DEATH OF MR. YOUNG, M.P.P.

Many Fredericton friends of Mr. John Young M. P. P. for Gloucester will sincerely regret to learn of his death which occurred at his home at Tracadie Friday from apoplexy.

Mr. Young was a well known figure in Fredericton and was well and favorably known throughout the province. He first entered political life in 1886 serving in the legislature until 1890. He returned to the House in 1899 and was reelected in 1903. For many years he was a prominent business man in Gloucester, being associated with his brother the late Hon. Robert Young, M. L. C. who was a member of the King and Fraser governments.

The deceased gentleman was popular with his fellow legislators, an honorable, straight forward man, true to his friends, and standing well with all classes. In politics he was a Liberal and in religion a Presbyterian. He was a native of Tracadie, 66 years old, and leaves a widow and family.

Death has dealt kindly with the members of the present legislature, having claimed only two of that body since it was elected in February 1903. Mr. Gagnon of Madawaska and Mr. Young.

The latter's death makes two vacancies in the House, the other having been created by the resignation of Hon. L. J. Tweedle to accept the governorship. Another vacancy however will occur a few weeks hence by Hon. Dr. Pugsley's resignation of his seat in King's to contest St. John City and County for the House of Commons.

CURRENT COMMENT.

There was a hot contest on the Bisle rifle ranges for the Kolapore Cup the most coveted trophy of the meeting. The Canadians led all their rivals in the two first stages but the team from India tied our boys in the aggregate, each team scoring 767 points, and they will have to shoot off to decide the winner.

The cannons on the river bank are being newly painted to cover up decorations put on them by some malicious persons, and would you believe it the new coat of fresh paint is already being defaced with chalk and other marks. Such spirit of idiosyncrasy is deplorable and if the defacers are caught an example will be made of them.

The Orange parades in honor of "the glorious twelfth" were conducted without serious disorder in any part of Canada, a tribute to the good sense and toleration of those who do not subscribe to the society's tenets, and creditable to the brethren themselves. The people themselves are all right and there would be little clash of races or creeds if some mischievous politicians could be muzzled.

Tory organs have discovered another frightful misdemeanor on the part of a Liberal politician. This time the offender is a Nova Scotian—member of the Government of that province and his offence is that he was seen in a bar room. Well that is not the best place in the world for a politician or anybody else, but if all the Tory politicians who frequent bar rooms were driven out of that party there would be an exodus almost as extensive as the one described in the scriptures.

The case against Mr. B. Frank Smith, M. P. P. for Carleton, charged with receiving logs stolen by the St. John River Log Driving Company resulted in the disagreement of the jury, nine standing for acquittal and three for conviction. An effort has been made to represent the trial as a piece of political persecution, but there is little to warrant such an assumption. Mr. F. B. Carvell, M. P. was simply acting in the case as solicitor for the log company, who were the real prosecutors and who had no political end to serve.

Vegetables with a strong flavor, such as onions and turnips, will be much improved by putting them to boil in cold water, renewing this from a kettle of boiling water as soon as it comes to a scald.

Origin of Two Familiar Proverbs.
It was the habit of the great Greek painter Apelles never to let a day pass, however busy he chanced to be, without practicing his hand by tracing the outline of some object, a custom which has now passed into a proverb—"No day without a line." He also made it a rule, when he had finished a canvas, to exhibit it to the view of those who visited his studio, while he himself, hidden behind the picture, would listen to their comments. It is said that once a shoemaker censured him for having painted a pair of shoes with one latchet too few. Next day the shoemaker, revisiting the studio, saw that the painter had corrected the mistake. He then began to criticise the leg of the portrait, upon which Apelles came forward and reminded him that a shoemaker should not go beyond the shoes, a piece of advice which has also crystallized into a proverb, "Let the cobbler stick to his last."—Pliny the Elder.

At Sea in a Coffin.
It was the French assassin Lupi who escaped to sea from Cayenne in a coffin. He managed to get some nails, tar and cotton, and one dark night he got into the coffin shed. He selected a fine, stanch and seaworthy coffin and fastened the lid in order to turn it into a deck, leaving a cockpit sufficient to enable him to crawl in. He calked all the joints as well as he could, and when this work was finished he made a pair of paddles out of two planks. Then he brought out his craft with great precaution. Without much difficulty he reached the water's edge. Silently and slowly he proceeded in the hope of reaching either Venezuela or British Guiana, 150 nautical miles distant. Fortunately or unfortunately for Lupi, the steamer Abelle, returning from the Antilles, off Paramaribo picked him up, half drowned and almost in a fainting condition, and a few hours later he was in irons in his cell.

Atmospheric Temperature.
The temperature of the atmosphere cools on an average about 1 degree for every 300 feet that we ascend or warms at the same rate as we descend. The mean temperature at the north pole is 0 and at the equator between 80 and 90 degrees. We can, therefore, get into a temperature 1 degree colder for every seventy or eighty miles that we travel north and in a temperature 1 degree warmer for every seventy or eighty miles that we travel south.

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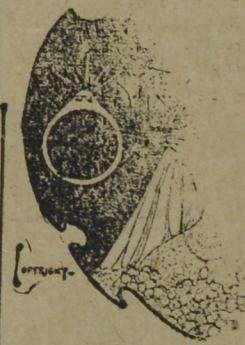
