

DOUKHOBORS AT WINNIPEG

Pilgrims Say They Are Looking for a Warmer Land,
Where They Will Not Need to Enslave Animals

WINNIPEG, Man., July 29.—When they reach their destination they will inform their friends whom they have left behind; but whether the latter will join them or not they can not say. The number of men being exactly equal to that of the women, suggested the question whether they were all married couples. They answered that they do not practice marriage, but all are living as brothers and sisters. In a couple of instances a man and woman in the party had been husband and wife, but now they were only brother and sister to each other, and all were alike. They have no leader, but look to God alone as their leader.

Asked what Peter Verigin's relationship to them was, they said Peter Verigin is a machinery man, and looks after that kind of business, but such was out for them. In spiritual things they have no leader but God.

VIEWS OF THE

WARMER COUNTRY.

From the conversation it was learned that the pilgrims had started from Swan River on Saturday, July 6. They traveled together until yesterday, when, nearing the city, they separated into several groups, and came in this morning by different roads. Asked as to the purpose of their journey, the Doukhobors said they were going to look for a warmer country. As they do not believe in killing or enslaving animals, they want to go where they will not have to keep horses or cattle, or wear clothing made from animals. They say that when they came to this country the government promised to give them farms and allow them to live in pillages; but now this policy has been changed, and every man is told to go and live upon his own farm. They are unwilling to do this, as they do not like to be separated, but wish to live together. Where they will be able to find a country that will suit them and will be placed at their disposal to carry out their plans they do not pretend to know. They say they do not know anything about the country but they expect that God will give them what they are seeking. On being asked if they were aware of the law of the United States which would not allow them to enter that country, they said they did not know that they were liable to be turned back at the boundary line, but they would trust to God to bring them where His will could be carried out, and every creature as well as every man would be free.

They have no idea how far it might be to a country such as they have been seeking; but they are willing to travel one year or two years, if need be, in search.

RAILROADING IN BRAZIL.

Canadian Capital Interested in Several Ventures.

NEW YORK, August 1.—The Times today says: The syndicate of New York and Canadian including Sir William VanHorne and William Lanman Bull, which have been for some time engaged in traction and harbor improvement undertakings in Brazil, has laid plans, it is reported to extend operations to steam railroad undertakings. The syndicate is said to have under consideration the construction, at a total of 2,000 miles of railway in Brazil, to connect and extend existing lines. The ultimate purpose, it is said, is to connect Rio de Janeiro with Montevideo, the capital of Uruguay.

Among the railroads said to have been already acquired by the syndicate are the San Paulo and Rio Grande Railroads and the Sorocabana Railway. The latter was constructed by the State of San Paulo, and has been leased to the American syndicate, which is understood to have agreed to assume the \$19,000,000 of 5 per cent bonds issued by the state to cover the cost of the railroad.

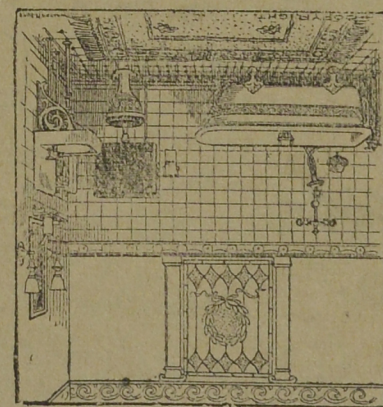
