ROBBERS RAID A BANK

CASHIER REFUSES TO BE HELD UP IN DAYLIGHT.

Draws Revolver and Fires at Thieves
—Fierce Fight Follows—One Man Captured by the Crowd—Other Taken to Hospital Dying—Demanded All Cash Available—Met With Warm Reception.

A daring attempt was made recently by two desperadoes to rob the National Bank in Johannesburg, and in the pitched battle with the bank officials which followed one of the men was fatally shot.

Bank and business houses generally have armed their employees in consequence of frequent burglaries in Johannesburg during the last few months. Pedestrians have been held up and robbed in lonely streets, residences have been ransacked and shops looted in the most audacious manner.

This bank raid, however, was the boldest attempt yet made. Two men entered the Harrison street branch of the National Bank when some of the officials were at lunch, and practically no business was being transacted.

Walking boldly up to the cashier's window, one man thrust a revolver through the window and demanded all the cash available. Meanwhile the second man kept guard at the street door.

Instead of complying with the demand, the cashier drew a revolver from a half-open drawer, and fired point-blank at the robber. The bullet hit him on the jaw, and he dropped to the floor.

The second robber immediately returned the fire; and half a dozen shots were exchanged with the employees behind the counter. One bullet struck a clerk in the shoulder; but the other shots went wide, and were imbedded in the walls and ceiling.

The noise of the fusillade attracted men from the street, and they captured the second robber as he tried to bolt through the door after emptying his revolver. He was overpowered after a severe struggle. The other man was removed to the hospital dying.

Expenses of Government.

Some very interesting items appear in the Imperial Government appropriation accounts for the year ended March 31, 1906, which were issued yesterday. The accounts include Parliamentary grants for Civil Service classes and revenue departments, including postoffice, packet and telegraph services. The gross total grants amounted to £50,267,562, but the expenditure was kept well within bounds, so that there is left the handsome surplus of £798,308. Amongst the more curious details are £1,804 for the construction of a motor-car garage for the Royal Mews, Pimlico; £608 for the construction of a lift at St. James's Palace; and a marriage gratuity of £77 to a female warder at Holloway. Getting rid of the old laundry and bakehouse at 10 Downing street and making a new scullery cost £471, and new washhouses at Windsor Castle £157. Another notable item is the fact that, owing to absence of fog, South Kensington Museum saved £60 on its lighting bill. Coming to bigger affairs of state, we learn that the Dorgier Bank outrage inquiry cost £1,866; the Algeiras Conference, £648; Prince Arthur's mission to Tokio, £2,174; and Lord Selborne's traveling expenses in South Africa, £1,200. The smallest item in the list is the New Hebrides Commission, which stands at the low figure of £15. The biggest is for the maintenance of the ex-chief of Mosquito in Jamaica, namely, £13,221.

Two Hen Stories.

One of the inmates of the Animals' hospital, Hugh street, Westminster, London, is a two-year-old hen, one of a family of nine, who is suffering from a peculiar disease in its crop. The other eight have all died, one after the other, with the same disease, and special efforts are being made to save the life of the "Every day," says the doctor, "an india rubber tube is inserted in the bird's mouth, and its crop is filled with warm water. Then the hen is turned upside down, and the water allowed to trickle out. At first the bird was naturally indignant, but now she seems to even like it."

Hidden in Gully.

A strange discovery of sovereigns, for which, up to the present, no owner can be found, was reported to the Wandsworth Borough Council recently. The surveyor, Mr. Marten, stated that a total of \$105 in gold was found by employees of the council in a gully

in Chapman's creek road, the other day. Twelve pounds were found in three separate amounts, the other nine pounds being discovered after a special search.

The men who made the strange discovery refused to surrender the money at first, but were at length prevailed on to do so. The matter was reported to the police, but despite this fact, nobody has yet claimed the money.

Mr. Lorden suggested that "the least said the soonest mended," and the subject was dropped.

TO VISIT KING EDWARD.

Heiress to "Carmen Sylva's" Throne
One of His Cleverest Nieces.

The Crown Princess Marie of Roumania and the Crown Prince are to be the guests of King Edward and Queen Alexandra during several weeks of the London season, and will be present with their Majesties at Ascot races.

The princess is the eldest daughter of the late Duke of Coburg and of the Duchess Marie, and is one of the most gifted of King Edward's nieces. She was little more than a child when she was married to the heir of the Roumanian throne. Ignoring conventions, she is frequently to be seen walking in the streets in Bucharest with one or more of her beautiful children, but otherwise unattended, and while the exhibition was open there last summer visitors would meet her roaming through the courts with her little girls like ordinary tourists.

The princess is greatly beloved in her husband's country—indeed, her popularity is second only to that of her mother-in-law, Queen Carmen Sylva. She spends most of the summer at a charming country seat at Sinait, on the borders of Roumania and Hungary, where King Charles and Queen Carmen Sylva have their summer palace.

Two years ago the princess visited England, and lived during a part of the summer, with her children, in a little villa at Cowes.

Her beauty and her magnificent dresses and jewels made the princess a notable figure at King Edward's coronation fetes. She is very fond of outdoor sports, and her hobby is wood-carving.

BOY BURGLAR'S OUTFIT.

Arms and Make-Up of Leader of Juvenile Band.

An amusing story of the exploits of Frank Taylor, the boy burglar of Robin Hood Lane Station, who was charged with shooting at Mr. Damon, a solicitor, of Carshalton, was told recently.

Taylor was caught in Mr. Damon's house, and when his story of having entered it by mistake was not believed, he fired a shot at Mr. Damon from a revolver, and attempted to escape. He was captured after a struggle, in which he bit Mr. Damon's hand severely.

Edwin John Barrett, 14 years old, was also arrested as one of his accomplices, and he made a confession in which he declared that he had accompanied Taylor on ten expeditions, the object of which was robbery. He said that Taylor forced him to accompany him, and stand outside while Taylor entered the houses.

The police stated that they found the following articles in his room:

A pair of handcuffs.
Black velvet coat, with ruffles and trimmed with lace at the cuffs.
Pair of jack boots with spurs.
Three sword bayonets.
Three air guns.
A breech-loading fowling piece.
Several wigs and moustaches.
A theatrical make-up box.
They also found a large quantity of sensational literature, and they learned that the boy had taken lessons in wrestling and in the use of firearms.

How an Earl Won a Bride.

The "ashes" were not the only trophy Lord Darnley brought back in triumph from Australia. He brought back a bride as well. At one of the cricket matches the tall young Englishman lost his handkerchief, and the day being extremely hot, enquired of his friends if any one of them had a spare handkerchief that he might loan.

Immediately a very feminine "kerchief, sweet scented and of delicate fabric, was handed to him from some invisible source. It was a most acceptable convenience that hot day, and after the match he expressed his desire to thank the kindly lady. An introduction to Miss Florence Murphy followed. She was the daughter of a Victoria magistrate and a member of Sir W. J. Clarke's household as governess to the younger children.

The acquaintance so romantically commenced ripened under the kindly chaperonage of Lady Clarke, an engagement following which stood the test of a long absence in England after the cricketing tour.
