received by Sir Frederick Borden, contains the following: "In an article contributed by H. Hamilton Fyfe, in the October issue of the review, a quotation appeared with many blanks left in it from a Canadian paper called the Eye Opener, of which the editor had never heard. "We passed that quotation on the strength of Mr. Fyfe's name with no conception that it would be thought to refer to Sir F. Borden. "But the editor has since been informed by Sir Frederick Borden, Minister of Militia in the Dominion government, that the blanks in question from the Eye Opener were, in the original newspaper, occupied by his name. "The editor is therefore anxious to express at once to Sir Frederick Borden his extreme regret that any such unfounded and scurrilous gossip should have been quoted in these pages. We unreservedly withdraw the same and apologize sincerely to Sir Frederick Borden for any injury which could possibly have occurred to him from such a scandalous story. "Editor, the Nineteenth Century and After."

Sir Frederick Borden naturally expresses satisfaction at the prompt and unreserved apology, but at the same time, he has not withdrawn his suit for damages, and his lawyers in London are under instructions to press the libel action through the courts.

The retraction by the magazine will, however, probably have the effect of mitigating the offence in the eyes of the court and may reduce the amount of damages awarded.

A Literary Curiosity.

Some years ago a Paris newspaper ordered a story of adventure from a well known novelist. The price agreed upon was 1 franc a line. The novelist straightway hunted up an old man of letters—the unknown collaborator of many more famous authors—who agreed to write the story for 25 centimes a line. When the work had reached its second part in the course of publication the novelist learned that his old client was seriously ill. Hastening to his bedside, he found him dying. In agony for the fate of his story, the novelist rushed to the office of the newspaper, got hold of some back numbers in order to pick up the threads of the romance and brought it to a speedy end in a few brief chapters. Then he went to the office with the manuscript.

"What's that?" asked the editor.

"Why, the continuation and end of my story."

"Oh, then, you want to change it, I suppose, because, you know, you sent in the last chapters three days ago."

Admirable self possession on the part of the novelist prevented disaster, and he finally found this explanation: The old man, whose price was 25 centimes a line, had himself subtlet his task to a third writer at 10 centimes, and thus the work had been finished in safety.

Why a Swelling Follows a Blow.

The swelling which follows from a blow is nature's effort to protect the part from further injury and to keep it at rest while repair is going on. What actually takes place at the seat of injury is not even now quite understood. The injury to the smaller blood vessels interferes with the flow of blood through them, and the white corpuscles, with part of the serum, the watery part of the blood, escape into the surrounding tissues. At the same time the blood vessels in the neighborhood dilate, and the increased flow of blood with the thoroughfare obstructed increases the swelling. It is probable that the white corpuscles of the blood pass into the tissues to assist in the repair, as bees or ants assemble at an injury to their storehouse, but with this difference—that the substance of the corpuscles is probably converted into the tissue of repair. From one point of view the human body is only one gigantic colony of individuals and the swelling that follows injury but the rush of these to repair the breach.

A Quaint Scotch Wedding Custom.

A quaint wedding custom still prevails in many of the little country towns and mining villages in Scotland. When a wedding is held the contracting parties make their guests pay in full for the eating, drinking and dancing facilities which are usually provided on such occasions. The practice still seems to survive even in Glasgow. A correspondent observed a notice posted up in the Cowcaddens, a low class Glasgow thoroughfare, informing the public that a soldier would shortly enter into the bonds of wedlock and that twopenny would be charged for admission to the ceremony and an additional sixpence imposed for attendance at the wedding feast. The practice seems to be peculiarly Scotch, but sixpence certainly seems moderate enough for a marriage supper.—Westminster Gazette.

The Surname.

The term "surname" is supposed by some to be derived from the French surname, meaning "over name," because a person's family name was formerly written above instead of after the baptismal name.

The Monsoon.

The southwest monsoon in India blows from May to October. This brings the rain, which varies from ten inches in Rajputana to 800 inches in mountains of Assam.

FOUGHT FOR HIS LIFE

OFFICER'S DESPERATE STRUGGLE WITH A LEOPARD IN INDIA.

Was Returning From a Day's Hunt, When the Infuriated Beast Attacked His Wife—Could Not Shoot For Fear of Killing Her—Grapples With the Animal and Finally Overcomes It Without Aid.

The story of an officer's desperate encounter with an infuriated beast comes from Lucknow. Lieut. Col. Hutchinson, of the Second Gurkhas, had a thrilling fight with a leopard, which attacked his wife while on a shooting trip near Dehra Dun.

They were returning after a day's shooting, and the beaters had gone on some distance ahead. Mrs. Hutchinson was walking about ten yards in front of her husband. She diverted slightly from the path, and surprised a young leopard, which immediately attacked her.

Col. Hutchinson instantly raised his rifle to shoot the beast, but dared not fire for fear of wounding his wife. Then, seeing that the only way to save her life was to drag the leopard off, he dropped his rifle and attacked the beast with his hands.

A Desperate Fight.

The leopard first attempted to seize his arm, but missed, and Col. Hutchinson was able to keep it at bay while his wife rose and ran to call the beaters. Meanwhile, the animal sprang again on Col. Hutchinson, and a desperate fight between the man and the beast followed.

Col. Hutchinson eluded its spring with marvelous agility. He made several attempts to regain his rifle, but the leopard was on him before he could pick it up. Then he thought of his revolver, and was placing his hand on his hip to draw it, when the leopard sprang on him again and seized his right arm. Desperate as the position was, Col. Hutchinson did not give in, and, although he was suffering terrible agonies, he grappled with the beast. They rolled over several times, the leopard still clinging to its hold on his arm.

Rifle Does the Work.

At last Col. Hutchinson freed his arm and succeeded in getting his revolver. Then he shot the leopard in the eye. The animal let go its hold, but the shot had only blinded it. Before it could spring on him again Col. Hutchinson had gained possession of his rifle, and succeeded in killing the beast just as the first of the beaters came back.

Col. Hutchinson was by this time so exhausted from loss of blood and the struggle that he was in a state of collapse. He was carried back to his bungalow, and his arm, which was terribly lacerated, was attended to. He is now progressing favorably.
