EXPERT TESTIMONY

Nova Scotia's Secretary for Agriculture
Speaks Very Highly of Government
Horse Importation

The opinion of a man who knows what he is talking about, and is not blinded by partizan prejudice, is a thousand times more reliable than the vapourings of a foolish, mendacious newspaper which has only party ends to serve.

One of Mr. Hazen's organs set its self up to deery and condemn the recent government horse importation, but all judges of such animals who saw the purchases which Hon. Mr. Farris made in Scotland and France have agreed that he exercised excellent judgment and procured a selection that will be of great benefit in improving the horse breeds of this province.

The testimony of Prof. Cumming, secretary for agriculture in Nova Scotia, and head of the agricultural college at Truro, a gentleman who made a thorough inspection of the New Brunswick horse importation, will carry weight, with those who respect the judgment of an experienced expert.

Speaking of the importation,

Prof. Cumming said to The Herald, "The horses are very much superior to the average importation by the Ontario government. That province, at its sales, realizes from \$290 to \$325 on its horses, and these always include a number of yearlings."

"The horses sold in Fredericton on Wednesday would easily bring \$325 each in Ontario. Referring to the stallion, about which some objection had been raised on account of his marks, Prof. Cumming said he was an exceptionally fine horse; one of the best in the province, and he would like to breed some of his mares on the Truro experimental farm with him."

Prof. Cumming is a recognized authority on horses. His services as judge at exhibitions are much sought after, and the above verdict ought to more than counteract any adverse criticism from parties desiring to find fault with the agricultural department of New Brunswick.

COMMISSION'S JUDGMENT

British Columbia Complaints Against Railway Freight
Discrimination Dismissed.

(Special Despatch to Herald.)

OTTAWA, Ont., August 2.—The board of railway commissioners has given judgment in the suit sustaining part of the complaint of the Boards of Pacific coast cities that the railroads of British Columbia and way rates levied on all classes of goods from Vancouver eastward were discriminated against, as compared with the rates on westbound traffic from Winnipeg

The judgment is signed by Commissioners Killam and Bernier, and a dissenting judgment was given by Commissioner Mills.

The judgment of the majority of the commissioners is to the effect that the complaints should be dismissed, except in so far as relates to the classes of traffic for which reduced rates are given under the act, relating to the Crow's Nest line.

THE STOCK MARKET.

MONTREAL, Que., August 2.—Selling of Toronto Railway was a feature of the stock market today. Opening at 100½, equal to yesterday's close, all offerings were taken at par.

Although the market closed very weak yesterday, it was not followed up because of further liquidation in other local issues. Twin City sold at 93½ and N. S. Steel at 67, but transactions were small.

BROKE THE RECORD

Empress of Ireland Crossed Atlantic
in 5 Days, 17 Hours and
25 Minutes

RIMOUSKI, Aug. 2.—There arrived here yesterday on the steamer Empress of Ireland, Lord Strathcona, Hon. Mrs. Howard, His Excellency Taotai, Wu Tse Lin, the Canadian Bisely team, Lord Vivian, Baron and Baroness L. Du Breton, Lord and Lady Hindlip, Baron Du Guerne, Hon. W. W. Vivian and other notable passengers.

The steamer arrived at 9.40 yesterday morning having made the passage for Liverpool to this port in the record time of 5 days, 17 hours and 25 minutes, which eclipses the famous run of her sister ship the Empress of Britain, two weeks ago,

by more than four hours. She had 1,559 passengers, 1,344 of whom were for points in Canada, and 215 for the United States, and 17 for Overseas, 1,528 sacks of Overseas mail and 1,034 sacks of Canadian mail.

THE RIFLE MEET

Program for the York County Association's Annual Shoot

The annual county match of the York County Rifle Association will be held at the rifle range St. Marys, Thursday the eighth instant commencing at eight o'clock a. m. Buses will leave the post office at 7.30 a. m. for the grounds.

The first competition will be for the Elder Cup and \$20. divided into thirteen prizes. The ranges will be at 200, and 500 yards, seven rounds each.

The second competition will be at ranges of 800 yards for the Association Cup and 20. divided into eleven prizes.

The team match for Fredericton, Marysville and Stanley will be shot in conjunction with the first match. Five men on each side. Ranges will be at 200 and 500 yards, seven rounds each. The prize will be the Stanley pitcher.

In the grand aggregate match 6 prizes will be presented. The Tyro match for which prizes of ten dollars each have been presented by Lt. Col. Loggie and Mr. John Bodkin will bring the meet to a close. Lt. Col. Loggie and Lt. C. H. Fowler, president and secretary of the association are looking after the arrangements for the match and this should be a guarantee of its success.

THE CRICKET MATCH

Fredericton-Boston Contest Decided Against
Fredericton on 1st Innings--Home
Team Ran up Big Score in
2nd Innings

The Fredericton Cricketers made a great showing in their second innings with the Boston team Thursday afternoon, running up a score of 150.

The agreement was to play till 7 o'clock and if the innings was then uncompleted the game was to be decided on the result of the first innings. The Boston men in their second innings were six wickets down for 38 runs, they needed 65 to beat Fredericton in both innings, but time was called out and the victory went to the visitors on the first innings 130 to 44.

The men who made the bulk of the score for Fredericton in the second innings, were Meldon, Jago, Bingham and Ashburnham, piling up respectively 49, 39, 37 and 9.

Mr. Meldon gave one of the finest exhibitions of batting ever seen in Fredericton, landing the ball repeatedly over the fence to the railway track and to Regent Street, six of his hits netting him 36 runs.

Mr. Jago went in first and by careful play carried his bat to the fall of the ninth wicket.

Mr. Bingham hit hard and ran his score up in about twenty minutes. Capt. Ashburnham delighted his friends by his careful defence and well placed hits, but the remainder of the team contributed little to the general result.

The Boston bowlers Murray and Sheperdson proved very deadly. The innings closed with Fredericton 150 up, and Boston went to their second innings, scoring 38 for six wickets when time was called.

Mr. Meldon bowled for Fredericton from the south wicket, and his break balls proved very effective. He got five of the six wickets taking two in one over with successive balls, Deedes and Galloway were the other bowlers.

The visitors left by the 9 p. m. train for St. John and to-day went through Halifax via Digby. At the Nova Scotia capital they play the Wanderers tomorrow, the Garrison on Monday and All Halifax on Tuesday. They have also arranged matches with the Windsor and Westville clubs.
