Rev. J. H. MacDonald of Fredericton Elected Moderator—The Temperance Crusade.

Woodstock, N. B., July 11.—This morning F. W. Emmerson reported for the treasurer, James Patterson, of St. John, who was detained for illness. Receipts of the association funds, and on hand \$1,191.95. Invested funds, \$5,960.

Notice of motion was given that district officers should ex-officio be no longer members of the association.

Rev. E. J. Grant, from committee of temperance, reported that while not all had been accomplished, that was desired, yet he had reason to be thankful for what had been done. Baptists were behind none in fighting this traffic and desired again to put on record their uncompromising hatred to this evil and their sympathy with the N. B. Temperance Association. They deplored the apathy of the people. It was urged upon all to be given in securing prohibition which that by vote and influence, and should be given in securing prohibition, which is the only remedy. The churches are responsible because it is in their power to destroy it. After discussion by Revs. Wilson, Phillips, Daggett, Smith, McIntyre, Kierstead, and Messrs. Weyman and Frost, the motion was heartily carried.

Dr. Creed from the committee on licentiate reported that having made an examination in doctrine, etc., they would recommend that Fred S. Porter, M. L. Orchard, Percy Hayward, and R. S. Collingham be ordained and that G. Bolster, H. McGill, F. Orchard and H. Sharp be given association licenses. The report was adopted. Dr. McIntyre, supt. of home missions reported great needs because of such an extensive field. However, the ground had been fairly well covered with ministers and students. The outlook was magnificent. The great needs are pastors as well as enlarged contribution.

The officers elected for the ensuing year were announced this afternoon as follows: Rev. J. H. MacDonald, of Fredericton, moderator; Rev. David Hutchinson, St. John, assistant moderator; F. W. Emmerson, clerk; Jas. Patterson, treasurer. Members of executive—Dr. McLeod, B. H. Nobles, E. J. Grant, Ds. Kierstead, Dr. McIntyre, D. Hutchinson, C. T. Phillips, J. LeTonne and C. T. Weyman. Members from St. John for H. M. Board—W. H. White, R. G. Haey, Wellington Camp.

Colonel Vince called attention to the fact that while there should be five hundred ministers and delegates present at this association, there were only thirty-five delegates and forty-one ministers, or one-seventh of the whole.

Valuable Lot of Scholarships and Prizes Open to Students Next Term.

Chancellor Jones, of the University has received a communication from His Honor Governor Tweedie, approving of the conditions of award of the cash prize of \$50 presented to the University by His Honor and to be given for the first time next year.

The prize will be given to the student of the graduating class making the highest aggregate of marks in five subjects of the ordinary course, at both the December and May examinations. The idea is to encourage good all-round scholarship rather than specialization along some particular line.

The university is particularly fortunate in the large number of prizes and scholarships available for the next academic year. The competition for the Douglas gold medal is open to all undergraduates and will be awarded next year for the best essay on the subject "The Factors in the Growth of the Maritime Provinces." This is a subject upon which a large number will feel competent to write and will no doubt lead to some keen competition.

The gold medal presented by His Excellency the Governor-General will be awarded for highest standing in some department of study to be selected by the faculty. It will probably be given for ordinary and honor work in fourth year science.

The alumni gold medal will as usual will be given for a translation into Latin prose. The passage set for translation is Gibbon's "History of Rome," book I, chapter III, beginning with the words "The gloomy apprehensions" to the end of the chapter.

The Brydone-Jack memorial prize of \$40 will be given to the student in the department of physics making the best standing on the ordinary, honor and laboratory work of the

The material is practical because of its excellent tubbing qualities and for warm weather it is very comfortable. The waist shown is rendered individual by its deep pleats at either side of the front which prove becoming to all wearers. These are edged with a narrow pleating of silk in plain color as are the turnback cuffs on the shorter sleeves. The narrow tucks stitched to yoke depth lend a modish fullness to the front while those in back continue to the waistline. The closing is effected at the left side under the deep pleat and may be fastened with buttons or invisibly. Any of the summer silks, swiss or dimity may be used for the waist of which 3 1/2 yards 27 inches wide are needed in the medium size. 6887—6 sizes, 32 to 42 inches bust measure. Bobbing and courtesying her gratitude, the old woman replied: "Sure sir, me ould man's whitewashing."



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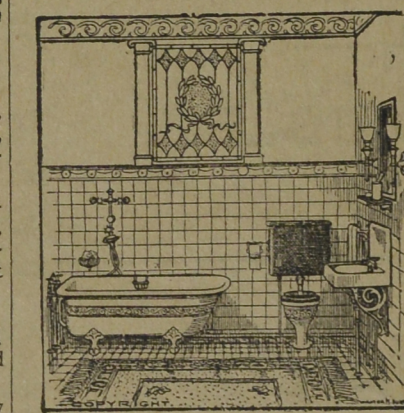
