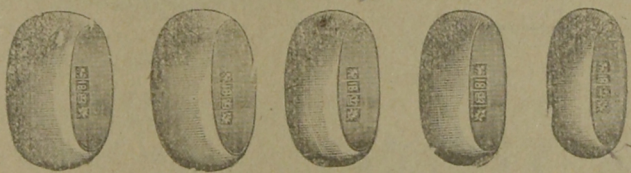

COLLINS A PUGILIST.

Condemned Murderer Boasts of his Ring
Experience--Facing his Doom With-
out Flinching.

MONCTON, N. B., Oct. 18.—(Special.)—Thomas F. Collins, confined in jail at Hopewell Cape, Albert County, sentenced to be hanged on the fifteenth of November for the murder of Mary Ann McAuley, at New Ireland, according to his own story, is a pugilist, and has appeared in the ring in the old country. Collins says he fought six rounds on one occasion before coming to this country with Billy Britt, brother of Jimmy Britt, the former lightweight champion of America. In the sixth round Collins says he was

knocked out by Britt, by a blow over the heart. This was apparently the condemned man's principal ring battle and he has related the story of that battle over a number of times with considerable pride.

A Hopewell Cape man, who was in the city yesterday visited Collins in jail on Wednesday, and he says the prisoner still maintains his innocence.

Collins appears to be more concerned in a good dinner than in anything else, and shows no signs whatever of breaking down. The condemned man is apparently not worrying in the least over his approaching fate.

THE DAWSON ROBBERY

Four Arrests Have Been Made of Men
Suspected of Bagging \$40,000
From the Mails.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 18.—(Special.)—A Dawson despatch says: "John McDonald, a Dawson jeweller, was arrested at White Horse yesterday on arrival of the steamer Selkirk from Dawson, charged with complicity in the robbery of \$40,000 from registered mail in Dawson on July 29. 'This makes four arrests in the case, the first being Richard Hall, who was taken here, the second Geo. Kincaid, chief government foreman, who was arrested at Selkirk, and

who committed suicide, the third, Tom Vaughan, held on suspicion with a charge of vagrancy against him, and the fourth McDonald.

"Other arrests are expected to follow. So far the plot is not all revealed. It now develops that Kincaid lived at a great pace here for many months, spending as high as \$200 to \$400 nightly in the past few weeks on wine and women, giving some men \$100 at a time and telling them to have a good time. Kincaid was a clever building master."

THE LABOR MOVEMENT.

Successful Meeting held in Y. M. C.
A. Hall Last Evening.

Mr. Stuart Reid, organizer for the American Federation of Labor, who has been here for several days assisting the larrigan makers of the city to perfect their organization, addressed a public meeting of those interested in the labor movement at the Y. M. C. A. Hall last evening. Mayor McLeod occupied the chair and the audience was fairly large and gave the speaker an attentive hearing.

Mr. Reid's subject was the Twentieth Century organization movement and he dealt with it in a very interesting manner, showing the benefits to be derived by working men and mechanics from organization. He dealt with both the fraternal and business phases of the question, and showed that organization possessed advantages for both employer and employee. He reminded his hearers that while employees had rights that should be protected they should bear in mind that the employer also had rights, and it was essential that such rights should be recognized in all cases.

Mr. Reid will leave this evening for Boston en route to Washington D. C., where he makes his headquarters.

A FATAL MISTAKE.

MONTREAL, Oct. 18.—(Special.)—M. Trudeau, a trick wire swallower, died in the hospital here today as a result of a mishap a fortnight ago while doing his turn.

His trick consisted of putting a wire in his nose and taking it out of his mouth, but this time he swallowed the wire by mistake.

SLIGHT FIRE.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 18.—(Special.)—The fire department was called out this afternoon for a slight blaze in D. Magee & Sons' hat and fur store. The fire was confined to the stock room and some fur garments were slightly damaged.

THREE DROWNED.

Members of G. T. P. Survey Party
Lost Their Lives in the Fraser
River.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 18.—(Special.)—Three members of the Grand Trunk Pacific survey party were drowned on October 5th in Cismombe Rapids, thirty-five miles above Fort George, on the Fraser River. They attempted to shoot the rapids in a canoe but struck a rock and the canoe went to pieces.

The drowned were Wm. Lusby, Harry Cummings, W. Symington.

The survivors are Robert Sheffield, J. Miller and Arthur Cope. No bodies were recovered.

Cromwell's party from Edmonton brought the survivors to Quesnel.

ORIENTAL IMMIGRATION.

Dominion Superintendent Back from
Investigation at Vancouver.

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 18.—(Special.)—W. D. Scott, Dominion superintendent of immigration, returned last evening from Vancouver, where he was investigating the question of Oriental immigration.

Mr. Scott will make a report to the Minister of Interior as soon as the latter returns from the west. Mr. Oliver is expected here on Monday.

In the meantime Mr. Lemieux will get the benefit of what Mr. Scott has learned while on the coast, so that he will be better fortified for his negotiations with the Japanese government after he reaches Tokio.

THE STOCK MARKET.

MONTREAL, Oct. 18.—(Special.)—Further disposition to rally was evident on the stock market today, but recovery in prices was slow in the majority of cases.

Detroit was the most active issue, and after opening at 39 1/2 eased off to 38 1/2. Rio had the best recovery of the day to 30 1/2.

Other features of trading were Twin City 8 1/2, Dominion Steel 17, Bonds 71; Nova Scotia Steel 60; Toledo 12 1/2; Montreal Power 89.

WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY.

Marconi Claims Thursday's Experiment was an Entire Success.

SYDNEY, C. B., Oct. 18.—(Special.)—A special cable from the London Daily Mail, to your correspondent here, says that special wireless messages handed in at Morien station yesterday for transmission had been received.

No further details of the practical working of the system are to be had. Newspaper men had to be content to watch proceedings of sending and receiving in the operating room through a window from the outside. Marconi, interviewed this morning said that the system was an entire success, and he was ready to receive press messages. "We can handle with ease up to and above ten thousand words a day," he said.

STUDENTS' PRANKS.

Mean Treatment Accorded Freshmen
at Queen's University.

KINGSTON, Ont., Oct. 18.—(Special.)—The Sophomores at Queen's University prepared yesterday morning a trap for the freshmen, whom they secured one by one in the old gymnasium and tied in a row against the wall.

This done, each freshman was branded on the forehead with a cross mark in indelible ink, after which the men's boots and socks were taken off and thrown in a pile in front of the arts building, where the victims hunted for their belongings for hours in their bare feet in view of hundreds of other students.

DEAF MUTE KILLED.

Was Walking on I. C. R. Track and
Run Over by Maritime Express.

ST. JOHN, N. B., Oct. 18.—(Special.)—Stephen Steeves, a deaf mute, was struck and killed by the Maritime Express on the I.C.R. this morning near Birch Ridge, 15 miles north of Moncton.

Steeves, who was walking on the track, could not hear the whistle and was struck. When picked up his head was badly smashed.

DR. PUGSLEY'S VISIT.

Minister of Public Works Arrived
from St. John this Morning.

Hon. Dr. Pugsley, the new minister of Public Works in the Dominion cabinet, arrived from St. John by this morning's train and is stopping at the Queen Hotel. He was met on arrival by Mr. Edward Moore, president of the York Liberal Association, and Mr. W. T. Whitehead, M. P. P., who drove with him to his hotel in a barouche. Later in the day the Minister paid his respects to a number of leading Liberals in Fredericton and vicinity, and it is presumed discussed the political situation.

This is Hon. Dr. Pugsley's first visit to Fredericton since he was sworn in a member of the cabinet a few weeks ago and he is receiving the hearty congratulations of his numerous friends. A BABEL OF DISCORD

(By a Banker.)
Not a vestige of cloud is visible, seawards or landwards, save a few light feathery wisps of congealed vapour floating high in the firmament; the curved horizon is clear and sharp except for the high ground of a small distant island just visible above the line dividing sea and sky; the ocean is calm and quiet, its unruffled surface mirroring the white sails of a few becalmed yachts which lazily flap to and fro. With rapid speed the steamer cleaves its way through the waters; past those great Cornish rocks which have played such havoc with vessels incautiously approaching too near, and have sunk so many a gallant seaman into a watery grave; past the green fields and wooded slopes of that Norman apparance which since the time of the Conqueror has been such a bright jewel in the British crown, and past a fleet of brown-sailed fishing craft sluggishly rolling in the placid waters. And now that bright and beautiful gem of the sea, Guernsey, is reached, a few passengers landed and a few others embarked, and again the good ship proceeds on her journey in the brilliant sunlight.

But in the offing a low line of black cloud is ominously resting. And soon we are in it. The sun is eclipsed in the dense fog; the mist is so impenetrable that from the stern of the ship the foremast is scarce visible, and the siren begins to hoot in clangorous, hollow tones, with a stridor harsh and unearthly. And from time to time, as the vessel slowly crawls along in the murky gloom, the sirens of other unseen steamers yap and screech, blare and roar, snarl and howl; some apparently endeavouring to imitate the growling and snapping of a den of hyaenas; some swelling into a detonating, rending blast; and some sounding as if a thousand crowing cocks were contending upon a dunghill. And so it goes on, hour after hour, hour after hour, until at length in the distance is heard the wellknown, measured, ten second hoot of the Needles lighthouse; soundings are again taken, the anchor is dropped, and the captain knows that, by dead reckoning alone, he has cleverly steered his course exactly true.

And now, as suddenly as the fog had at first mantled us in its gloomy shroud, a change of the wind drives it away, and there, not a mile distant, are the white cliffs of Albion and the lighthouse whence issued the timely warning to proceed no further. And how like to the experience of one of ourselves. We grope in the darkness and gloom of doubt or of infidelity, our future, in the hereafter, uncertain, and perhaps even no assurance that there is a heaven or a hell.
